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## Community service trooper reaches out to citizens

The new community service trooper out of the Michigan State Police post in Alpena is looking for an opportunity to meet with groups and organizations in Alcona County.

Trooper Randy Servia has been selected as one of 21 community service troopers who have been assigned to regions across the state to focus solely on community outreach. Servia, who has been assigned to the Alpena post for three years, serves citizens in Alcona, Alpena and Presque Isle counties in a variety of ways including mentoring youth, working with senior citizens and focusing on community service and training.

Specifically, service officers will:

- Attend community meetings to share information on crime prevention;
- Educate citizens on bullying, sexting and other emerging trends;
- Provide the teaching, educating and mentoring (TEAM) curriculum in schools;
- Evaluate community po licing initiatives for their impact on communities;
- Work with citizens, businesses, non-profit organizations and other law enforcement agencies to develop and implement solutions to localized issues;
- And identify, assess and prioritize ongoing community needs.

Since accepting his new assignment in early Febru-
ary, Servia has been busy attending meetings in Alpena County and is looking forward to becoming familiar with residents in Alcona and Presque Isle counties. "'ll be working with the community in areas of problem solving taking a proactive approach to solving issues that are criminal as well as non-criminal," he said.

Servia explained one of the topics he's discussed with seniors in Alpena County is "fraud, scams and laundering money - many times at elderly citizens' expense." This has been a very popular topic and he is looking to talk to various other groups soon. He'd also like to discuss the misuse of prescription medications by young people, ways to keep homes and vehicles
safer from break ins and other topics that might be on the minds of residents.
Servia is familiar with life in a small community. He grew up in Norway, Mich., a small town in the western area of the Upper Peninsula. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in criminal justice from Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.
His law enforcement career began 16 years ago with positions at the Delta County Sheriff's Department and then with the Menominee County Sheriff's Department. In 1997 he was accepted to the Michigan State Police Recruit School in Lansing, Mich. He graduated the same year from the $115^{\text {th }}$ Trooper Recruit School and was as-

## Snowmobile racing

 returns to LincolnOn February 26 and 27, thanks to the support of Michigan Cat of Michigan, iced oval snowmobile racing will once again be returning to Lincoln.
The event is sanctioned by the Midwest International Racing Association (MIRA) (www.miraracing.com), an organization that brings a level of safety, competitiveness, professionalism and entertainment, unmatched by any other racing group in the state.
This MIRA event consists of two days that feature a full day of sprint-style racing on Saturday and the feature 500 lap Pro Enduro race on Sunday, the Michigan Cat 500, starting at noon. The only other 500 lap event of its kind is the famed Soo I-500 race held each February in Sault St. Marie, Mich.

For those who are unfamiliar with this style of snowmobile racing, these are the fastest, best-handling machines on ice. The sprint-style racing format consists of three-lap heat races and five-

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lap final races, for several classes of competition

The Sunday Pro Enduro race is the snowmobile equivalent of a NASCAR race, utilizing pit crews, pit stops and lots of hard-charging side-by-side racing at speeds exceeding 100 miles per hour on a half mile iced oval track.

This year Lincoln's Saturday program will have a bonus feature to it as Lincoln is a points Championship event for the TLRCup (www.tlrcup.com). This is a group of Pro Champ 440 Sprint racers that race several different events in several different states, as well as Canada, making it an international challenge. These sleds are the fastest and most advanced snowmobiles on the planet. These are the best-of-the-best and will be competing for over $\$ 51,000$ in prize money based on points accumulated at the six designated races, the last being Lincoln.

The unique thing about the Lincoln ARA site race track facility is that the track is built in a bowl-type layout, which allows for trackside parking in vehicles from an elevated position around the half-mile race course. The tower announcer's voice is even broadcasted over an FM radio signal so that the vehicle radios can pick up that signal which allows the spectator to know what is happening on the race course at all times.

The gate admission for the Michigan Cat 500 weekend is $\$ 15$. However this year, due to the TLR Cup Feature and special local sponsorship, there will be free admission on Saturday after 11 a.m. Sunday gate admission will still be $\$ 15$ for ages 13 and over. To reserve front

## Tigers make close comeback against Hurons

On Tuesday, Feb. 8 the Alcona varsity boys' basketball team walloped Rogers City in their gym by 20 points. When Rogers City walked onto Alcona's court a week later, it appeared they had three more players on the team. Were they key players that did not play in the game at Rogers City?
Alcona started the same way they did before, jumping out to a 4-0 lead on buckets by Brock LaVergne and Bryan Layton. It seems like every game starts with a pass to LaVergne and he makes his unstoppable baseline drive for an easy lay-up. With the score tied at six the game did not go as expected. The Hurons went on a 13-2 run and jumped ahead 19-8 after one quarter. The starters were sluggish so Coach Seth Coffing put all five on the bench to try and wake them up.

