Tailgate party adds to homecoming celebration

High school football, homecoming and a tailgate party means fall has officially arrived.

For years, Alcona High School has had two of those fall activities but it lacked the tailgate party – until this year.

On Friday, Sept. 30, there will be the first tailgate party prior to the varsity homecoming game against the Oscoda Owls. The FFA Alumni will be throwing the bash and offering a barbecued pulled pork dinner from 5 to 7:30 p.m. in the parking lot of the high school. Game kick-off begins at 7 p.m.

Rose Powierski, president of the FFA Alumni, explained the homecoming tailgate party is truly a homecoming for more than just high school students, graduates and football enthusiasts, it's a homecoming welcome to the schools new FFA advisor and Agri-science teacher, Connor Hubbard.

Hubbard graduated from Alcona High School in 2010 and was a FFA chapter officer for two years at the school. He graduated from Michigan State University with a degree in agriculture, food and natural resources education in 2015. Now he is teaching at the high school where he once walked the halls as a student.

Since Hubbard's arrival, FFA membership has risen from 45 members last year to 78 members this year. Hubbard said as the school year proceeds he expects those numbers to grow.

The tailgate party seemed like the ideal welcome home on many levels to FFA Alumni, "It's really a social welcome to Connor. We're trying to allow a chance for people of the community to meet him and for him to meet the community. We also wanted to bring community awareness to the FFA Alumni and its activities to support Alcona High School's FFA program," Powierski said.

She explained the football program at Alcona High School is fantastic and having a tailgate to support both the football program and the FFA club at the same time just made sense.

"The FFA Alumni supports the FFA chapter and everything they need whether it be in the form of financial support, leadership support or mentoring support," Powierski said.

She explained that quite

often when students are preparing for leadership contests it is FFA Alumni who are coaching them and encouraging the student to do their best. Alumni also chaperone the students at the contests.

The alumni assists financially with expense of trips to the National FFA convention and State FFA convention and by managing a healthy \$3,000 plus worth of scholarships to graduating Alcona High School FFA members every year. Last year the Alcona High School FFA Alumni gave \$300 to the FFA regional chapter and \$3,500 in scholarships to graduating Alcona students.

To do this, the alumni group fundraises throughout the year in a variety of ways such as the pancake supper during the Alcona County Fair, a pancake brunch during Mikado Days, the silent auction at the Alcona High School FFA banquet in May and, now, a tailgate party in September. According to Powierski, the FFA Alumni hopes to bring the tailgate party annually to every homecoming game.

The FFA Alumni is also working on a project to restore a 1946 John Deere B tractor which was donated by Powierski's family. Once the tractor has been restored it will be raffled off with all proceeds to benefit the FFA Alumni budget.

Powierski is also a graduate of Alcona High School and a former secretary and vice president of its FFA program. "My family thought it would be best for the FFA and Alumni to make a little money on the tractor rather than have it lay around in our field. I love supporting the kids. It meant a lot to me when I was in FFA to have the alumni support me. It feels good to know that now I am supporting their dreams. Perhaps someday they will give back through a FFA Alumni group in their community, wherever that may be."

"It's a very rewarding thing to give back and the kids appreciate it. Every kid I've talked to knows the FFA Alumni is in their corner and appreciates what we have done for them. They thank us at every event we go to with them. The more support we

Surplus Salmon Available

The public is invited again this year to purchase surplus salmon that has been harvested at Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) weirs located

in the northern Lower Peninsula.

Seasonal salmon runs include large numbers of fish returning to their native streams to spawn and die. The DNR maintains multiple sites (weirs) where fisheries biologists and technicians collect eggs and milt (sperm) from Chinook and coho salmon for use in state fish hatcheries. Once egg-take needs are met, fish in prime physical condition are made available to the public by American-Canadian Fisheries (ACF), a private vendor that assists the DNR with the salmon harvest.

ACF harvests the salmon for human and pet-food markets, as well as excess eggs for bait and caviar markets. ACF pays the DNR a flat per-pound rate for the salmon and eggs collected. They then make suitable-quality fish available wholesale to distributors who market the fish. All of this year's distributors are located in the northern Lower Peninsula.



everyone. We have a good pace to our side and we want all to enjoy it," Jones said.

