Alcona Schools offers beginning band

After six years without a music program at Alcona Community Schools, the sound of instruments being played will once again be heard through school hallways.

A beginning band program will be available to sixth and seventh grade students starting this month, according to high school principal Dan O'Connor.

An informational meeting for parents and students of those grades will be held on

Wednesday, Aug. 10 from 6 to 7 p.m. at the school. During the meeting students will be able to meet the new band instructor, Ray Reynolds.

Employees of Marshall Music Company, will provide information and instruments for students in order to determine what they would like to play. Instruments can be purchased or rented through the Michigan-based company. Reynolds hopes many of the students interested will be able to take their instrument of choice home with them that evening.

O'Connor explained the school also has some instruments available and is in the process of getting them refurbished. "Obviously they haven't been used for a few years so we are working with a music company to bring them up-to-date and make sure they are high enough quality to get students started," O'Connor said.

A band camp for all interested sixth and seventh grade students will be held the week of August 22.

During band camp Reynolds will meet with students for a half hour each day which will allow him time to teach how to assemble and care for the instrument, how to hold the instrument properly and form an embouchure -- the correct way to use facial muscles and shaping of the lips to the mouthpiece of woodwind and brass instruments, et cetera. Students will also learn to play a few notes.

Reynolds explained that band camp was designed so he can get everyone on the same level when they begin class. Reynolds comes to Alcona Community Schools with 30 years of teaching music experience. He recently retired after spending 26 years with Alpena Public Schools.

Reynolds is excited to begin working with Alcona students. "I'm looking forward to the opportunity to be a part of the Alcona community. I know the school has a beautiful auditorium and we are looking forward to getting music back in there. Years ago Alcona had an amazing music program and it will be good to get that back up and running," he said.

The dilemma of not having any music program offered to students was brought to light last year by a student, Ben Thomas, when he decided to make the subject his eighth grade Make a Difference (MAD) project titled "Bring Back the Music to Alcona."

A band program has not been available at the school since 2010 due to declining enrollment combined with less state funding and the absence of a qualified teacher.

Thomas wanted to tell the community about the lack of a music program because he felt many of them didn't know. He also began raising funds for the program and has raised \$10,250 since beginning the project last January in hopes to earn the \$60,000 needed to hire a full time

Boat parade of lights celebrates Brownlee Lake

There is nothing quite like spending a quiet evening by the lake, but it takes on a magical quality when a parade of decorated boats light up the water at dusk.

That's exactly what will happen in Lincoln on Saturday, Aug. 6 during the 13th annual Brownlee Lake Parade.

The parade first began as a fundraiser to support the Brownlee Lake Association and to bring people together. Twelve years later it has become a local summer tradition.

There is no cost to enter a boat in the parade, but a 50/50 raffle during the DJ'ed event acts as a fundraiser for the association.

Brownlee Lake is a public lake which covers 87 acres with a shoreline of 7,700 feet. It is a spring fed lake which flows into the east Pine River. Like most lakes in Michigan, it was formed by movements of glacier. Native Americans used the lake for water and fishing to support their villages.

According to Ed Buelow, secretary of the Brownlee Lake Association, in the 1800s and early 1900s set-

tlers and residents of the surrounding area of Lincoln, such as Killmaster, brought their horse and buggy to fill wooden barrels with drinking water from the lake. Today, the lake is surrounded by homes and cottages and residents use the lake for swimming, fishing and boating.

The Brownlee Lake Association is made up of 23 families that live on the lake and five families which don't live on the lake, but love the area and are committed to keeping the lake a healthy aquatic environment.

In the late 1990s and early 2000s, residents living around the lake noticed a reduction in fish population and a rise in lake weeds. The Brownlee Lake Association was formed to address those concerns and has been actively working on a healthier lake environment ever since, Buelow explained.

Buelow said the association got its 501(c) 3 federal

He was also active with the Elks, Moose, Eagles, Masons and AMVETS, 24th Infantry Division Association.

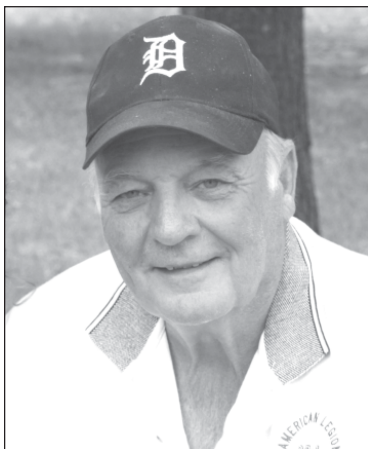

band instructor for the high school.