That didn't help much because the Hurons were fired up to be that far ahead and played with a lot of confidence -- good passing, tight defense and accurate shooting. They increased their lead to 26-11 before the Tigers went on a 9-0 run and closed the gap to seven points. Alcona then went cold and could not hit a shot or a free throw. Rogers City went to the lockeroom at halftime with a 34-20 lead.
Alcona came alive offensively in the third quarter thanks, in part, to Alex Cole's seven points, but could only outscore Rogers City 15-13 and still trailed 47-35 heading into the final period.
The Hurons scored the first six points of the fourth quarter and led by 17 points at 52-35 with six minutes to go in the game. It certainly appeared the game was over and the Hurons would have a happy trip home.

But, Cole hit a three-
pointer. Then Layton scored the next eight points and, all of a sudden, the Tigers were only down by six points with four minutes to play. The Hurons scored a basket to increase their lead to eight points.

Then Alcona finished the game with a 9-0 run and won 55-54. LaVergne began the finishing run with a put back. Layton scored on a nice drive to the basket. Braden Yokom made a free throw and Layton made two free throws. LaVergne scored the winning basket on another put back and the Tigers had their 11th win of the season.

Two key moves made all this possible. Rogers City was scoring three pointers on Alcona's zone defense. Coffing went to a man-to-man defense and his boys really cranked up the defense. It confused the Hurons who all of a sudden did not have the confidence they had shown

## Tinnitus: Tips and treatments for ringing ears

Dear Savvy Senior,
What can you tell me the about the constant ear ringing syndrome known as tin nitus? At age 56, I have had it for several years but it has gotten more and more noticeable lately. Is there anything I can do?

Ringing Rhonda
Dear Rhonda,
Tinnitus (pronounced ti-NIGHT-us) is a common disorder that affects nearly one in six Americans. Here's what you should know along with some tips and treatments that may help.
Tinnitus is the sensation of hearing a ringing, buzzing, roaring, hissing or whistling sound in one or both ears when no external sound is present. The sounds, which can vary in pitch and loudness, are usually worse when background noise is low, so you may be most aware of it at night when you're trying to fall asleep in a quiet room. For most people tinnitus is merely annoying, but for many others it can be extremely disturbing.

It's important to know that tinnitus is not a disease, but a symptom that can be caused by a variety of underlying conditions. The best way to find out what's causing your tinnitus is to see an audiologist, or ear, nose and throat doctor (otolaryngologist). The various things that can cause tinnitus are:

- Exposure to loud noise: This is the most common cause.
- Hearing loss: For many
people, hearing loss can cause tinnitus.
- Earwax: A build-up of wax deep in the ear canal can cause temporary tinnitus and hearing loss.
- Medications: Over 200 different drugs can cause ringing ears including aspirin, especially when taken in high doses. For a list of drugs that can cause tinnitus call the American Tinnitus Association at (800) 634-8978.
- Health conditions: Various medical conditions can also trigger tinnitus such as high blood pressure, vascular disease, diabetes, allergies, thyroid problems, ear or sinus infections, Meniere's disease, otosclerosis, temporomandibular joint (TMJ) syndrome, a tumor, an injury to the head or neck and more.

While there's currently no cure for tinnitus there are some ways to treat it depending on the cause. For example, if your tinnitus is caused by a medical condition (high blood pressure, thyroid problems, ear infection, et cetera) treating the condition may reduce or eliminate the noise. If you have wax build-up in your ears, removing it can help. Or, if you think a medication you're taking may be causing the problem, switching to a different drug, or lowering the dosage may provide some relief.

Another treatment option for tinnitus that can help suppress or mask the sound

so it's less bothersome are "sound therapies." These can be something as simple as a fan or a white noise machine, or something more sophisticated like small electronic masking device that you wear, or a music therapy device like Neuromonics (see neuromonics.com) that actually trains your brain not to hear the tinnitus. Or, if you have hearing loss, hearing aids can help mask your tinnitus by improving your ability to hear actual sounds. Your audiologist or hearing health professional can help you with these options
There are also certain medications that help too. While there's currently no drugs specifically designed to treat tinnitus, anti-anxiety drugs, antidepressants, antihistamines, anesthetics, as well as drugs intended to treat alcoholism, epilepsy and even Alzheimer's have been effective in reliving symptoms in some people.
Alternative treatments like acupuncture, hypnosis, massage therapy, biofeedback, meditation, the herb ginkgo and zinc supplements are also worth looking into. And counseling and support groups can also be helpful.

