Barton City resident faces five felonies, in jail without bond

A Barton City man has been charged with five felonies - two of which hold life sentences - for rape, kidnapping, possession of a firearm and resisting police last week.

Benjamin Allen Bell, 34, has been lodged in the Alcona County Jail without bond since his arraignment on Friday, April 29. He has been charged with criminal sexual conduct - first degree, kidnapping, felon in possession of a firearm, weapons felony firearm and resisting and obstructing

According to a press release from the Michigan State Police, Alpena post, Bell allegedly sexually assaulted and held a female captive in Alcona County on Thursday, April 28. The next day he accompanied the female to a doctor's appointment in Alpena at Mid-Michigan Hospital (formerly Alpena Medical Center). While at the appointment, she was able to contact a family member and explained what Bell had allegedly done.

A Michigan State Police trooper arrived at the doctor's office and contacted Bell, who allegedly became agitated. Bell allegedly punched the trooper and fled on foot to the Thunder Bay River and attempted to cross to the other side. The trooper pursued and was joined by other law enforcement officers. Bell returned to the river bank and allegedly threatened officers with a large stick. He then reentered the river and refused to come out. According to the press release, after approximately 45 minutes of negotiating, he exited the river and was arrested.

According to the state police, an additional charge of assaulting a police officer is being sought with the Alpena County Prosecutor. The name of the trooper that was allegedly assaulted was not released by the state police. The condition of the victim was not released.

Bell will have a probable cause hearing on May 11 and a preliminary exam is scheduled for May 18 at 11 a.m. Criminal sexual conduct first degree and kidnapping are each life offenses.

Work program helps special students

Trying to choose what line of work a high school student may be interested in going into after graduation can be a daunting task. It's even more challenging when the teenager is a special education student.

Five students at Alcona High School have a much better grasp on what to expect in the work world due to an on-site work program at the school.

Tyler Sytek, Charles LeCuyer, April Wilke, Lauren Banks and Frannie Brockwell are all seniors in special education who are getting handson work experience through learning a trade at the school.

Wilke, Banks and Brockwell are working in the kitchen as dishwashers and prep cooks. Sytek and LeCuyer are getting experience working in the school's bus garage.

Dan O'Connor, high school principal, said the school district was looking to diversify and enhance student experiences and thought about what the school had locally or on site. "As seniors it was time to get the students some hands on experience to build their skills and resumes so they could have real experience to talk with potential employers about after graduation," O'Connor said.

Sytek has been working with Mike Corn, district lead mechanic, for a few years. LeCuyer just began his training with Corn in January.

Corn said both young men are diligent about their work duties and commitment. "To get them to try to do things is easy. Sometimes communicating to them to make sure

how I want the job to get done such as physical limitations

Although their job is constantly changing to attend to the many tasks presented in the bus garage, each student has excelled in certain areas. Sytek always makes sure there is oil, transmission fluid, antifreeze and washer solvent available to the bus drivers. Corn said he doesn't even have to ask Sytek to do this anymore, he just does it.

LeCuyer has been working on seat repairs in the busses and has gotten quite quick at replacing the covers and seat foams. "He's doing a really good job at it with little or no instruction, which makes my inspections go through easier," Corn said. He explained the bus seats take a beating from the students who ride them daily.

Corn explained that Sytek has a few additional issues

is tricky, but other than that and vision issues which it's not a problem working present some challenges. "I with them at all," Corn said. work within their realm of abilities. If the job doesn't go at the pace I need it to I'll take over. I try to give Tyler all the same opportunities I give Charles. Tyler played football; he does everything the other kids do in school. It may take him a little longer but he knows if he can't lift something to get help. I try not to exclude him on anything," Corn said.

In addition to duties such as changing oil and balancing tires, the boys have used scanners to test alternators and Sytek has done some welding. They have also cleaned out the drains and

Alcohol factor in rollover incident

A downstate man was critically injured in a single vehicle accident last week in Millen Township.

According to a press release from the Alcona County Sheriff's Department, Patrick Fournier, 62, of Davison, Mich. was traveling east on M-72 at approximately 6:30 p.m. on Friday, April 29 when he lost control of his vehicle near Grosse Pointe Road.

His vehicle left the pavement and rolled over. Fournier was ejected from the vehicle and trapped under it. First responders from Barton City, Curran and Lincoln fire departments worked to extricate Fournier with Jaws of Life.

He was stabilized by Alcona EMS personnel and first responders and transported to a landing zone in a field on the south side of M-72 for a Life Flight helicopter to transport him to St. Mary's Hospital in Saginaw, Mich. Fournier was in critical condition due to injuries sustained in the incident and died on May 1.