According to O'Connor, the decision to start the program came from Thomas' fund raising effort and Reynolds hearing about the situation and contacting the school with interest in instructing. Although Thomas had initially wanted the program to involve high school students so he could take advantage of the lessons, Reynolds recommended sixth and seventh graders instead.

"He thought starting with a high school band could potentially be really difficult since they would be starting at the same point as a sixth-grader would start. To be attractive down the road to possibly having a full time band teacher Reynolds felt this would be the way to start," O'Connor said.

O'Connor has been keeping Thomas in the loop as things have progressed. "Ben (Thomas) said he knew all

along when he started his project that the music program may miss him, but the long term to potentially start a music program was the goal of his make a difference project. He understands it might not be built fast enough to get him (instructionally) involved, but then again, who knows," O'Connor said.

The funds Thomas has raised will probably be used for instrument reconditioning and to help get equipment and sheet music. "We talked to Ben and stated the funds raised will not go towards wages. We feel the instructor's wages is the school's responsibility and would rather those funds go to bring the music program back up to speed," O'Connor said. He explained Thomas' fundraiser is still on-going as the more the school has to work with for equipment the faster the program may grow.

The beginning band program will be offered to stu-

dents twice a week as a model to start the year and, possibly, expand to include eighth grade students in the future. It will be integrated as part of a student's elective course time so it will not impact any core classes, but offer an opportunity to engage in a different type of curriculum.

Initially, the school is optimistic that at least 10 students from each grade will take advantage of the program, but O'Connor said the school didn't really have a set number in mind. "It's early and people are probably still going to take some time to wrap their minds around having music back again so this may take a little time to grow and we have to be patient with the process."

"I was in band so this is something that means a lot to me to have available for students. There is a lot of research which talks about the benefits music has on education, self-esteem and, even, productivity later in life. It teaches so many key characteristics of successful and hardworking people. The idea is to build a school which has a lot of different avenues for students to feel connected. This is a super small step, but we are trying to get this right and build the foundation," O'Connor said.

nonprofit status in 2004 and commissioned a comprehensive water study at a cost of \$13,000 a few years after.

In 2012 the Brownlee Lake Association installed an aeration system at a cost of \$65,000. The system consists of numerous electric powered shore based air compressors that pump air through weighted distribution hoses which lay on the lake bottom. The system is turned on each April when the ice thaws and is shut off in November.

"The air hoses connect to diffuser assemblies that have five membrane diffuser discs. Compressed air comes out through tiny holes on the diffuser discs, creating a column of small bubbles which rise to the surface of the lake. The bubbles create a large circular motion causing the water on the lake bottom to move to the surface where oxygen is reintroduced," Buelow said.

He explained the process speeds up the decomposi-

tion of organic material which improves the quality of water and creates a healthier fishery.

Since the aeration system was installed 2,000 native strain bluegill and 1,500 hybrid bluegill fish have been released into the lake.

Last year the aeration system was temporarily shut down to readjust some diffusers that had been inadvertently flipped over from boat anchors and to rearrange 21,000 feet of hoses in a new configuration through the lake. Since then all compressors and diffusers are running fine, Buelow explained.

"Continued operation of the aeration system and stocking of the lake fishery all comes with a cost. The average annual cost for electrical is \$5,000 plus \$3,000 for equipment maintenance. To achieve the goal of supporting Brownlee Lake it takes the continued tenacity of those who love and live in the area. The Brownlee Lake Association continues to work hard to keep the lake an asset to the surrounding communities," Buelow said.

couraged to watch the parade from the boat launch area located on the southwest corner of the lake across from the Alcona County Road Commission building, the public beach area, or various parks around the lake.

Annual dues to the Brownlee Lake Association for lake owners is \$120 per year and \$60 per year for non-lake members. Participating business members are awarded with framed certificates for \$50, \$100 or \$250 donations. Other association fundraisers include golf and bowling outings and a September garage sale. The association is open to anyone who wants to support the public lake for all to enjoy in a safe and healthy manner.