A reverse mortgage gives you money out of the equity in your home. You can get it in monthly sums, as a line of credit or all at once. The money doesn't have to be paid back until you die or sell the house.
Sounds good, right? But reverse mortgages have always been a tricky and complicated business, and now laws have recently changed concerning reverse mortgages.
-Appraisers are more protected now, and you have less recourse over a bad appraisal.
-You'll be required to complete counseling to learn about reverse mortgages.
-The Federal Housing Administration has lowered upfront fees in its new Home Equity Conversion Mortgage Saver program as of October 2010. You'll be charged 0.01 percent of the value of the home, instead of the mammoth thousands of dollars that often were charged with the Standard version before the change. The catch is that you can't take out as much equity as before. Mortgage insurance is now 1.25 percent annually. The Saver
program works best if you're only going to stay in your home for a few years
However, the Standard reverse mortgages have some changes, too. You'll still pay an upfront mortgage insurance premium of 2 percent of the value of the home. If paid monthly, that changes to a whop ping 1.25 percent of the value of the home - it had been 0.5 percent. Bottom line: Standard now costs more.
No matter which version you choose, all liens must be paid off. The amount you get is determined by the value of your home, your age (age 62 or above) and the going interest rates.

of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE) has released draft plans for managing muskellunge and northern pike statewide. The DNRE is accepting public comment on the draft plans through March 3.
The purpose of these plans is to provide a strategy for managing populations of muskellunge and northern pike throughout Michigan.
These plans build on a foundation of previous public review and incorporate the latest in research and management experience. The second drafts of the plans were developed with input from DNRE staff and angling interests, including three workshops, review by citizen committees and previous public comment through the DNRE's website.
The desire by anglers to harvest medium and large northern pike often conflicts with improving the opportunities to catch large northern pike. Similarly, the desire by anglers to expand the number of waters managed for muskellunge conflicts with those who may oppose expansion. These plans include detailed information on the biology and management of these species, as well as specific goals, objectives, strategies and actions for managing muskellunge populations and their habitat, improving opportunities for large northern pike on select waters, and improving northern pike fishing statewide, while also
harvest and spearing of northern pike.

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## DNRE uses old-fashioned barb wire to survey bear populations

Wildlife management involves any number of sophisticated tools, but it can also involve some pretty old-fashioned hardware. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment's (DNRE) wildlife division is involved in a bear research project that marries the two extremes study that involves both DNA and barb wire.

The project involves collecting DNA samples from bears two ways. The DNRE has been collecting the DNA from every bear harvested in the Lower Peninsula for the last nine years when they remove a tooth from the animal at a check station. But now the DNRE is collecting DNA from bears before they're harvested. That's where the barb wire comes in.

DNRE wildlife technicians and biologists have established a number of bear baits, which hang from trees, and they surround the baits with low barb wire fences. Bears that cross the fences will generally leave hair behind on the barb wire. The hair can be analyzed for DNA.
"This research started in 2002," explained DNRE wildlife research biologist Dwayne Etter. "We were trying to esti-
mate the bear population in the Lower Peninsula, using genetic techniques. We put hair snares out in the summer, collected samples, then compared the DNA from the hair to the DNA we from teeth extracted from harvested bears.
"The ratio of animals involved in hair snares to the harvest gives a population estimate in what biologists call a 'capture-mark-recapture' scenario," Etter said "It's a pretty standard technique, but the way we used it and at the scale we used it hasn't been done before."

