lcona School Board receives unexpected funds

The Alcona Community School Board of Education members and administrators are breathing a little easier these days thanks to an unexpected payment of over \$100,000.

A total of \$113,619 came from the state of Michigan from adjustments the state made for a period of 12 years, from 2003 to 2015.

Superintendent Shawn Thornton said the adjustment was made from equalization values which were changed on a county level per household taxable value but were never changed by the state over the 12 year period.

Margaret Negro, business manager for the school board, said amounts are adjusted periodically and it was normal to see some adjustment but in smaller amounts. "We had no idea this amount was coming in. It just appears on our state aid for prior year adjustments," Negro said.

Thornton said the \$113,619 amount was larger than usual because of the amount of years the adjustment reflected.

"On June 30, 2015, we approved a budget with ap-

proximately a four percent fund balance. That is less than one month of operating expenses for our school district. With this budget adjustment, which is a result of a combination of changes in revenues and expenditures, our estimated fund balance has increased to \$669,474 on June 30, 2016."

"We are pleased with this positive change because our auditors recommend at least a 15 percent fund balance and this budget adjustment raises our fund balance up to approximately 8.8 percent rather than the four percent which was riskier," Thornton said.

Other adjustments were made to the budget at the school board meeting on Monday, Nov. 9, bringing the total of increased local and state revenues for the school to \$406,330.

There were also changes to the budget for expenses, the majority of which covered new staff hires necessary when some faculty left prior to the start of the school year.

Negro and Thornton explained revenue budget adjustments which came locally such as a positive \$131,000 which really has no effect on increase from the reach

the budget and is a flow higher grant from the Michithrough amount for insurance premiums. The school board expenses for it on the budget, but the employees pay it back.

There is also a positive amount of \$2,500 which came from athletic fees paid to the school system.

Negative amounts of \$15,000 for the school success program and \$11.138 from taxable value changes at the county level were also noted and deducted on the revenue budget adjustment.

Thornton said the \$15,000 was because the school success program is now in its second year at the school so no start up funds were necessary.

State sources of revenue adjustment reflect the current year adjustment to state aid which includes \$7,391 per pupil, the addition of a vocational education category, increased at-risk funding, and removal of performance and best practice categories bringing in an amount of \$180,349. This amount came in with the unexpected \$113,619 for the adjusted state valuation.

"The at-risk fund was statewide and is allocated by the state based on student







parking lots, drainage, fencing and other items not covered by insurance will be paid for using the millage funds.

"We are being very prudent with the millage funds the public has entrusted with us," Campbell said. "That's one of the reasons we are encouraging attendance at the open house so people can see firsthand the facility and grounds where their road crews are based."

With all due appreciation for the temporary facilities used over the past two years, it will be so much more efficient when the base of operations in one place again.

"The community support, the cooperation with Alcona schools for renting us space in their repair facility, Ken Manning for leasing a truck storage site, local business and outside vendors being flexible and responsive to our needs, and the immediate and ongoing response from other road commissions in offering to lend and/or sell us equipment at fair prices has helped us get to this point," Campbell said. "I can't imagine how much longer or challenging the process would have been without that help."

The new steel-frame structure is 18,500 square feet and is smaller than the old building, which was 19,600 square feet. "Unlike the old building, which was outdated and dysfunctional, the new building was designed to use the square footage wisely and more closely meet the needs of how we do operate now," Campbell said.










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How to guard against deadly aortic aneurysms

Dear Savvy Senior,

My father died several years ago, at the age of 76, from a stomach aneurysm, which now has me wondering. What are my risk factors of getting this, and what can I do to protect myself, as I get older?

Just Turned 60

Dear Just,

Stomach aneurysms, also known as "abdominal aortic aneurysms," are very dangerous and the third leading cause of death in men over 60. They also tend to run in families, so having had a parent with this condition makes you much more vulnerable yourself.