According to the sheriff department's press release, alcohol "appears to be a factor in the accident." Alcona County Sheriff Sgt. Scott Stephenson and deputy Leonard Franklin were assisted at the scene by a trooper from the Michigan State Police.



Expedition Bound

Alpena Community College Marine Technology Instructor David Cummins has been selected as a 2016 Science Communication Fellow and will sail aboard Exploration Vessel (E/V) Nautilus during 2016 expedition. Cummins will join the Corps of Exploration aboard E/V Nautilus in June and July as they explore central California to the Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary.

Seventeen educators and 22 students from around the world have been selected from a competitive pool of applicants by the Ocean Exploration Trust (OET) to participate at sea during the 2016 Nautilus Exploration Program expedition. OET, a nonprofit founded by Dr. Robert Ballard in 2008, has the mission to explore the ocean, seeking out new discoveries in the fields of geology, biology, maritime history, archaeology, physics and chemistry while pushing the boundaries of STEM education and technological innovation.

"I am excited to have the opportunity to be a part of the Nautilus team," Cummins said. "I look forward to learning from this amazing group of world experts and integrating the knowledge and experience I will gain into our local schools and communities.'

As members of the Corps of Exploration, educators and students will stand watch alongside scientists and engineers, as well as participate in live interactions with shore-based audiences via Nautilus Live, a 24 hour web portal bringing expeditions from the field to future explorers on shore via telepresence technology at www.nautiluslive.org and via social media.

sewer lines in the garage, a job neither of them liked very much but knew it needed to be done and did it.

The boys were able to get some additional work experience when the Alcona County Road Commission was using the school bus garage to work on their trucks before the new road commission building was finished.

Wilke, Banks and Brockwell work under the guiding hand of Dawn LaLonde, lead cook at the high school, who said safety in the kitchen was key and the three girls did very well with safety precautions and know not to go near the hot ovens.

Among their duties is washing trays, silverware, pots and pans as well as some food preparation.

Brockwell demonstrated her interest in food preparation by first placing pepperoni on large frozen pizzas and then going through a heavy flat of grapes making sure they were washed thoroughly and that all rotted fruit was tossed into a waste bin.

Each day about 240 lunches are prepared at the school and these three student workers are helpful to staff, Shelly Hoffmeyer and Kristi Kubbe who work with LaLonde. Both Hoffmeyer and Kubbe said the girls were awesome workers.

LaLonde, who has been working with the school for 23 years, said it wasn't her first time working with students in the kitchen and that she had done so a number of years ago for two students who went on to work in restaurants.

She said at first the girls

were a bit shy when they began working in the kitchen at the beginning of the school year, but they began to open up more as time went by. Now, they are like family and having a lot of fun on the job.

Responsibility goes handin-hand with the work experience and all students take their responsibilities on the job seriously. "The students have flourished in their work place and their confidence has increased dramatically. As with any student, when they are able to find their niche and feel a sense of belonging and ownership, they will thrive," O'Connor said. All five students said they enjoyed their hands-on learning experience and have learned more from the jobs than they would have in books. Three of the students, Sytek and LeCuyer, who are planning to study auto mechanics, and Brockwell, who is planning to study culinary arts, are looking forward to going to Michigan Career and Technical Institute in Plainwell, Mich., after graduation.

River Aux Sables Chapter, DAR

River Aux Sables Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution met at the home of Mimi McDonald in Oscoda recently for a presentation from Ruth Golm, president of the AuSable Valley Audubon Society, who spoke about the Sunrise Side Birding Tour and, specifically, the Piping Plover, which is an endangered species that only nests in Michigan from March to August, then flies south for the winter months.

The Piping Plover is a tiny brown and white bird, weighing about as much as a half a stick of butter. Plovers lay four eggs a year in the tall weeds by wetlands, or open rocky shores of the Great Lakes and uses its coloring to hide its nest from predators. Unfortunately, its size and accessibility make it an easy target.

Returning Plovers are monitored by orange banding, not by tracking devises. If their nests are disturbed, or the little birds feel that they are in danger, the parents will leave the nest before the eggs incubate and the young are lost unless Plover guardians can save them in time. One such nest was recovered this year in time, and all four eggs were successfully transferred to the Plover watch station in Pellston, Mich. to incubate. All of the nestlings hatched and raised to be able to fend for themselves and released to the wild.

In this area Plovers nest along Shoreline Park on the AuSable in Oscoda and Tawas Point. Oscoda had moved its fireworks so as not to disturb the four nesting pairs that were found along the shoreline. Two pair of adults left their nests anyway and the eggs never incubated. Another nest was destroyed by a loose dog, and the last nest was prey to a local fox.

