New hiking, bicycling trail through state is Iron Belle Trail

Nearly 9,000 name suggestions were submitted for Michigan's planned, statewide hiking and bicycling trail stretching from Belle Isle Park in Detroit to Ironwood in the western Upper Peninsula.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has announced this showcase trail will officially be called Michigan's Iron Belle Trail.

"This name effectively captures the beauty and strength of our state's exceptional natural and cultural resources," said DNR Director Keith Creagh. "Along the route from Belle Isle to Ironwood, Michigan's Iron Belle Trail will ultimately connect


communities, provide a variety of recreation opportunities, and showcase our great state to residents and visitors alike.'

Creagh said it's important to note that while Michigan's Iron Belle Trail is a work in progress, significant portions of the trail already exist throughout both peninsulas and are open for public enjoyment and exploration. "The hard work and thoughtful vision that have for years gone into Michigan's existing trail system and future connectors help to lay the groundwork for completion of this important cross-state trail," Creagh said.

In September the DNR tries submitted via online

hosted a contest inviting residents and visitors to submit their best ideas to help name the trail. More than 8.800 submissions were received and then evaluated by a team representing partner organizations - the Michigan Trails Advisory Council, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation, the Michigan Recreation and Park Association and the Michigan Trails and Greenways Alliance - involved in the trail's establishment. Creagh chose the final name based on recommendations from that committee.

The trail-naming contest ran for three weeks with en-

survey, Facebook and paper entry form. Contest participants also showed their support by sending hand-drawn logo concepts, personal stories about their connections to trails and even a stack of entries from elementary students.

The DNR received hundreds of variations of the final name. To determine contest winners, three names were randomly drawn from that smaller pool of entries: Amanda Mailer of Rochester, Mich., Matthew Husted of Jerome, Mich. and John Meikle of Lapeer, Mich. Each will be awarded (via drawing) one of three vacation prize packages at locations along

· Kaug Wudjoo Lodge at Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park in Ontonagon, Mich.

First proposed as a "showcase trail" by Gov. Rick Snyder in November 2012, Michigan's Iron Belle Trail will stretch across Michigan and link numerous existing trails to provide both a 1,259-mile hiking route and a 774-mile bicycling route. One end of the trail lies in Michigan's newest state park, Belle Isle Park in Wayne County; the other is more than 900 miles away in Ironwood located in Gogebic County.

The Parks and Recreation Division of the DNR, as well as other partners, is seeking private and public funding to secure and develop trail corridors for Michigan's Iron Belle Trail. Temporary connectors already are in place along much of the trail and will be made permanent as resources become available.

Additional segments of Michigan's Iron Belle Trail will open throughout 2015, with ceremonial events in communities along the trail to locally mark the occasions.

Michigan's Iron Belle Trail follows the existing North Country National Scenic Trail for most of its length in Michi-

Alcona students will use technology for mandated testing and future jobs

Alcona Community Schools is moving forward in technology by preparing students for state mandated spring assessment testing and preparing them for future jobs.

Two of the state mandated tests for students will be taken online this year, according to Ashlie O'Connor, volunteer instruction technology coach for Alcona schools.

She explained the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-Step), an online assessment test, will be replacing the 44-year-old Michigan Education Assessment Program (MEAP) for grades three through eight. A Michigan Merit Exam (MME) for grade 11, which includes a college entrance exam; a work skills component and a summative component, will also be given online.

"In order for students to be able to take the test online they will need to know how to navigate through it, how to use a mouse to highlight, point and click, how to write text, scroll and use the tab key. They will also be using a cross out key, a line guide for reading and (have to) know how to zoom in and out. That's a lot for a seven or eight-yearold third-grader to know just to be able to take the test,' O'Connor said.

O'Connor, who teaches secondary world history and physical fitness, admitted she is not aware of what the students in the younger grades already understand about using computers. However, she will be working closely with the elementary and middle school teachers to come up with successful formulas to have the students up to speed by spring testing.

She is also working on scheduling time with the computer labs so each student receives enough training. "We have about 350 computers

in the school but we are not yet one-to-one and not every student has a computer at home either," O'Connor said. "Time is also a factor since teachers can't take several days out of their curriculum to teach how to test online. They will have to work putting subject matter along with technology so they are double dipping in both curriculum and assessment."

O'Connor is excited about the technology being used at the school. She said one of the biggest challenges in her field of education and, what fuels her passion for technol-

gan (1,085 of 1,259 miles). North Country Trail extends to the New York/Vermont border to the east and central North Dakota to the west. Spanning 4,600 miles, it is the longest National Scenic Trail in the nation.

