Students collect items for deployed troops

Alcona High School will be the drop off location for donated personal items for service men and women in all branches of the military for the upcoming Christmas holiday and afterwards.

The project, which is still in the beginning stage, is something the students, Patti Byce and Alcona County Sheriff Deputy Nathanael Leeseberg are working on together to help make the lives of service men and women a little more comfortable when they are far away from their homes.

According to Byce, the Alcona High School Student Council is working with Operation Care Package Michigan, a nonprofit federally tax exempt organization based in Lapeer, Mich. Byce, the co-advisor for the student council explained this volunteer group of "Camo Angels" gives support to deployed military and wounded service men and women by sending care packages and letters of encouragement.

"One hundred percent of all proceeds go directly to our cause as we are all volunteers," said founder/volunteer Joyce "JJ" Fulgenzi. "With the help of many we've been able to make a real difference. Weekly we put together care packages to ship to hundreds of soldiers serving in this war on terror. This is quite an undertaking, but is so important to the morale of our soldiers."

The idea to get involved in this project came to the student council from a suggestion by Leeseberg who is the school liaison officer at Alcona Community Schools. "This is something neat for the kids to do for our troops," Leeseberg said. "Everyone knows where the school is and it's a central location. This way people from the community can help and be part of this."

With the first collection to be shipped down to Lapeer, Mich. by November 21, in order to ensure delivery by Christmas, the students are looking to the community for some quick response in the next few days and then continued support throughout the rest of the year, as they plan on keeping the collection going because the need doesn't end after the holiday season.

Byce explained the slogan for the holiday collection is "Sock it to the troops for Christmas" and the goal is to fill 800 stockings with delivery by Christmas day. "We'd like to invite individuals, groups, churches, businesses, anyone who is interested to participate," she

said.

Leeseberg is working with a contact to ensure some of the donations will be sent to soldiers from Michigan - some from Alcona County - located in Jalalabad, Afghanistan at the forward operating base (FOB). "One of the things these guys really miss are baked goods. That is one thing the Army can't supply them and they really miss that," Leeseberg said.

Byce said the list of items that can be donated is varied (see box) from packaged food and candy, to personal items and sports equipment. "We hope to have quite a bit of involvement from the community," Byce said. "If anyone can't donate items, one of the things everyone can do is write a letter to a servicemember. According to JJ they really enjoy getting mail and some don't get any mail."

Anyone interested in writing a letter can address it to "Dear American Soldier" or "Dear American Hero" seal it in an envelope and drop it off at the high school office or counseling center or mail it to Alcona High School, 51 N. Barlow Road, Lincoln, Mich. 48742, attention: Soldier Letter.

Cremation arrangements are being handled by Gillies Funeral Home, Lincoln.

