nurches celebrate Christ during the Christmas season

In Alcona County the celebration of Christmas is recognized by many traditional community events such as tree lightings, visits with Santa and special shopping days. Many, though, in this rural community, have not lost the true meaning of the word Christmas.

Christmas or "Christ's Mass" is the annual holiday honoring the birth of Jesus Christ and has been celebrated worldwide as a religious holiday for over two millennia. Many local Christian churches are already underway in preparing for the celebration by holding weekly Advent services, giving to others less fortunate or other holy day preparations.

Advent is a time of preparation and at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church on US-23 in Harrisville, the four weeks before Christmas the congregation welcomes all to come on Sundays at 10 a.m. "During Advent we recall the history of God's people and reflect on how the prophecies and promises of the Old Testament were fulfilled. We examine ourselves to prepare our hearts and lives once again for Jesus' coming," said Susan Wander, ministry team member.

She explained the four Sundays of Advent are marked by lighting candles in a wreath. The first candle is for hope. The second candle is for peace, the third candle is for joy. The fourth candle is for love. "On Christmas Eve we light the final center candle, the Christ candle," Wander said.

• St. Andrews will also have a special study during Advent with the reading of the book "Sent, Delivering the Gift of Hope at Christmas," by Jorge Acevedo on the four Sundays before Christmas at 6 p.m. at the church. Wander explained there is a DVD which goes along with the book so a book is not necessary to participate in the study sessions. Christmas lessons, music, Bible readings and songs will be held Sunday, Dec. 20 at 10 a.m. Many other Christian churches will also be celebrating and preparing for Christ's birth in different ways. Spruce Presbyterian Church on Gillard Road in Spruce and the Westminster Presbyterian Church on Second Street in Harrisville will celebrate the Hanging of the Greens on Sunday, Dec. 6 where the congregation decorates their church for Christ's

birth. Decorating begins at 9 a.m. in Spruce and at 11 a.m. in Harrisville.

• Westminster Presbyterian is also planning films about what Christmas is all about. Congregation member, Dick Hilts said there was too much commercialism around Christmas so their church wanted to show films about the true meaning of Christmas. The series of three films will be shown at the church in Harrisville on Thursdays at 7 p.m. The "True St. Nicholas" will be shown December 3, followed by the "Story of Mary" on December 10 and the story of Joseph on December 17.

• Harrisville United Meth-

odist Church will be hosting the Sunrise Bell Ringers on Sunday, Dec. 6 at 3 p.m., a birthday party for Jesus will be held following service on Sunday, Dec. 13 and there will be a Christmas Cantata on December 20 during worship. A pot luck supper will be held each Sunday during Advent at 6 p.m. with a study of "Highway Advent" following supper.

• Lincoln United Methodist Church will have a Christmas Cantata on December 9 at 7:30 p.m. Both United Methodist churches will focus sermons on African American Christmas Carols during regular Sunday service.

Family Heritage Baptist

Church on M-72 in Harrisville welcomes all to visit during the live nativity on Saturday, Dec. 12 and Sunday, Dec. 13 from 6 to 8 p.m.

• St. Anne Catholic Church in Harrisville and St. Raphael Catholic Church in Mikado are preparing by having giving trees in which anyone can help provide individual gifts for residents of foster care homes and nursing homes in Alcona County. The church will hold a youth Christmas pageant on December 24 at 3 p.m.

• St. Catherine Catholic Church in Ossineke provides individual gifts for families in need and St. Gabriel Catholic Church in Black River pro-

vides individual gifts to underprivileged elementary school children in Alcona County.

The four Catholic Church parishes also give gifts to each other with families assigned to other families of the parish to pray for in the coming year.







Fishing gear maintenance is an important task

With the colder months quickly approaching, many anglers may be getting ready to store their gear for the season. There are a few maintenance tips to follow so quality gear is ready to be used next season.

• The biggest tip is to always make sure all gear is clean and completely dry before storing it. Start by cleaning everything (rods, reels and lines) in fresh water with soap or the manufacturer's recommended solution to remove any materials that may have become attached or embedded.