The Michigan State Trails system provides broad public access to low-cost, healthy recreation opportunities and strengthens communities' appeal by boosting quality-of-life amenities.

The DNR works each year with communities and partners to celebrate and promote Michigan's public trail offerings during Michigan Trails Week – which this year runs September 19-26. The website offers many planning tools and ideas for participating community projects.



Story Published

"Fall of a Fantasy," a new crime story by local author Jim Allyn, is published in the February 2015 issue of "Ellery Queen Mystery Magazine". The story appears in the "Black Mask" section of the magazine, which is reserved for stories that best represent the hard-boiled approach to crime fiction made famous by such authors as

Dashiell Hammett and Raymond Chandler. "Black Mask" was the name of a magazine launched in 1920 by prominent journalist and critic H.L. Mencken. That magazine originally serialized Hammett's classic "The Maltese Falcon" and was the inspiration for and the original name of Quentin Tarentino's film "Pulp Fiction."

"Fall of a Fantasy" takes the good cop-bad cop theme to new and sinister heights, including corruption, hidden identities, prostitution and murder. The EQMM website, themysterplace.com describes the story as "fraught with emotional tension and dark deeds." This is the third story by Allyn, of Black River, that has appeared in EQMM, the country's leading mystery magazine, since he returned to this area after working in the field of health care marketing in lower Michigan, Chicago, Ill. and South Bend, Ind. He is a graduate of Alpena High School, Alpena Community College and the University of Michigan.

ogy, is that teachers are required to prepare students for jobs which don't exist yet.

She explained one of the ways to do this is by showing them the possibilities to do things with the skills they have. To help students do this O'Connor has implemented working with code.org into the school curriculum.

Code.org is a nonprofit education site which encourages computer science. Any student from kindergarten through high school and be-

dents interested and learning

According to code.org statistics Michigan has over 15,000 open computing jobs with only 2,098 computer science graduates. O'Connor is optimistic in seeing students from Alcona schools fill this need and is grateful Michigan is one of 25 states where students can count computer sciences for credit towards high school graduation.

To introduce students to code.org O'Connor arranged with math teachers for sec-

yond can utilize code.org to maneuver through basic steps to learn how to write code to program a computer.

Code.org is free and offers enjoyable programs for any age or skill level. One of the programs which appeals to grade school students is a simple coding exercise with Anna and Elsa of the Disney movie "Frozen." Young students are able to learn to write code to help Anna and Elsa create snowflakes and ice skate. Through the exercise students learn logic, math and cultivate creative confidence. Other programs such as having a dog fetch a ball or making a student's name light up and blink in different fonts keep older stuondary students involvement in the "Hour of Code 2014." The Hour of Code 2014 took place in December as a one hour introduction to computer science. It was designed to demystify code and show that anybody from age four to 104 can learn the basics.

"The math teachers, Rick Sedgwick, Maureen Villalobos, Abby Krentz and Tammy Nelson helped the kids through the Hour of Code, it was a total team effort and very cool," O'Connor said. "After students did their hour they didn't want to stop and I saw students writing programs when they had down time. They were learning."

"It's an easy way to connect their math initiative; they

have to know angles if they are writing a pin ball game or a game like 'Angry Birds.' Students need to know their geometry. The Hour of Code helped get everyone's feet wet digitally coding and what it can do for math education. This opens up so much opportunity for students that they don't even realize is there."

O'Connor has been invited to speak at the upcoming Michigan Association for Computer Users in Learning (MACUL) conference at Cobo Hall in Detroit, Mich. in March. MACUL is one of the biggest education conferences in Michigan drawing 4500 educators from around the state and region.

O'Connor will be giving a presentation on the 5K run/walk which was designed completely by students using computer assistance to map, budget, fundraise and cover every detail of the event from beginning to end. The 5K run/walk will take place in May.

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Tigers defeather two Eagles teams and take down Hurons

The Alcona varsity boys basketball team traveled to Fairview on January 27 to take on the Eagles and came away with a 65-51 win.

The game was competitive early on as the teams traded baskets and kept the score close all the way until the end of the first quarter which found the Tigers on top 15-10.

Alcona made some room by going on an 8-0 run to end the half at 33-24. Trenton LaVergne, Brandon Smigelski and Alec Link all contributing to the run.