Dear Savvy Senior,
Is acupuncture a proven treatment for arthritis pain? I have a lot of back and neck pain and am wondering if it's worth trying. What all can you tell me about acupuncture?

Afraid of Needles

Dear Afraid,

Many well-designed studies over the years – funded by the National Institutes of Health – have found acupuncture to be very effective in easing arthritis pain, and can help with a variety of other ailments too.

First used in China more than 2,000 years ago, acupuncture has become increasingly popular in the United States over the past 40 years.

While acupuncture isn't a cure-all treatment, it is a safe, drug-free option for relieving many different types of pain including osteoarthritis, low back pain, neck pain, migraine headaches, fibromyalgia, postoperative pain, ten-

nis elbow, carpal tunnel syndrome, dental pain, menstrual cramps and more. Studies have also shown that it can be helpful in treating asthma, depression, digestive disorders, addictions, menopause symptoms like hot flashes, and nausea caused by chemotherapy or anesthesia.

Exactly how or why acupuncture works is still not fully understood, but it's based on the traditional Eastern theory that vital energy flows through pathways in the body, and when any of these pathways get blocked, pain and illness result. Acupuncture unblocks the pathways to restore health.

However, today most U.S. medical doctors tend to believe that acupuncture works because it stimulates the nerves causing the release of endorphins, which are the body's natural painkiller hormones. It's also shown to increase blood circulation, decrease inflammation and stimulate the immune system.

If the thought of getting needles stuck into your body makes you a little uneasy, you'll be happy to know that an acupuncture treatment is nothing like getting a shot. In fact, it's quite relaxing.

Here are some additional points you should know:

- **The needles:** They're solid, sterile and disposable (used only once), and as thin as a cat's whisker. The number of needles used for each treatment can vary anywhere from a few, up to a dozen or more. And where the needles are actually stuck depends on the condition being treated, but they are typically inserted about one-quarter to one-inch deep, and are left in place for about 20 minutes. After placement, the needles are sometimes twirled or manipulated, or stimulated with electricity or heat.

- **Does it hurt?** You may feel a brief, sharp sensation when the needle is inserted, but generally it's not painful. Once the needle is in place,

however, you may feel a tingling sensation, numbness, mild pressure or warmth.

- **Treatments:** How many treatments you'll need will depend on the severity of your condition – 12 treatments done weekly or biweekly is very common. It's also important to know that acupuncture can be used in conjunction with other conventional medical treatments, or by itself.

- **Cost and coverage:** The cost per treatment typically runs anywhere from \$50 to \$100 or more. Unfortunately, most private health plans including Medicare, do not cover acupuncture.

To find an acupuncturist in your area ask your doctor for a referral, or you can do a search online at the National Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine (nccaom.org) and acufinder.com. Both sites provide a national database of certified and/or licensed practitioners. Or visit the American Academy of Medical Acupuncturists (medical-acupuncture.org), which offers a directory of MDs who are certified to practice acupuncture.

Coast Guard urges caution, safety tips for paddle sports enthusiasts

For a lot of people summertime in Michigan means bon fires, cookouts, family vacations and time on the water. For many it also means trying new ways to enjoy spending time on the water – whether it is boating, canoeing, kayaking or the newest water-related activity, paddleboarding.



Seth Thorson remaining in the summer season, Coast Guard units are raising awareness of the dangers associated with paddle sports and are looking to reduce the number of paddlecraft related injuries," Thorson said.

According to Thorson, the U.S. Coast Guard has officially classified stand up paddleboards as a vessel and all standup paddlers are required to have a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket

people fall off of a paddleboard typically it goes one way and you go the other way – if you aren't wearing a life jacket and can't get to the paddleboard, that is a potentially dangerous problem.

"One case a day is way, way too much for something that is easily fixable – put a life jacket on; at the very least, have one with you... Also, don't think you are something you are not – don't go out past what your experience level is," Thorson said.

Thorson explained there are many steps that can be taken to ensure safety so beginners to experienced paddlecraft enthusiasts can be safe while on the water.

- Wear a life jacket. Due to the nature of paddlecraft, they are more prone to capsizing and paddlers should be prepared to enter the water at any time. Getting back into a kayak or canoe from the water can be exhausting or even impossible due to injuries. By wearing a Coast Guard approved life jacket, getting back into a kayak or

"With all of the 27 cases there was a common theme – no one was wearing life jackets," Thorson said. "These figures are just Coast Guard stats and don't count inland lakes and stats from other responding agencies."