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Free bike helmets to be given at family fun and safety event

A grant in the amount of \$1,890 was used to purchase 220 bicycle helmets by Pro Rider to be given to children during the event at Alcona Elementary School from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Helmets will be given free of charge to children attending the event until the supply is depleted.

The grant was provided by the Community Foundation of Northeast Michigan (CFNM). It was awarded to the Alcona Health Center Tiger Extension which hosts the event in collaboration with Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Alcona County (CANPAC).

In addition to the helmets, four new bicycles, courtesy of Wal-Mart, will be given away in a drawing.

Ivy Seminoff, medical assistant for Alcona Health Center Tiger Extension, said they were excited and hoped to

reach even more children than last year. "Last year's safety day was more successful than anyone imagined. We expect this year to be even better thanks to the $overwhelming\ response\ from$ generous people and businesses in our community," Seminoff said.

The generous community Seminoff was speaking of includes 15 vendors from community organizations that will share their expertise with students and families during the event as well as organizations who are donating supplies and food items.

Choosing an appropriate walking cane

Dear Savvy Senior,

I have severe arthritis in my knee and could use a walking cane to help me get around. Is there anything I should know about canes before I buy one?

Limping Linda

Dear Linda,

When it comes to choosing a cane for balance and support most people don't give it much thought, but they should. Walking canes come in hundreds of different styles, shapes and sizes today, so you need to take into account your needs and preferences to ensure you choose one that's appropriate for

The first thing you need to consider is how much support you need. That will help you determine the kind of cane you choose. The three basic types of canes you'll have to choose from include:

1. Straight canes: These are basic, single point canes that typically incorporate a rounded "crook" handle or

"L-shaped" handle. Usually made of lightweight aluminum or wood, most of the aluminum models are adjustable in height and some even fold

2. Offset-handle canes: These also are single point straight canes, but come with a swan neck curve in the upper part of the shaft that puts the user's weight directly over the cane tip for added stability. These canes are typically aluminum, adjustable-height and come with a flat, soft grip handle that's easy on the hands.

Both straight canes and offset-handle canes are best suited for people who have a slight walking impairment.

3. Quad canes: Also called broad based canes, these work best for people who need maximum weight bearing and support. Quad canes comes with four separate tips (some have three tips) at the base, they usually have an offset flat handle, and can remain standing when you

ergonomic let go of it which is very convenient.

Once you decide on the type of cane, you need to make sure it fits. Stand up with your arms hanging straight down at your side. The top of the cane should line up with the crease in your wrist, so your arm is slightly bent at the elbow when you grip the cane.

The cane should also have a rubber tip at the bottom to prevent slipping. A worn or torn rubber tip is dangerous, so check the tip frequently to ensure it's in good condition and replace it when necessary. Rubber tips come in different sizes depending on the shaft diameter, and can usually be purchased in multipacks at your local pharmacy.

The grip is also very important, so choose one that's ergonomically designed, or one that has a molded rubber or foam grip that's comfortable to hold on to.

And if you travel much, consider getting a folding

cane that can be packed or stored away easily.

When using a cane, it should always be held in the hand opposite of the leg that needs support. For example, if your knee pain is on your left side, you should use the cane in your right hand. The cane should then move forward as you step forward with the bad leg.

If you have to go up stairs, you should lead with the good leg. And when you go down stairs, you should put your cane on the step first and then step down with your bad leg.

The Mayo Clinic offers a slide show at mayoclinic.com/health/canes/ HA00064 that will show you how to choose and use a cane. It's also a smart idea to work with a physical thera-

You can buy canes at drugstores, discount retailers, medical supply stores and online, usually between \$10 and \$50. You'll also be happy to know that Medicare covers canes with a written prescription from a physician.

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

Invasive species grant program accepts applications

2016 are now being accepted through the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program, with an anticipated \$3.6 million available to applicants. The program – a joint effort of the Michigan departments of Natural Resources (DNR), Environmental Quality (DEQ), and Agriculture and Rural Development - is part of a statewide initiative launched in 2014 to help prevent and control invasive species in Michigan.

The 2016 grant program handbook, outlining focus areas and information on how to apply is available on the DNR website www.michigan.-

Funding proposals for gov/dnr-grants. A live webinar explaining the 2016 grant process and focus areas is scheduled for Thursday, May 12, from 2 to 3 p.m. Interested applicants can register for the webinar at www.michigan.gov/invasivespecies. A recorded version of the webinar also will be available at this website after May 12.