• Now is a great time to inspect gear for any damage – and thus make repairs or prepare for replacements.

• Don't store any gear in direct sunlight and don't store any gear where heat and/or moisture might build up.

• Have waders? Air them out completely and don't forget to hang them upside down for the months they are out of use.

How much you'll pay for Medicare in 2016

Dear Savvy Senior,

I know there won't be a cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits next year but what about Medicare? I've heard some beneficiaries will get hit with a big Part B monthly premium increase in 2016. What can you tell me, and who will this affect?

Planning Ahead

Dear Planning,

All things considered, the news regarding your Medicare costs next year is pretty good. For about 70 percent of the nation's 52 million Medicare beneficiaries, there will be no Part B premium increase in 2016. And thanks to the 2015 Bipartisan Budget Act that was signed into law by President Obama on November 2, the other 30 percent will pay much less than previously projected. Here's what you can expect.

Because the Social Security Administration will not be giving out a cost of living increase (COLA) in 2016, the

Medicare Part B premiums for most current beneficiaries will not go up either. Thanks to the "hold harmless" provision in the Medicare law, which prohibits Part B premiums from rising in any year that there's no COLA, the 2016 monthly premium will remain at \$104.90 for most current Medicare participants.

However, this provision does not protect new Medicare enrollees (those who enroll in 2016), beneficiaries who are directly billed for their Part B premium, or current beneficiaries who have deferred claiming their Social Security. This includes people 65 or older who are still working but have signed up for Medicare because their employer doesn't offer health insurance. It also hits people who have filed and suspended Social Security benefits to allow a spouse to claim.

If you fit into any of these categories, your Medicare Part B premium will increase to \$121.80 a month in 2016 - which is much lower than the \$159.30 that it would have been, had the budget deal fell through.

The hold-harmless rule also does not protect highincome Medicare beneficiaries who already pay higher Part B premiums because their annual incomes are above \$85,000 for an individual or \$170,000 for a couple. If you fit into this category, here's what you'll pay for your Part B premium next year, based on your 2014 tax returns.

• Individuals with incomes of \$85,000 to \$107,000, or married couples filing joint tax returns with incomes of \$170,000 to \$214,000, will pay \$170.50 per month.

• Individuals earning \$107,000 to \$160,000 (couples \$214,000 to \$320,000) will pay \$243.60.

• Individuals with incomes of \$160,000 to \$214,000 (couples \$320,000 to \$428,000) will pay \$316.70. Individuals over \$214,000 or couples above



\$428,000 will pay \$389.80.

Another increase high-income beneficiaries (those with incomes over \$85,000, or \$170,000 for joint filers) need to be aware of is the surcharge on Part D premiums. Affluent seniors that have a Medicare Part D prescription drug plan will pay an additional \$12.70 to \$72.90 per month, depending on their income, on top of their regular Part D premiums.

Other changes you need to know about that will affect all Medicare beneficiaries include the Part B deductible, which will increase to \$166 in 2016 (it's currently \$147); and the Part A (hospital insurance) annual deductible which will go up to \$1,288 (it's currently \$1,260) for hospital stays up to 60 days. That increases to \$322 per day for days 61-90, and to \$644 a day for days 91 and beyond. And the skilled nursing facility coinsurance for days 21-100 will also increase to \$161 per day (it's currently \$157.50).



Check station staff hunting valuable deer data

Most Michigan deer hunters have been in the woods as much as possible during this firearm deer hunting season.

However, one group of deer hunters — members of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Wildlife Division — have given up some of their days afield to check other hunters' deer at check stations around the state.

Collecting valuable data about the state's deer population is something the DNR has been doing for decades.

The DNR is aided in its efforts by students and other volunteers and through partnerships with meat processors, taverns, recreation vehicle dealers and other businesses that provide some of the most popular check station venues.