Considering the East Tawas Coast Guard station typically responds to an average of 20-60 rescues in a summer (depending on a variety of variables), the recent number of responses for paddlecraft incidents is considered high. "With several weekends

type III (personal flotation device or PFD) for each person, a sound signal device, a visual distress signal and a light on board.

"We aren't looking to give out tickets," Thorson said. "Our sole purpose is to educate people on safe practices... A lot of people don't understand that weather on the Great Lakes is unpredictable – a storm can pick up quickly and that can keep people from getting back safely. Additionally, when

- Have reliable communication devices. It is important to have a reliable means of communication such as a sound producing device, waterproof cell phone or marine radio. Having these forms of communication will greatly increase chances of being located in the event of an emergency. Day and night visible flares, a signal mirror and a waterproof whistle or air horn can also aid emergency responders in their search efforts. Boaters are also encouraged to purchase, register and carry a personal locator beacon (PLB), which will instantly notify responders of the location when activated during a distress situation.
- Get educated. By taking a paddlesport education course before heading you individuals can learn paddle

John Millen dies at Duluth home

Sudden Illness Takes Prominent Lumberman Was Long Manager of Big Lumber

August 3, 1916 - George Rutson Thursday received a message stating that John Millen was dead in Duluth, Minn.

Mr. Millen was for many years superintendent of Alger, Smith & Co's. extensive lumbering operations in Alcona county, and the time was when his name was a familiar one to every citizen

of the county. Many of our older citizens still remember him as the "Jack" Millen, whom they knew in those early days of lumbering. His last visit to Alcona county was in 1914 to the Harrisville Home Coming, when he shook hands with many of his former friends and employees.

A Duluth paper of July 28

earlier in the day, became worse early yesterday and he lapsed into unconsciousness. Mr. Millen is survived by a widow and two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Fridlender of Aberdeen, Wash., and Mrs. Harriet Bayly of Sarnia, Ont. Funeral arrangements will be announced today. **Progressive Lumberman** One of the active, progres-

sive men in the lumber industry of the Northwest was John Millen. He was distinctively a self-made man, having risen from the ranks, working hard for everything he got, and his prominent position in the business world was the result of patient, persistent effort.

Mr. Millen was born March 12, 1849, in Lambton county, Ontario, Canada, the son of John and Sarah (Hawley) Millen. His grandfather was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, while his father served in the American army in the war of 1812. The family came to the United States, finally settling in St. Clair, Michigan, where Mr. Millen completed a common school education.

At the age of 15 he obtained a position working in the woods for the firm of F. & S. Moore of Detroit, Michigan. This was the beginning of his career as a lumberman.

Promotions Follow After serving three years with the Moores, he became associated with General Alger in the AuSable river district, and for six seasons he was employed as a scaler and worked on the booms. He then became foreman of the lumber camps for Moore & Alger, and later had charge of the general business for R. A. Alger & Co. He became associated with Mr. Alger in 1868.


Mr. Millen was vice-president and general manager of Alger, Smith & Co.; president of the Alger-Sullivan Lumber company; president and general manager of the Manistique Lumbering company, and president and general manager of the Duluth & Northern Minnesota Railway.

Chris Yockey & Sons rebuild at once

August 3, 1916 - Acting with characteristic promptness, Chris Yockey has decided to replace at once the hardware and implement buildings of Yockey & Sons, destroyed by fire. Their first intention was to build a warehouse for temporary use and later to erect a store building on the corner formerly occupied by the implement shed.

Plans for the new buildings, work which begins today, call for a main building 32x64 feet two stories with an annex 17x32 feet on the south end. The office building 16x24 feet will be located on the west side of the main store. The roofs will be of corrugated steel and the sides of rock-face siding. Steel siding and ceiling will be employed in the interior finish.