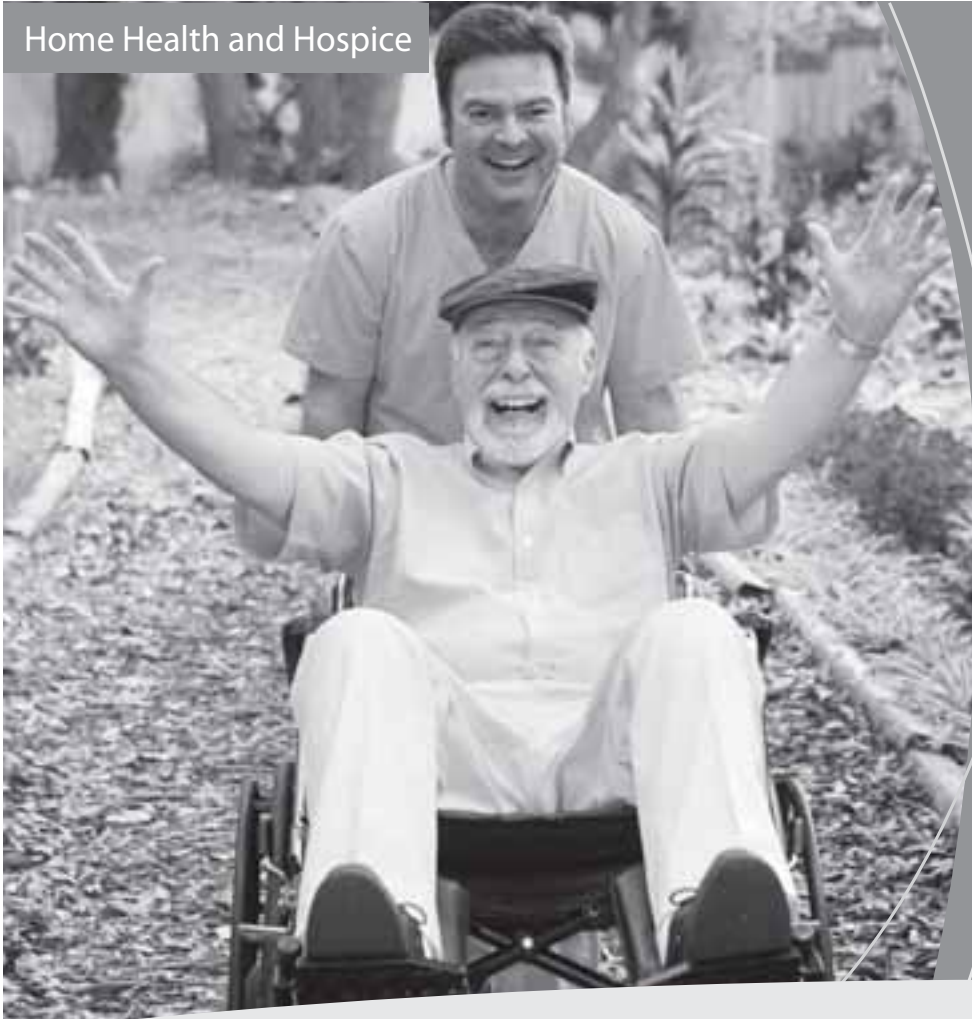
The Garden Bug Help for the Pilgrims

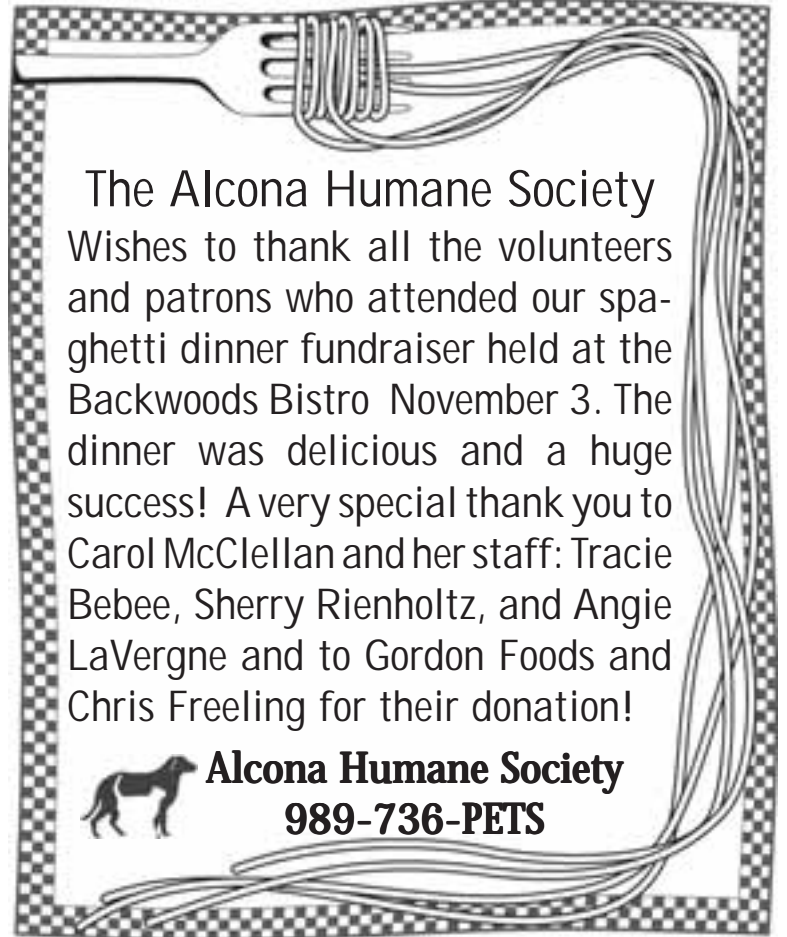

The Clear Lake Project is located on the Harrisville Ranger District of the Huron National Forest in Alcona County; Township 26N, Range 6E, Sections 16, 17, 20, 29, 30, 32, 33, and 34 and Township 25N, Range 6E, Sections 1, 2, 3, 10, and 11. The Clear Lake Aspen Project proposes the following management activities:

- Harvest by clearcutting mature aspen in units up to 40 acres to maintain the aspen forest type, enhance wildlife habitat, and create age-class diversity within the project area.
- Thin red pine to improve growth and vigor of the remaining trees.
- Construct temporary roads and associated landings. These roads and landings would be closed and rehabilitated when harvest activities were completed.
- Maintain existing wildlife openings.
- Place wildlife nest boxes to increase nesting and roosting opportunities throughout the project.
- Control or eradicate non-native invasive plant species (NNIS) where necessary and appropriate within the Project area using prescribed fire, mechanical and herbicide treatments.
- Prescribe burn to improve timber stands.

The 30-day comment period establishes standing under a Forest Service administrative appeal regulation and provides the final opportunity for public review of these proposed actions. The opportunity to comment ends 30 days following the date of publication of this legal notice in the Oscoda Press. When commenting on the project please include; (1) your name, address, telephone number, and name of organization or persons represented and title; (2) title of the document on which the comment is being submitted; and (3) specific facts and supporting reasons regarding your comments.

Your comments will be considered by District Ranger Susan Kocis in reaching a final decision. Please submit your comments to; Huron Shores Ranger Station, 5761 N. 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Unusual bird sighting at Tawas Point

Birders throughout the state have been all a flutter over the sighting of a common ground dove at Tawas Point. The bird was first observed on October 30 and has been reported several times since in the same location.

This dove is about half the size of a mourning dove. It has a short square ended tail and red bill with a black tip. This species normally resides along the southern border states from Arizona to Florida, but is showing decline along the Gulf Coast.

Sometimes during the spring and fall migrations birds will often veer off course because of inclement weather conditions, or other environmental factors. It could be that the strong south winds that prevailed across Michigan a few weeks ago may have blown this bird toward the area, according to Peggy Ridgway, member of the AuSable Valley Audubon Society.

A single common ground dove was also reported at Whitefish Point during the time the fierce storms swept across the state. However, Caleb Putnam, Michigan Important Bird Area (IBA) Coordinator, said that several other eastern states are reporting an abnormal influx of these birds. "I can't recall a year in recent decades that this has ever happened," said Putnam.

Only a few Michigan sightings of this dove have been documented, including the recent one at Whitefish Point. After studying photo close-ups, Putnam is convinced the Whitefish Point and Tawas Point birds are not the same bird.

The Michigan Bird Records Committee is reviewing the facts and will make a decision on both birds.

Yet, during its two week stay at Tawas Point, this small avian has caused quite a stir among the birding community! Former Michigan Audubon president Gary Siegrist drove all the way up from the Jackson, Mich. area to get a glimpse of the rarity.

"It's exciting to be able to get new species in Michigan, and Tawas Point is always a wonderful place to go," he said. "This bird was a lifer for me," stated Siegrist. Cody Porter, who

rode up with Siegrist and three other avid bird watchers, was also able to add this bird to his life list.

AuSable Valley Audubon member and long time birder, Ed Cole, spent many winters in Arizona and there observed the bird several times over the years. "I've never seen it in Michigan... never!" Cole said. "This is very unusual," he added.

Several members of the Michigan Bird Record's

Committee visited Tawas Point last week to verify and photograph the special visitor.

"We add another one to our growing list of bird species in the area," Ridgway said. She is the local coordinator of the annual Tawas Point Birding Festival. "No wonder birders flock to this area year around. It offers a birding bonanza and you never know what you'll find."