The Alcona varsity girls basketball team took the floor in front of an enthusiastic home crowd against the Lady Eagles from Hale on January 29. It was all Alcona as the Lady Tigers turned up the heat at both ends to finish the night with a convincing 55-8 win over the Eagles.

In the first quarter, Torie Harmon got Alcona's offense rolling when she hit a bucket four seconds into the game and triple a few minutes later. The Lady Tigers clamped down on any offensive attempts by Hale holding them at 19-5 by the end of the period. It was more of the same in the second quarter as Alcona's lead soared to 32-6 by the sound of the half-time buzzer.

How to make your bathroom safer

Dear Savvy Senior,

What tips do you recommend for making a bathroom safer and more functional for seniors. My 79-year-old mother slipped and fell getting out of the shower last month, and I'd like to modify her bathroom a bit with some safety features that can help protect her.

Searching Daughter

Dear Searching,

Because more accidents and injuries happen in the bathroom than any other room in the house, this is a very important room to modify for aging in place. Depending on your mom's needs, here are some tips for each part of the bathroom that can make it safer and easier to use.

• Flooring: To avoid slipping, a simple fix is to get nonskid bath rugs for the floors. Or if you want to put in a new floor get slip-resistant tiles, rubber or vinyl flooring, or install wall-to-wall carpet-

• Lighting: Good lighting is also very important, so install the highest wattage bulbs allowed for your mom's bathroom fixtures, and get a plug-in nightlight that automatically turns on when the room gets dark.

 Bathtub/shower: To make bathing safer, purchase a rubber suction-grip mat, or put down adhesive nonskid tape on the tub/ shower floor. And have a carpenter install grab bars in and around the tub/shower for support.

If your mom uses a shower curtain, install a screw or bolt-mounted curtain rod, versus a tension-mounted rod, so that if she loses her balance and grabs the shower curtain the rod won't spring

If your mom has mobility issues or balance problems, get her a shower or bathtub seat so she can bathe from a seated position. In addition, you may also want to get a handheld, adjustable-height showerhead installed that will make washing while sitting down easier.

Another, pricier option is to install a walk-in-bathtub or a prefabricated curbless shower. Walk-in tubs have a door in front that provides a much lower threshold to step over than a standard tub. They also typically have a built-in seat, handrails and a slip resistant bottom, and some have therapeutic spa features with whirlpool water jets and/or bubble massage air jets.

Curbless showers have no threshold to step over, and typically come with a built-in seat, grab bars, slip resistant floors and an adjustable handheld showerhead. Prefabricated curbless showers and walk-in-tubs typically cost anywhere between \$2,500 and \$10,000 installed.

· Toilet: Most toilets are about 14 to 16 inches high which can be an issue for many people with arthritis,

back, hip or knee problems. To raise the toilet height, which can make sitting down and getting back up a little easier, you can purchase a raised toilet seat that clamps to the toilet bowl, and/or purchase toilet safety rails that sit on each side of the seat for support. Or, you can install an ADA compliant toilet that ranges between 17 and 19 inches high.

• Faucets: If your mom has twist handles on the sink, bathtub or shower faucets. replace them with lever handle faucets. They're easier to operate, especially for seniors with arthritis or limited

hand strength. Also note that it only takes 130-degree water to scald someone, so turn her hot water heater down to 120 degrees.

• Entrance: If your mom needs a wider bathroom entrance to accommodate a walker or wheelchair, install some "swing clear" offset hinges on the door which will widen the doorway an additional two inches.

Emergency assistance: As a safety precaution, purchase a waterproof phone for the bathroom or get a medical alert device (SOS emergency

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Great Backyard Bird Count needs participants

Residents of Iosco and Alcona counties once again have the opportunity to submit valuable data about local wintering birds during the 18th annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) to be held February 13-16.

"Our November and December weather conditions proved to be rather mild compared to last year," said Peggy Ridgway, local ambassador for the national event. "However, January seemed to make up for our earlier lack of snow cover," she added.

According to Ridgway many area residents contacted her about the absence of the regular "feeder birds" visiting their backyard feeding stations. "Perhaps in early winter the birds were enjoying the natural supply of food sources available during the absence of snow cover," Ridgway said. "However, when the snows came in January, many feathered friends returned to the seeds and suet supplied by human providers.'

In 2013 the GBBC went worldwide for the first time.

call button) that your mom could wear in case she falls and needs to call for help.

You can find all of the products suggested in this column at either medical supply stores, pharmacies, bigbox stores, home improvement stores, hardware and plumbing supply stores as well as online.