The DNRE began collecting and storing DNA from all the teeth extracted from harvested bears because "given that the technology is advancing so rapidly, we felt that it would be valuable to have that information in the future." Etter said.
The future is now. Etter said the ongoing research should help wildlife managers determine whether our harvest regulations are on the right track.
"One of the questions we had about managing bears both in the Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula - is: Are we harvesting bears in a biological fashion?" Etter
said. "We have managementarea boundaries that are based on human boundaries - roads, counties, whatever. So how does the harvest within those management areas impact the bear population? Is it just an artifact of how the boundaries are drawn or is it actually managing biologically?
One of the objectives of research is to better help wildlife managers understand the dynamics of bear populations.
"The primary objective is to see if we can identify source and sink populations," Etter explained. "A sources population is an area that produces more offspring than you have mortality - a net positive effect where offspring from the area are dispersing out to other areas. A sink would be the opposite - an area where these bears disperse to, but where the mortality is very high, say from hunting pressure or from crossing roads or something else.
"Because we'll be able to identify individual bears and their relationships - we'll know who their mother is and who their father is - we'll be able to see how the offspring disperse into the land-

## A question of balance

"A budget should reflect the values and priorities of our nation and its people."
~Mary Landrieu When it comes to the federal budget process, (and it does come to that, as we ap proach the March 4 expiration of the current continuing resolution) a more appropriate quote might be that like those who love the law or sausage, those who think the federal budget makes sense shouldn't watch it being made.

Budgeting at the federal level is confusing at best, dealing as it often does in figures so far beyond our own household economies as to be unimaginable, and identifying programming by a bizarre collection of abbreviations and acronyms.

LIHEAP, for example. Or Section 8 or Section X funds. (I'm not sure why one is in Roman numerals and one is not). Cuts to those clumps of letters or numbers wouldn't necessarily make the average citizen sit up and pay attention. Unless, that is, they've received heating assistance (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program), rental subsidies (Section 8) or planned parenthood assistance (Section X).
Those are just some of the cuts proposed in the first round of budget talks on the federal level, along with almost $\$ 1$ billion in cuts to Head Start and Early Head Start programs, and nearly a billion in WIC (Women, Infants and Childrens' Program) funds which provide pregnant women, babies and toddlers with formula, healthy food and nutrition education.
It's important to note that this "early" in the budgeting process (the fiscal year actually began October 1, 2010, but the government operated for six months on the continuing resolution in order to allow newly elected congresspeople who took office in January to participate) many things are proposed that may be debated, argued, lauded or decried, but will never actually be passed into law.

Be that as it may, it seems that if we're keeping track of who's doing what - and the cuts mentioned above come from both sides of the aisle in many cases it is enough to know that someone in high office considered them. And maybe more importantly, either didn't consider or didn't fully understand the impact these cuts would have on lowincome women, children and the elderly.
Many of these cuts seriously underscore once again the concept that the senators and congresspeople we've elected to represent us haven't a clue what life at or below the poverty line is like. Consider the congressman who felt the cuts to early child care were valid because "Women should really be home with their children, not out working."

What a great world this individual must live in, to believe that working outside the home is a choice for women whose income makes
their children eligible for Head Start programming. Or, for that matter, with layoffs and cutbacks rampant across the country, for many women whose income may preclude Head Start eligibilprec

Or consider the congressman who introduced the amendment defunding Planned Parenthood. He argued that he did so to prevent taxpayer money from funding abortions. Perhaps he missed the fact that the organization is already prohibited from using the money it receives under Title X, which funds reproductive health services, to perform abortions. Instead, it uses those dollars to provide contraceptives, HIV tests, can cer screenings and reproductive health services on a sliding fee basis.

I will point out, once again, that while virtually no prescription drug plan covers contraception, virtually every plan covers Viagra and the like. And that if we are to sanctify life in the womb, we have an obligation to support it after birth, as well.

Despite a good deal of search and research, I wasn't able to find any justification for the cuts to the nutrition program, nor to Section 8 which, in a decade that saw more foreclosures than ever before, provides rental subsidies to those in need of housing. I did hear "a highly placed White House source" explain that the heating program was only being cut by the additional dollars that had been added over the past year, taking it back to its normal budget level. That would sound okay, I suppose, if I didn't know that even before the recessionary years, the LIHEAP program consistently ran out of funds in the first few months that dollars were available each year.

Perhaps for the first time since President Johnson began the war on poverty, budget proposals for the 2012 fiscal year call for a reduction of the Community Service Block Grant. CSBG represents a guaranteed funding stream for Community Action Agencies across the nation - often the last bastion of help for families and individuals literally "going under" in the present economy.