An abdominal aortic aneurysm (or AAA) is a weak area in the lower portion of the aorta, which is the major artery that carries blood from the heart to the rest of the body. As blood flows through the aorta, the weak area bulges like a balloon and can burst if it gets too big, causing life-threatening internal percent of AAAs that rupture are fatal, but the good news is that more than nine out of 10 that are detected early are treatable.

Around 200,000 people are diagnosed with AAAs each year, but estimates suggest that another two million people may have it but not realize it. The factors that can put you at increased risk

• Smoking: Ninety percent of people with an AAA smoke or have smoked. This is the number one risk factor and one you can avoid.

• Age: Your risk of getting an AAA increases significantly after age 60 in men, and after age 70 in women.

• Family history: Having a parent or sibling who has had an AAA can increase your risk to around one in four.

• Gender: AAAs are five times more likely in men than in women. • Health factors: Athero-

sclerosis, also known as hardening of the arteries,

bleeding. In fact, nearly 80 high blood pressure and high cholesterol levels also increase your risk.

Because AAAs usually start small and enlarge slowly, they rarely show any symptoms, making them difficult to detect. However, large AAAs can sometimes cause a throbbing or pulsation in the abdomen, or cause abdominal or lower back pain.

The best way to detect an AAA is to get a simple, painless, 10-minute ultrasound screening test. All men over age 65 that have ever smoked, and anyone over 60 with a first-degree relative (father, mother or sibling) who has had an AAA should talk to their doctor getting screened.

You should also know that most health insurance plans cover AAA screenings, as does Medicare to beneficiaries with a family history of AAAs, and to men between the ages of 65 and 75 who have smoked at least 100 cigarettes during their life.



If an AAA is detected during screening, how it's treated will depend on its size, rate of growth and your general health. If caught in the early stages when the aneurysm is small, it can be monitored and treated with medication. But if it is large or enlarging rapidly, you'll probably need surgery.

While some risk factors like your age, gender and family history are uncontrollable, there are a number of things you can do to protect yourself from AAA. For starters, if you smoke, you need to quit - see smokefree.gov or call (800) QUIT-NOW for help.

You also need to keep tabs

on your blood pressure and cholesterol levels, and if they are high you need to take steps to lower them through diet, exercise and if necessary, medication.

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

StarWatch By Gary Becker - Leonid Meteors Ascending

· Internet chatter about the Taurid meteor shower showed that it has produced some very nice fireballs. One of my friends, David Fisherowski, who lives in SE PA, imaged nine meteors on the night of Nov. 8/9, a really nice catch for a meteor stream that produces about five events per hour under optimal conditions. Taurid activity will continue throughout November but at diminished rates. Leonid meteors follow, but this shower is not for the faint of heart. Insomniacs, early risers, or the individual who just likes it cold, please step forward. Leonid activity peaks on the morning of November 18 between midnight and dawn. Fueled from the debris of Comet Tempel-Tuttle, it was the Leonid storm which triggered the birth of meteor astronomy on November 11-12, 1833. On the 12th, between the hours of 2 a.m. and dawn, Leonids literally rained down on North America with the highest rates estimated at 100,000 shooting stars per hour. That's about 30 events each second. The Leonids for 1866 and 1966 had maximum numbers of 5000 and 160,000 meteors per hour respectively. Enhanced returns also occurred from 1999 through 2002, with 2001 being the most productive year for East Coast observers. Now activity has returned to normal with about 5-10 Leonids visible each hour on maximum morning from suburbia. Face SE after midnight and view towards the zenith, usually the darkest part of the sky. If Leonid activity is present, the paths of the shooting stars will trace back to the sickle of Leo the Lion, a reversed question mark which outlines the Leo's head. Leonids really fly; they are the fastest meteors that can be seen with entrance velocities of nearly 45 miles per second. Dress for winter, making sure that head, hands, and feet are well protected. Hefty sleeping bags are a must-have item, including numerous hand warmers, and an air mattress to elevate your body off the cold ground. Here's to being a happy human icicle by dawn's early light on Nov. 18. www.astronomy.org