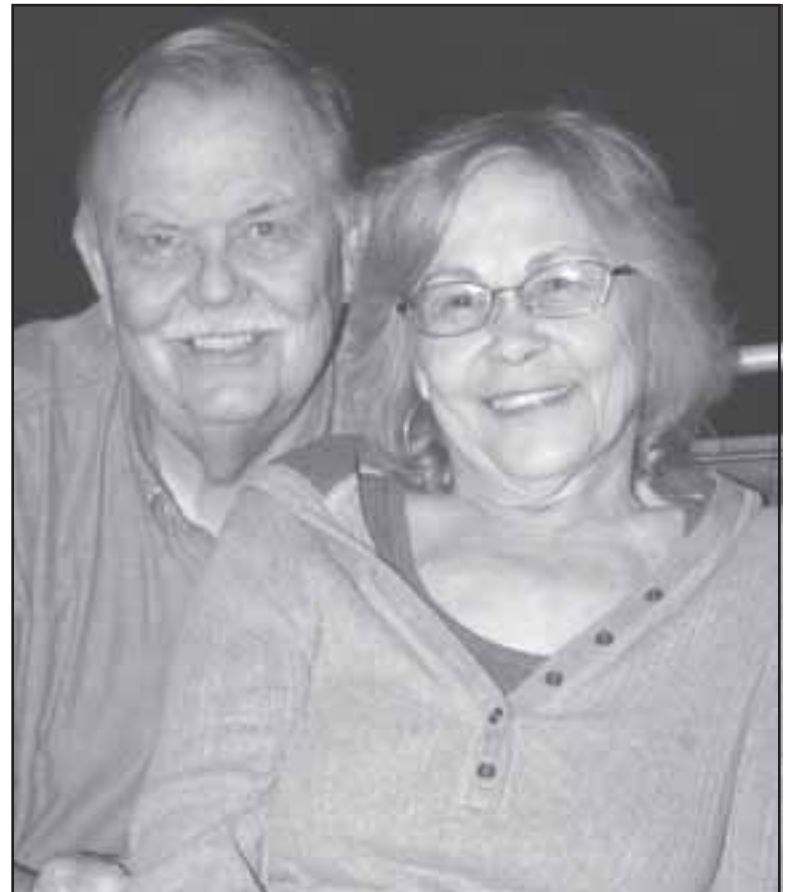

Diabetes: Have you been screened lately?

Dear Savvy Senior,
What can you tell me about diabetes and how can a person know if they have it? My sister and her husband, who are ages 65 and 63 were both recently diagnosed with type 2 diabetes and neither had a clue.

Surprised Sister

Dear Surprised,
It's called the "silent disease" for a reason. With no significant warning signs, there are millions of people who have diabetes today that don't realize it.

The diabetes epidemic in the U.S. is huge, especially among older adults. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that over 12 million seniors, age 60 and older - roughly 23 percent of people in this age group - have diabetes today, but nearly half of them don't know it. The danger of undiagnosed diabetes is that, left untreated, it increases the risk of heart disease and stroke and can escalate into kidney failure, blindness, loss of limbs and death.

There are a variety of factors that can put you at risk of getting type 2 diabetes, including your:

- Family history: The more relatives you have with the disease, the higher your risk.
- Weight: Being overweight with a body mass index (BMI) of 25 or more. See www.nhlbisupport.com/bmi to calculate your BMI. The heavier you are, the greater

your risk. Also, having excess fat around your waist, rather than around the hips and thighs increases your risk.

- Age: Your risk increases as you get older, especially after age 45.

- Blood pressure: Having high blood pressure - 140/90 or higher.

- Cholesterol: Having low HDL (good) cholesterol under 35 mg/dL or high triglycerides over 250 mg/dL.

- Race: Hispanic, Asian, African or Native Americans are more vulnerable.

To help you determine your risk, the American Diabetes Association has a quick, on-line quiz you can take for free at www.diabetes.org/risk-test.jsp.

The tricky thing about diabetes is that the symptoms (fatigue, increased hunger, excessive thirst, frequent urination, unexplained weight loss, blurred vision, slow healing cuts or sores, tingling or numbness in the hands and feet) usually seem harmless, and often don't appear for years until significant damage to the blood vessels has already occurred. That's why beginning at age 45, everyone should be tested for diabetes every three years. And you should get tested annually if you have any of the previously listed factors that put you at risk.

There are several tests your doctor can give you to determine whether you have diabetes including the "fasting

blood glucose test "or the "oral glucose tolerance test," that require an eight hour fast before you take it. And the "hemoglobin A1C test" or "random blood glucose test," that can be taken any time regardless of when you ate.

If you're reluctant to visit your doctor to get tested, an alternative is to test yourself. To do that, go to your pharmacy and buy a blood glucose monitor (many of them cost under \$20). Fast overnight, and check your blood sugar in the morning. If your result is less than 100, you're okay.

But if your blood glucose is 100 to 125, then you have prediabetes. And if your reading is higher than 125, you may have diabetes. If your reading is above 100, you need to visit your doctor to develop a plan to get it under control. In many cases lifestyle changes like losing weight, exercising, eating a healthy diet and cutting back on carbohydrates may be all you need to do to get your diabetes under control. For others who need more help, many medications are available.