Online reports from all over the globe accounted for at least one third of the total number of bird species on the planet. According to Audubon chief scientist, Gary Langham, "Technology has made it possible for people everywhere to unite around a shared love of birds and a commitment to protecting them."

Between February 13-16, observers are asked to spend at least 15 minutes watching one or all four days.

There are no physical boundary limits. Folks are encouraged to report birds seen at their feeders, in their yards, neighborhoods, parks, wooded areas, or along rivers and shorelines.

Each daily observation is reported online to the headquarters at Cornell Lab of Ornithology at birdcount.org. Easy submission instructions guide the observer through the process. Online I.D. is also available for those unsure of certain species identification. Pictures may also be submitted by observers.

While observing, one should note the date, time, number of birds seen of each species, and any other important things they noticed during the observation. For each day observers need to complete new online data

During the past 11 years Alcona and Iosco counties have had strong participation in the GBBC and have supplied researchers with data concerning local bird populations just prior to the massive spring migrations.

Residents seeking additional information are encouraged to contact Ridgway at (989) 739-5674 in the evenings.

wish and the seeds get blown away.



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

StarWatch By Gary Becker - Groundhog Day: Not the Movie

💃 · My wife and I have three rabbits as pets. My favorite is Skye Blue, a female Dutch, who loves to sit on my lap and receive my famous "chiropractic" bunny massages. With a body temperature of 104 degrees F., you can image the workouts Skye has gotten lately with the cold weather that we have been experiencing. However, as anyone will attest, rabbits are fairly low on the mammalian food chain, designed to duck and cover, evade, and outrun their predators. They aren't the sharpest tools in the shed, but they are, in reality, quite loving creatures. Easter is their time, but another member of the rodent family is getting top billing right now.

It's the slow moving, and even slower thinking groundhog. They make lagomorphs look like virtual Einsteins, and in addition, rather than just delivering eggs, groundhogs decide weather" winter is staying or going. No rodent should have to live under that kind of pressure. The badger is the European equivalent, but in America, groundhogs were adopted as the soothsaying marvels that were given this opportunity to excel, and about 40 percent of the time, they get it right. It's all about roots, and the fact that groundhogs are burrowing creatures that have the opportunity of observing how roots and tubers are growing, whether they are fattening ahead of schedule, indicating an early spring, or are falling behind in their timetable, which means more winter lies ahead. A highly chatty groundhog named Punxsutawney Phil, and others across the country, make this prediction on February 2. Now add the sun to the mix. 

- On Feb. 19, 1473, Nicolaus Copernicus is born in Torun, Poland, on the Vistula River. Revered as the father of modern astronomy, Copernicus was the first European scientist to propose that Earth and other planets revolve around the sun.
- On Feb. 22, 1819, Spanish minister Do Luis de Onis and U.S. Secretary of State John Quincy Adams sign the Florida Purchase Treaty, in which Spain agrees to cede the remainder of its old province of Florida to the United States. The Treaty put Florida into U.S. hands at no cost beyond the U.S. assumption of \$5 million in claims by U.S. citizens against Spain.
- On Feb. 21, 1926, glamorous Swedish actress Greta Garbo makes her U.S. screen debut in "The Torrent." Unlike many of her contemporaries, the Nordic beauty successfully made the transition to sound after becoming a star during the silent film era.
- On Feb. 18, 1964, the United States cuts off military assistance to Britain, France and Yugoslavia in retaliation for their continuing trade with communist Cuba. The action was chiefly symbolic, but represented the continued U.S. effort to destabilize the Cuban regime of Fidel Castro.
- On Feb. 20, 1974, Reg Murphy, an editor of The Atlanta Constitution, is kidnapped. Kidnapper William Williams drove Murphy around the city, stopping to phone in ransom demands to the newspaper. Managing editor G. James Minter delivered the money to Williams, and Murphy was released. After being caught, Williams was sentenced to 40 years for kidnapping and extortion.

• On Feb. 16, 1984, Bill Johnson becomes the first American man to win an Olympic gold medal in downhill skiing, a sport long dominated by European athletes. Johnson quickly became a national hero, though his fame was shortlived and he never again competed in the Olympics.

• On Feb. 17, 1996, in the final game of a six-game match, world chess champion Garry Kasparov triumphs over Deep Blue, IBM's chess-playing computer, and wins the match, 4-2. However, Deep Blue would go on to defeat Kasparov in a rematch the following year.