"We get a ton of information from our hunters," said Chad Stewart, the DNR's deer specialist, who is located at the Rose Lake Research Center. "It's the one time of year when we can really get our hands on so many deer."

The DNR collects data on the age and sex structure of the harvest, location data from where the deer are being taken and a glimpse of the herd's overall health.

"We get a lot of data at the township-range-section level," Stewart said. "Any one data point doesn't have much value. But, when you get that same data over time, it has a far greater impact. We're able to tell where these deer came from and anything that changes over time regarding any of the factors we're looking at."

Across Michigan, from Wakefield in the western Upper Peninsula, to the Mackinac Bridge and south to the Point Mouillee State Game Area in Rockwood, the DNR runs check stations at a number of highway rest areas as well as at almost all DNR field offices, at many deer processors, even some restaurants.

"Our field staffers have good ideas of what makes a good deer check station," Stewart said. "A lot of it's historical — we go back to the same places year after year after year."

Vicki Brown, an analyst in the DNR Wildlife Division in Lansing, Mich. - and a deer hunter — spent part of this week working at a rest area check station along Interstate 75 at Clio. She said she really likes working there. "You get a diversity of people coming through here, not just from one or two counties," Brown said. "You get to see a lot of hunters and you get to hear their stories.³ One of the stories Brown heard was from Jay Gleeson, a 50-year-old engineer from Lapeer, Mich. who killed an eight-point buck in Clare County. Gleeson said it was his first deer season hunting since his father passed away. He'd hunted with his dad for 36 years. He said he shot his 2 ¹/₂year-old deer in honor of his dad. "I usually let bucks like this go — we try to shoot deer that are 3 ¹/₂ or older — but I

shot him with my dad's rifle and I used his knife to dress him," Gleeson said.

One hunter at the Marquette, Mich. check station said the buck he shot had a rack on his head so big it "looked like a rocking chair." At the Hilltop RV Superstore in Escanaba, Mich. a big group of hunters gathered to check their deer at the November 18 "Deer Poll."

The eyes of children widened getting close-up looks at so many big bucks. Hunters congregated at the tailgates of pickup trucks where they talked about the deer harvest and their bucks.

As an incentive for hunters to check their deer, those who do are rewarded with a Successful Hunter-Deer Management Cooperator patch. "That patch program is really popular," Stewart said. "The patch program goes back to the early 1970s — they've become tremendous collector's items and something that people really relish — they really want to get their patch."

That was one of the reasons Gabriel Dunsmore brought his deer into the Clio, Mich. check station. The 25year-old, who took his first deer this year after nine seasons of hunting, said he wanted to show off a little bit and get the patch.

The patch is what brought Jay Sheher, a 55-year-old engineer, to the check sta-

tion with his 3 ½-year-old eight-point buck. "Really it was the only reason," he said. "My son got a deer but he didn't get to get a patch, so I'm going to give him this one."

Stewart said the DNR puts tremendous effort into checking deer because of the great deal of valuable information it gets in return. "We typically check around four or five percent of our harvest most other states are only checking two or three percent of their harvest," said Stewart, who has been working at check stations in Mio and in the Lansing, Mich. area this year.

One prime indicator of health in deer, especially yearlings, is beam diameter measured at the check stations. "We measure the beam diameter at the base of the skull. The greater the diameter, the greater the fitness," Stewart said. "A deer devotes enough energy and resources to survival, and if it meets that requirement, then it goes into reproductive fitness. If it reaches that level, then it puts its energy into its antler development. Generally the more energy it puts into its antlers, the more fit that animal is.'

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Beam diameter also tells biologists how well deer are responding to their habitat. "In southern Michigan, the average beam diameter is larger than it is in the U.P.," Stewart said. "That makes sense. They have better quality habitat. They're able to consume more calories they're living on agricultural crops for the most part — so they're usually more fit the first year and moving forward.

Check stations also provide an opportunity for biologists to get disease samples. "We've got that going on in Meridian Township (Ingham County) where we found chronic wasting disease (CWD) — we've got three check stations and that's the only mandatory check area in the state," Stewart said. "And we're getting samples from the northeast Lower Peninsula where we're monitoring bovine tuberculosis."