Vibration therapy for bone loss

Vibration therapy is said to address a number of ills: prevent varicose veins, break up cellulite, rev up the lymph system and reduce knee and leg pain. The big benefit, however, is that it's possible for vibration therapy to address the problem of bone loss.

Here's how vibration therapy is thought to work: The machine platform that one sits or stands on vibrates at 30-90 cycles per second, the same rate as muscles in the human body. The vibrations in essence mimic the body and do what the body isn't doing anymore - creating bone, in this case.

The studies are numerous and come from all over the globe.

In China, a 24-week study in postmenopausal women show an increase in the bone and mineral density of the hip.

In Belgium, researchers compared vibration therapy with regular resistance training, and the vibration therapy showed that strength increased.

In Florida, a study concluded that whole-body vibrations "improve quality of

life, walk, balance and motor capacity in elderly patients."

Even NASA has gotten into the act with LIV, or Low Intensity Vibration. With astronauts spending long periods of time in space with no real way to exercise, bone loss has been a serious concern. Via various contraptions, NASA has been able to let astronauts work out, but the results haven't been satisfactory when it comes to bone loss. Enter vibration therapy, and a way for astronauts to maintain bone strength while in space.

I found some of these alleged machines for sale online. This is one item that needs a doctor's advice, though, as a vibration level that's too high can be very dangerous.

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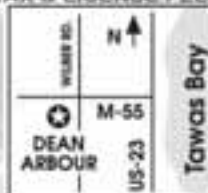
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Officials urge awareness of illegal drug operations on public land

The U.S. Forest Service and other law enforcement agencies have been working together to identify and crack-down on illegal drug operations on national forest lands.

In 2010, a total of 1,500 marijuana plants were re-

moved from Michigan national forests. Additionally, one "meth lab" was discovered on the national forests, with nine suspects under investigation. This year for the first time, authorities are finding marijuana gardens oper-

ated by large drug trafficking organizations on Michigan's national forests.

National forest visitor and employee safety is the agency's top priority. Local partner agencies are also committed to keeping the

national forests' workforce and public safe and preventing the resource damage resulting from illegal marijuana operations. While visitors will unlikely encounter illegal drug activity, officials want to assure that hunters,

hikers, campers and other recreationists know how to stay safe.

Most illegal drug production activity occurs during the spring and summer. However, drug operation sites can remain dangerous year-round due to the presence of chemicals, explosives and other materials sometimes present at these sites. Signs of marijuana growing operations may include:

- Informal, unmarked hiking trails
- Human habitation in remote areas; signs of established camping, cooking and sleeping areas
- Gardening paraphernalia like drip hose irrigation, fertilizer bags, insecticides and tools
- Pungent strong odor (marijuana plants can have a strong smell, especially on hot days)
- Paper cups, chicken wire, or plastic sheets, which are often used for starting and protecting plants
- Signs of cultivation or soil disturbance in forested areas, especially in remote areas
- Trash in remote areas
- Propane bottles or tanks (growers use propane to avoid smoke from campfires)
- People sitting in the forest along forest roads (they may be growers waiting for food drops or supplies)
- Food cached near trailheads or alongside roads
- Individuals with firearms when hunting seasons are closed
- Booby traps such as explosives triggered by trip wires

If you come across signs of illegal activity do not approach the site or confront individuals present at the site. Do not in any way indicate you are suspicious of their activities. As soon as you become aware that you have entered a cultivation site, or have encountered any of the above listed situations, immediately remove yourself from the area. Walk, crawl or run out the way you came in, making as little noise as possible.

When at a safe distance, contact the nearest law enforcement office as quickly as possible, reporting as much detail about the incident as possible (e.g., a description of the activities taking place, the area where you encountered activity, the people and any vehicles).