The Lake Huron Discovery Tour was awarded a \$25,000 heritage grant through the Michigan Humanities Council which was applied for by the Community Foundation of Northeast Michigan, Jones said. Through the grant the discovery tour is exploring Native American heritage in northeast Michigan and Jones will be doing a documentary on it.

The grant allowed committee members to identify lecturers well versed in Native American culture and bring them to the tour. "We identified over 90 people that have a connection with Native American history, culture, heritage in the region or are a Native American author, scholar, lecturer, or tradition bearer," Jones said.

From that list the discovery tour includes five days of lectures during the tour from Standish to Mackinaw City, Mich. All lectures will focus on land, sky or water.

The Harrisville branch of the Alcona County Library will host one of the lecturers, Native American author, presenter and professor, Michael Wassegijig Price who will be sharing "Anishinaabe Star Knowledge: Indigenous Astronomy on the shores of Lake Huron" presentation at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 8.

Price will be giving the lecture again later in the evening at the dark sky event at 7 p.m. on the beach at Negwegon State Park followed, hopefully, with clear skies for some star gazing. Both lecturers are free events, however, a recreation passport is needed to enter the park.

Price has presented "Stellar Connections: Explorations in Cultural Astronomy," to the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian's symposium and teaches a class called Indigenous Astronomy at Bemidji State University in Minnesota.

A final lecture, "Exploring our Native American History along the US 23 Heritage

Route - The Path Long Trod," will be held Monday, Oct. 10, in celebration of Indigenous Peoples Day, at 7 p.m. at the Besser Museum in Alpena. The guest speakers are historian and author, Ellis Olson, and basket weaver, Karen Lewis.

Ellis will discuss discoveries he found through years of research tracing the history of the Native American trail along the northeastern shores of Lake Huron. Lewis will share her love and skills for native basket weaving and discuss the nationally recognized collection of Native American artifacts and baskets housed at Besser Museum.

Meal service delivery options for seniors who don't cook

Dear Savvy Senior
 What types of healthy meal delivery options can you recommend for seniors who live at home, but don't cook and don't get out much. Since mom passed away, my dad's diet is terrible and I worry about his health.

Long-Distance Daughter

Dear Long-Distance,

There are various healthy meal service delivery options available to non-cooking seniors who live at home, but what's available to your dad will depend on his location and budget. Here are several to check into.

A good place to start is to find out if there's a senior home delivery meal program in your dad's area. Meals on Wheels is the largest program that most people are familiar with, but many communities offer senior meal delivery programs sponsored by other organizations that go by different names.

To find services available in your dad's area, visit

MealsOnWheelsAmerica.org, which offers a comprehensive directory on their website, or call the area aging agency near your dad. Contact the Eldercare Locator at 800-677-1116 to get the number.

Most home delivered meal programs across the U.S. deliver hot meals daily or several times a week, usually around the lunch hour, to seniors over age 60 who have problems preparing meals for themselves, as well as those with disabilities. Weekend meals, usually frozen, may also be available, along with special diets (diabetic, low-sodium, kosher, etc.). Most of these programs typically charge a small fee (usually between \$2 and \$6) or request a donation, while some may be free to low-income seniors.

Another option that's a bit more expensive is to purchase your dad's meals online and have them delivered to his home. There are a number of companies that offer this type

of service like Magic Kitchen (magickitchen.com), Home Bistro (homebistro.com), Personal Chef To Go (personalcheftogo.com), Good Measure Meals (goodmeasuremeals.com), and many others.

These companies offer a wide variety of tasty meal choices, and will usually post the nutrition information for their meals right on their website. Most companies will also cater to a host of dietary and medical needs, such as low-sodium and low-carb meals, diabetic meals, gluten-free, dairy-free, and vegetarian options.

Most of the food arrives frozen, but a few companies ship food fresh. Prices generally start at around \$10 to \$13 per meal, plus shipping, however most companies provide discounts or free shipping when you order meals in bulk.

Depending on where your dad lives, he may also be able to get home delivered meals from local grocery stores or restaurants. Some grocery

stores offer a selection of pre-cooked meals and foods, including roasted chicken, mashed potatoes, and fresh soups and salads. Contact the grocery stores in your dad's area to inquire about this option. Or check with some of his favorite restaurants to see if they offer home delivery.