Many hunters say they appreciate the effort the DNR puts into checking deer and analyzing the health and other dynamics of the herd.

Tracy Hickmott, a 54-yearold route salesman said he brought his deer in to be checked because "I feel like it's my responsibility."

The DNR continues to check deer into January, after the close of the firearm, muzzleloader and late archery deer hunting seasons.

"We work with several groups after the (firearm deer hunting) season to have jawaging nights," Stewart said. "So we continue to collect data after the fact."

The DNR has an online map pinpointing the locations of deer check stations throughout the state and hours of operation. Hunters also are urged to call ahead whenever possible to confirm hours and days of operation.



StarWatch By Gary Becker - How Bright, Catalina?

• A friend and I have a bet as to whether a new comet will become an easy binocular target. I say it won't, and I hope I lose. Comet Catalina (C/2013 US10) will be lurking in our morning sky for the next several months, but its first-time status will probably keep it below visual magnitude, but hopefully make it * easily seen with binoculars. Its location with respect to the moon, Venus, and the alpha star of Bootes the Herdsman, Arcturus, should make its observation easy if Catalina is bright enough. The problem with C/2013 US10, is that it is a newbie, coming into the inner solar system from the Oort Cloud of several trillion dirty sun-orbiting snowball-like objects contained in a hazy sphere of leftovers that extends about two light years from Sol. During the billions of years that these distant comets have been in existence, they acquire a thin coating of volatiles that vaporize (sublimate) far from the sun, making the comet appear very active and bright. When these volatiles are gone, the luminosity slumps, and this is exactly what has happened to Catalina. Now for the very iffy part... Catalina was closest to the sun on November 15, but now it is approaching the Earth. Comets are usually brighter after perihelion, and the fact that it is coming nearer to us through January 12, adds to the uncertainty that makes Catalina interesting. Two sets of dates are worth considering for observations, Dec. 3-7 and Dec. 31-Jan. 2. On Dec. 7 the moon, Venus, and Catalina are all within the same binocular field of view, and around the New Year, the comet will be right on top of the bright star, Arcturus. Observations should be made around 5:30 in the morning when Catalina is high enough above the SE horizon. A locator map is included with this StarWatch. Use binoculars. The winner of the bet gets treated to a sumptuous, gravy-smothered meatloaf dinner with extra mash potatoes at a local tavern near Boyertown, PA. 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Heterans Host By Greddy Groves

Poll: Vets oppose private health care

A recent poll, commissioned by the Vet Voice Foundation, indicates that veterans don't want their health care to be privatized.

Here are some of the highlights:

• A 64 percent majority opposes privatizing Department of Veterans Affairs services, with 54 percent strongly opposed.

• Most veterans like their local VA hospital, with 61 percent viewing it as favorable. When it comes to the staff, 65 percent say the doctors and nurses are qualified, with 58 percent saying the VA delivers quality care.

• Only 47 percent of those polled have a favorable view of private health-insurance companies.

 Candidates who support privatizing health care for veterans would feel an impact at the polls, with 57

percent of veterans voting against them.

• The vast majority don't want VA hospitals run like civilian hospitals.

• However, 42 percent believe the VA needs more doctors and nurses. Nearly half (48 percent) say it takes too long to be treated.

 Veterans polled don't want vouchers for civilian health care, especially since those vouchers might not

cover all expenses. Civilian health providers aren't seen as giving veterans the care they deserve.

Ås with all polls, the details matter. It was done with 800 veterans reached by phone, taken from a list. Who generated the list? What were the parameters for selection?

How the questions are posed can affect answers. For example, in the question about the proposal to change to private health care, it's stated twice that VA health care would eventually go away. It also says that the voucher program would pay for only part of health care. It then asks if the veteran would favor or oppose the plan.

If you're ever asked to participate in a poll, listen carefully to how the questions are crafted.