T. A. Ouderkirk, of Alpena, will supervise the work.



StarWatch By Gary Becker - High Time for Looking Up

The sky this week remains virtually moonless, and this gives us another excellent opportunity to view some of the fainter star patterns. The focus is overhead. Facing east, the brightest star of the Great Summer Triangle (GST), Vega (see StarWatch for July 10) will be nearing the zenith. Below and to the right of Vega is a small parallelogram of stars that represents the strings of the harp. Just below Vega, and slightly left, is a faint star called Epsilon Lyrae. If you look at it with binoculars, the star will be easily split into two luminaries. A good telescope at about 100 power will split each star into two additional components. It is rightfully named the double-double. To Vega's left and below is the faintest celebrity of the three, Deneb, which in Arabic means "tail," the tail of Cygnus the Swan. Do not look for a swan from suburban skies, but imagine a cross lying on its side. The staff of the Northern Cross points along the backbone of the Milky Way, so even if the gossamer star fields of our galaxy are invisible because of light pollution, our galaxy is mentally traceable from its rising position in the NNE to where it meets the horizon in the south. Scanning the Cygnus region with binoculars will reveal how the density of stars increases along the Milky Way's path, allowing its heavenly arc to be traceable from suburbia on most summer evenings. Facing north about two fists held at arm's length, to the left of Vega will be Hercules the Strongman (west of the zenith). The four faint stars that outline his torso are the most distinctive and are called the Keystone. Just like the GST, the Keystone is not sanctioned by astronomers as an official constellation, but the pattern is famous enough to have a name. Scan the left side of the Keystone with binoculars, looking for a small condensed fuzzy patch of light. When you find it, you'll be looking at a globular cluster named M13, an aggregate of over 300,000 old stars, 25,100 light years distant. The photons entering your eyes tonight left M13 when we as a species were first painting animals on cave walls. www.astronomy.org

Moments In Time

- On Aug. 16, 1896, while salmon fishing in Canada's Yukon Territory, George Carmack reportedly spots nuggets of gold in a creek bed. His lucky discovery sparked "Klondike Fever," the last great gold rush in the American West.
- On Aug. 17, 1915, Charles F. Kettering, co-founder of Dayton Engineering Laboratories Company (DELCO), is issued a U.S. patent for his "engine-starting device" -- the first electric ignition mechanism for automobiles. Prior to his invention, drivers had to use iron hand cranks to start their engines.
- On Aug. 20, 1920, seven men, including legendary football star Jim Thorpe, meet in Canton, Ohio, to organize a professional football league, the forerunner to the National Football League.
- On Aug. 19, 1953, the Iranian military, with the support and financial assistance of the United States, overthrows the government of Premier Mosaddeq and reinstates the Shah of Iran. Iran remained a Cold War ally of the U.S. until a revolution ended the Shah's rule in 1979.
- On Aug. 15, 1961, two days after sealing off free passage between East and West Berlin, East German authorities begin building the Berlin Wall to permanently close off access to the West. For the next 28 years, the heavily fortified Berlin Wall stood as the most tangible symbol of the Cold War.
- On Aug. 21, 1971, antiwar protestors associated with the Catholic Left raid draft offices in Buffalo, New York, and Camden, New Jersey, to confiscate and destroy draft records. The FBI and local police arrested 25 protestors.
- On Aug. 18, 1991, Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev is placed under house arrest during a coup by high-ranking members of his own government, military and KGB secret police. The coup collapsed three days later, but Gorbachev's days in power were numbered. He resigned in December 1991.

safety skills that could potentially save their life in an emergency. The Coast Guard Auxiliary offers the Paddlesports America Course, which is a four-hour classroom based introduction to paddling safety, techniques and safety strategies. Other hands-on courses are offered through the U.S. Power Squadrons, state departments of natural resources, local commercial outfitters and the American Canoe Association.

- File a float plan. Filing a float plan can be as simple as writing down a plan for a voyage and leaving it with a friend or family member not traveling on the voyage. Valuable float plan information includes where someone is going, where they are leaving from and returning to and how long they plan to be out. An electronic float plan can easily be filed using the Coast Guard mobile app available in the Apple app store and Google play.

- Lastly, Thorson said, be sure to include a waterproof sticker or label on each paddlecraft that includes name, phone number, address and emergency contact. This information can be valuable to those responding to an emergency.

He encouraged individuals who witness a paddlecraft related accident to notify emergency responders about the nature of the distress, number of people or vessels involved, provide a global positioning system (GPS) location or detailed description of the location and remain on scene to relay pertinent information or updates as they occur.