> The Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program supports projects throughout the state that prevent, detect, manage and eradicate invasive species on the ground and in the water. Total grant funding is set by the legislature and the governor during the annual budget cycle. In the first two years of the program, more than \$7.6 million in grant funding has gone to support invasive species education, control and management through 16 Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas, as well as targeted projects to control invasive phragmites, Eurasian watermilfoil, European frogbit, feral swine and oak wilt.

"Preventing invasive species from being introduced to or gaining a foothold in Michigan is of the greatest importance to protecting our worldclass natural resources and outdoor recreation opportunities," said DNR Director Bill Moritz. "We are eager to provide this vital funding to our community partners who are just as strongly committed to battling these land and water invaders.'

Administered by the DNR, the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program targets four key objectives:

- Preventing new introductions of invasive species through outreach and education.
- Monitoring for new invasive species as well as expansions of current invasive species.
- Managing and controlling key colonized species in a strategic manner.
- Responding to and conducting eradication efforts for new findings and range expansions.

Local, federal and tribal units of government, nonprofit organizations and universities may apply for funding to support invasive species projects conducted in Michigan. For this 2016 funding cycle, pre-proposals will be accepted through June 15 and requested full proposals must be submitted by September 15.

Grant requests for 2016 projects can range from a minimum of \$25,000 to a maximum of \$400,000. Applicants must commit to provide at least 10 percent of the total project cost in the form of a local match. Proposals with match levels above 10 percent will receive higher ranking. Competitive applications will outline clear objectives, propose significant ecological benefits, demonstrate diverse collaboration and show strong community support. N.R. **Deer's** farm residence

Buildings on Old David Nevin Farm Go Up in Smoke.

May 4, 1916 - Friday afternoon the large residence on N. B. Deer's farm (the old Nevin place) was totally destroyed by fire, together with a large part of the contents, the old barn and several smaller buildings. The new barn and one small shop are all the buildings left stand-

How the fire originated is a mystery. The chemical engine and a crowd of men and boys hurried out from town and the neighbors gathered quickly, but the building was so far gone that they confined their efforts to saving the big barn and to carrying what they could from the burning building.

Though he carried some insurance, the loss falls heavily upon Mr. Deer. At present the family are boarding with the neighbors, the men sleeping at the barn and caring for the stock. Bees are being planned and the "Jack Buchanan dwelling" located on the northwest corner of the farm, is to he moved to the site of the burned building and will be occupied by the family.

Frank killed a bear

May 4, 1916 - At last Frank Corfman has the desire of his heart fulfilled. Since coming here from Ohio some years ago, he has been "crazy" to shoot a bear and have a story to send back to his less fortunate chums. For some time bears have been carrying off sheep for the Roe Brothers and Corfman's. Last fall Sam Roe met one face to face on a sheep trail in his pasture, but had no gun. Mr. Bruin stood up and took a good look at him and fled (the bear, not Sam of course.) Sam said he was a "big one". This spring they started the same game and carried off two or three for Mr. Corfman and Frank and some other fellows went on a still hunt for him. Frank was lucky enough to overtake and shoot him and after dividing the carcass with all his friends, he thought to weigh him and the old fellow tipped the scales at 400 pounds (or maybe it was before they divided him.) "I hain't much on a bear story." At any rate Frank killed the bear without the aid of Betty.

Forest fires at Hubbard Lake

Close Call for the Summer Cottages at South End

May 4, 1916 - A call for help came Saturday afternoon from Aust Backus at Hubbard Lake, who phoned that forest fires were closing in on the cottages at the south end of the lake. Two autos carrying D. E. Storms, D. McRae, W. H. Sanborn, Dr. Miller, Geo. W. Beever and W. L. Chapelle hurried to the scene and arrived in time to do some efficient work in back-firing. When they arrived fire had burned to within

a foot of the wood shed on the Colwell property and was burning at the edge of the field near the barn. The territory from Dundale north was burned over clear to the lake, but no buildings were damaged. In width it extended from south of Taylor's to west of Lavier's cottage.

By back-firing the fire was kept away from the buildings and with the exception of a spot near Lavier's cottage the whole section is so thoroughly

burned over that there should be no danger from forest fires here for some time to come.

A big fire was also reported off to the east of Hubbard Lake, but nothing definite has been learned to its extent.

The fishing season opened at Uncle Tom's Cabin, Hubbard Lake, April 26, when Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Kersge of Bay City arrived for a few weeks' vacation.

The gentlemen from Harrisville who came Friday evening to fight fire, enjoyed a splendid perch supper in the new dining room.

On Tuesday, Dr. Miller of Harrisville, Earl Shannon of Alpena and Mr. Humphry of Detroit, who were trout fishing on the Sucker creek drove in for supper. They report a fine catch of trout.