CSBG funds are often used to provide support to programs that offer no staffing or administrative funds. In Northeast Michigan, they are utilized by Northeast Michigan Community Service Agency, Inc. (NEMCSA) to provide programming to children, families, the elderly the homeless, and many others in need of assistance. In addition, this rarely recognized set of initials is used through community action to leverage additional programming dollars that provide food (such as home delivered meals of commodity packages) and housing assistance, among other programs, to the elderly and/or poor. Serious reduction or loss of CSBG funding would have a devastating impact

on the low-income or otherwise vulnerable population of northeast Michigan.
As mentioned above, none of these proposed cuts are yet cast in stone. The deadline for adopting a budget the date on which the current continuing resolution expires - is March 4. Between now and then, a good many good people will fight long and hard to try to ensure that we don't base our alleged "fiscal responsibility" on the backs of the poor.
Over the course of the past year, we've heard a great deal of rhetoric at the federal level about fiscal responsibility and spending our grandchildrens' futures on the one hand and repeated assurances that the economy is slowly beginning to improve on the other. While those may all be valid points, clearly they are made by individuals who have never dealt with genuine fiscal crisis on the genuine fisc
family level.

While things may improve over the next year or two, those who are already in tenuous situations economically rarely have the luxury of time. Nor can they worry about the incomes of future generations while struggling to feed and house the current one. And when money is truly short (or absent) it can be difficult onto impossible to do things in a fiscally responsible manner.

If some of these proposed cuts become fact, there will be people in our own community and across the country - many of them women and children - who will literally lose their grip on a decent life, a healthy meal, a decent place to live. The federal budget process can be a confusing one, indeed. But not nearly as confusing (to me, at least) as allowing that to happen.

conducted in 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2009 and more samples are being added
"This could be something that we look to do in the Upper Peninsula down the road as well," Etter said. "We began stockpiling DNA from all harvested bears in the U.P in 2009. We need several generations of bears to make this information usable because U.P. bears typically begin breeding at age three or four.
One of the big issues in future bear management in Michigan is how bears fit in to the southern Michigan landscape. There is no doubt that bears are expanding their range to the south in Michigan, but wildlife biologists don't have good information on dispersal mechanisms.
"At this point, we're not getting a good handle on how the bears are moving south," Etter said. "We have some ideas, that they're essentially following the Muskegon River

## StarWatch By Gary Becker - Vega and the Prince

?. When I was a volunteer astronomer at Chaco Culture near Nageezi, NM, I worked with a former Exxon executive named Johnny Prince. Prince headed Exxon's initiative to clean up the Alaskan coastline after the Exxon Valdez oil spill in March of 1989. Johnny could be quite a fistful, and on those rare occa. sions when his demeanor seemed more like a boardroom CEO, our little cadre would gently remind him that he had been responsible for releasing two friendy seals that Exxon had spent hundred of thousands of dollars rehabilitating. It was a huge media event which deflated immediately when one of the mammals was eaten by a killer whale. In all fairness, Johnny Prince was really a decent guy, and I enjoyed his camaraderie, especially when we were observing or photographing the night sky. On one such occasion, Johnny was having trouble with his computerized drive. He had a beautiful refractor, but the drive which allowed the scope to follow the stars was a handful. After tinkering with it for hours he realized that he had forgotten a book containing star positions and couldn't initialize the mount without it. So he yelled matter-of-factly to me, inquiring whether I knew the precise coordinates of Vega, the bright star that was nearly over our heads. I smiled because I knew the precise coordinates of only one star in the entire sky and that was Vega, the star from which "the message" was transmitted back to Earth in the movie, Contact. I closed my eyes and watched Jodie Foster's surprised look as she realized the radio telescopes were picking up ET. Her lithe body jumped into the driver's seat of her convertible. Reaching for her walky-talky, she (I) screamed, "Right ascension 18 hr ., 36 min., 56.2 sec.; declination +36 deg., 46 min .56 .2 sec . Confirm!" Okay, Jodie was off just a little, but Johnny Prince never asked me for another stellar coordinate again. www.astronomy.org
corridor, but we're not entirely sure.
"One of the things were looking at is, are there corridors and are there barriers to bear movement? As the landscape becomes more fragmented, how do we manage for those corridors? Do we want bears to move south? It would be important to understand where these source or sink areas are in relationship to corridors and barriers.

Etter said the research has been made possible because of assistance from geneticist Kim Scribner and graduate student Hope Draheim at Michigan State University. Similar research has helped the DNRE formulate new approaches to bobcat and marten regulations.
"We're hoping that ultimately this research will help us evaluate our management units and tell us if there are biological reasons why we should redefine those areas," Etter said.
"The hunters are very im portant in this program, Etter concluded. "This is why we need those to extract teeth when we check harvested bears at our check stations.
"And we are very thankful for the hunters' cooperation."