Another option for non-cooking seniors with a bigger budget is to hire a personal chef from time to time. A personal chef can provide your dad with a do-it-all service that will help plan his meals, do the grocery shopping and prepare him several weeks worth (or more) of tasty meals

in his home, which he can freeze and eat whenever he wants. Or, they can prepare it in their own kitchen and deliver it. Chef's fees range between \$200 and \$300 plus groceries. He may be able to save money by sharing meals with you or another family member, or a friend or neighbor.

To find a personal chef in your dad's area, check the listings at the American Personal & Private Chef Association (personalchef.com) or the United States Personal Chef Association (hireachef.com).

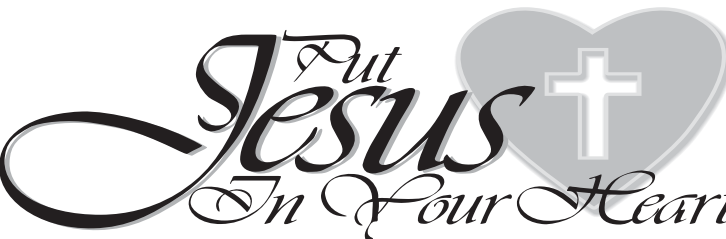

Carrier Jim Miller Has Narrow Escape When His Car Turned Turtle

September 28, 1916 - Mail Carrier Jas. Miller of Route No. 2, had a very narrow escape Saturday from serious injury or worse. As he was coming down the grade near Gus London's farm in Haynes, the steering wheel of his Ford car came off, leaving Jim helpless. He pulled his emergency brake, but the machine went over the bank and turned bottom side up. The top was up, and this fact probably saved the lives of both the driver and the little

daughter of Melvin Johnson who was in the rear seat. Jim lost some skin and was bruised somewhat, as well as being stunned for a minute or two but he soon crawled out and found himself comparatively uninjured. When he got out the little girl was running home to tell her mother Jim was killed.

A broken windshield and one top bow, and the top cover torn a little was all the damage to the car. The engine did not stop running

until Jim crawled back under the wreck and turned off the switch. Some men came along and helped right the car and off she went, seemingly little the worse for the somersault. The patrons on No. 2 received their mail in time— and another chapter to local Ford history was closed. The accident occurred just a short distance from the bridge over Black River; had it happened on the bridge there undoubtedly would have been a far different ending.

StarWatch By Gary Becker - The Planetary Diet

When Isaac Newton quantified gravity during the plague years of 1665-66, he laid the mathematical foundation for Apollo astronauts going to the moon three centuries later. What he discovered was the force of attraction between two objects was directly related to their masses, how much material they contained, and inversely proportional to the square of their distances (1/d²). Newton's revolutionary concepts allowed us to calculate the true orbits of the planets and comets, the trajectory which took Apollo to the moon, and also the amount of matter which a system contained. In an even more simplistic form of Universal Gravity, the weight of a person standing on any planet or satellite could be known if you knew the weight of that person on Earth, and the ratios of Earth's radius and mass to that of the object upon which the individual was standing. Take for instance our moon. Its mass is approximately 1/80th that of the Earth's mass and its radius (center to surface distance) is just a little more than 1/4 of Earth's radius. 1/80 divided by 1/4 x 1/4 = 1/80 divided by 1/16 which yields an answer of 16/80 or 1/5th of the gravitational attraction that the Earth possesses. The correct answer, if the exact numbers are incorporated, is 1/6th Earth's pull. The Apollo astronauts when fully suited weighed on average 360 pounds, but on the moon they only weighed 60 pounds because the force of attraction at the moon's surface was much less, 1/6th of Earth's gravity or 1/6th of 360 pounds or 60 pounds. No wonder they were able to take giant strides as they walked across the lunar surface and jump two to three feet into the "air" when saluting the American flag. A 200 pound terrestrial moving to Mercury or Mars would weigh an anorexic 78 and 76 pounds respectively, but still look the same if housed in an Earthlike environment. Traveling to Jupiter would be an entirely different story, however, for that same person would weigh in at 500 pounds if there was a Jovian surface on which to stand. That's the planetary diet. www.astronomy.org