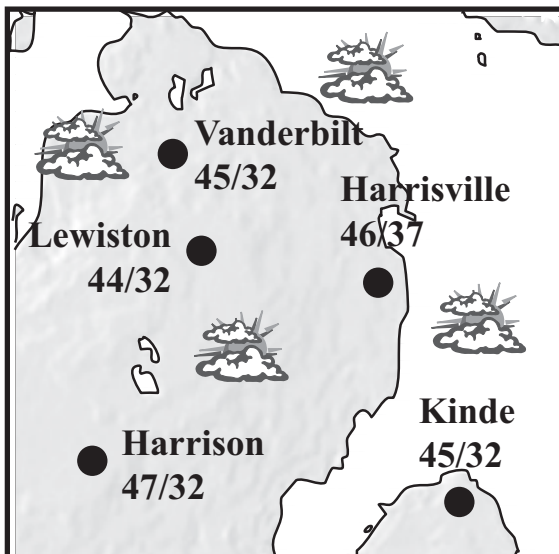

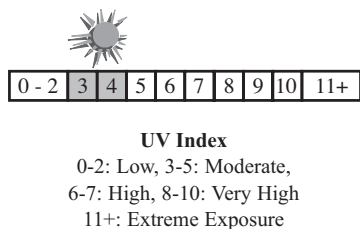

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StarWatch By Gary Becker - Looking Forward to December

Now I feel as if I am in the midst of the astronomical doldrums, but in December there is going to be screaming and shouting about several wonderful sky events, both influenced directly by the moon. The first is the Geminid Meteor Shower, occurring on the evening and morning of the 13th/14th, when the moon is at first quarter and sets just as the action begins. Rates of 50-100 meteors per hour can be expected. The other happens early on the morning of December 21 when the full moon is eclipsed by Earth's shadow. If you have seen several lunar eclipses, you know that Earth's shadow projected onto the moon is always round. The Greeks realized this from observing many lunar eclipses occurring in different seasons and visible in different parts of the sky at different times of the night. Their conclusion was that the Earth had to be spherical in shape. If the Earth would have been disk-shaped, its shadow would have appeared elliptical during most eclipses and as a dark line when projected onto the moon in an edgewise fashion. Since the moon always presented its same face towards the Earth, one might hypothesize that it could have really been a disk. However, the moon goes through a cycle of phases, and except for first and last quarter, where the sunrise-sunset line called the terminator, appears straight, this boundary is always seen as a curve. Only a sphere could produce a curved terminator. A disk would have appeared in illumination either on or off, although the brightness of the sunlit portion of the disk would have changed dramatically, depending upon the angle of illumination. Returning to eclipses, don't think that the lunar phases result from the moon going in and out of the Earth's shadow. They are just a natural consequence, as mentioned before, of a spherical body, the moon, in orbit around the Earth. www.astronomy.org

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MOMENTS IN TIME

The History Channel

• On Nov. 30, 1886, the Folies Bergère in Paris introduces an elaborate revue featuring women in sensational costumes. The theater spared no expense, staging revues that featured as many as 40 sets. Among other long traditions, the show's title always contains 13 letters and includes the word "Folie."

• On Dec. 5, 1933, the 21st Amendment to the U.S. Constitution is ratified, repealing the 18th Amendment and bringing an end to the national prohibition of alcohol. Mississippi, the last dry state in the Union, ended Prohibition in 1966.

• On Dec. 4, 1945, in an overwhelming vote of 65 to 7, the U.S. Senate approves full U.S. participation in the United Nations. Some senators proposed a resolution designed to force the president to receive congressional consent before approving U.S. troops for any U.N. peacekeeping forces. The resolution was defeated.

• On Dec. 1, 1955, in Montgomery, Ala., Rosa Parks is jailed for refusing to give up her seat on a public bus to a white man, a violation of the city's racial segregation laws. Parks' refusal was not merely brought on by her tired feet, as is the popular legend. Local civil-rights leaders had been planning a challenge to Montgomery's racist bus laws for several months.

• On Dec. 3, 1967, 53-year-old Lewis Washkansky receives the first human heart transplant in Cape Town, South Africa. After surgery, he was given drugs to suppress his immune system and keep his body from rejecting the heart. He died 18 days later from double pneumonia.

• On Dec. 2, 1972, the Temptations earn the last of their four chart-topping hits when "Papa Was a Rollin' Stone" reaches No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100. Earlier hits by producer-songwriter Smokey Robinson were "The Way You Do the Things You Do" (1964) and "My Girl" (1965).

• On Nov. 29, 1981, actress Natalie Wood, who starred in such movies as "Rebel Without a Cause" and "West Side Story," drowns in a boating accident near California's Catalina Island. It was believed she somehow slipped overboard while untying a dinghy attached to the boat.
