Harrisville Harbor dock construction project getting underway

Bidding for the repair and replacement of portions of the docks at the Harrisville Harbor of Refuge has begun following the approval of two Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR)

Construction and structural repair of the dock is planned to be completed in five phases with a speculated cost of \$2,500,000, according to Neal Gehring, chairperson of the Harrisville Harbor Commission. Gehring will not disclose the amount of the grants approved by the DNR for the first two phases until the bidding process was

He explained that since the harbor is self-funded through fuel sales and dockage fees, revenue funds to make the necessary repairs was scarce. The harbor commission had no choice but to begin a dialog with the DNR about grant opportunities for a construction project to make the docks safer and inviting to boaters.

The docks were last replaced, Gehring believed, in 1986; which is well past their 25-year life expectancy. The last major repair, which Gehring described as a "band aid fix," was in 2013 and cost the harbor about \$25,000.

Phase one and two of the project includes fixing the ramp from the fixed dock to

the floating south dock and removing several damaged slips at the end of the south dock prior to the beginning of this year's boating season on June 1. This will leave the remaining portion of the south dock for use during this season.

'When this season concludes, the south dock will be removed and a new south dock will be constructed, including utilities, and will be ready for the 2018 boating season," Gehring said. Utilities include water, electricity, a new bubbler system, which is used in the winter to keep damaging ice from forming around docks, and fire safety equipment.

Phase three, which does not have grant approval yet, includes the fixed dock. The portion of the dock system that extends from the shore and then extends north and south will be re-decked and inspected for structural issues and repairs if needed. New utilities will be included for the fixed dock. A boater gathering deck area, approximately 30 feet by 30 feet, will also be added to the land connection of the fixed dock.

Phases four and five of the project, also not yet grant approved, will include replacement of the north dock and all utilities. A new sanitary pump-out system, a new fuel delivery system and any work that needs to be done on the fixed dock under the gas shack. This includes lifting the gas shack to replace the decking under it and inspecting for any structural deficiencies.

Gehring said the process of applying for the 100 percent grant through DNR, which began with a grant application for the preparation of a preliminary engineering study (PES), was tedious and time consuming.

"Once the grant was approved by the MDNR, the Harrisville Harbor Commission/City of Harrisville contracted with Edgewater Resources LLC of St. Joseph, Mich., to prepare the PES document. This portion of the process took about one year to complete," Gehring said.

Once that was completed and approved, the Harrisville Harbor Commission prepared a grant application for infrastructure improvements for all the work needed to be accomplished as described in the PES document, including design, preparation of plans and specifications for construction. Gehring explained at that point it became apparent the DNR preferred the project to be built in phases, so the Harrisville Harbor Commission split up the project into five "usable" phases, which, if approved, would compete with other state-wide projects for fund-

Free men's health dinner program in Lincoln

Hops and Health, a free, fast-paced, men's health dinner program is coming to Lin-

The evening, which includes door prizes, free buffet dinner by JJ's Catering and beer by donation, is for men only, 18 years and older, and will be held at the Alcona Free and Accepted Masonic Lodge 292 in Lincoln, Thursday, May 4.

This program is being brought to the area by Friends Together, a nonprofit organization in Alpena. The Friends Together mission is to serve people dealing with cancer in six northern Michigan counties, including Alcona. It also promotes prevention, education and wellness.

Bill Morford, one of four employees of Friends Together, said the event has been proven to be a fun evening. "We've held two of these in Alpena with great success," Morford said.

The program will include several health professionals such as a family physician, nutritionist, dentist, ophthalmologist, oncologist, and mental health professional who will sit down with men at their tables and give an eightminute talk.

"It's not overwhelming, it's \$14,000 with the stipulation

Half way through the program there will be a break for some of the funds were to be used encourage men to take care of their health. "We are just over a year on that grant and had a bit left over so we decided to bring it to Alcona County," Morford said.

"Men are 50 percent less likely than women to get a check up with a doctor,"

Morford said, "The program may look at some cancer issues, but will mostly cover men's overall health."

Judy Burns, Founder and Director of Friends Together, said many times men are either not symptomatic or ignore symptoms and by the time they do go in and see a doctor, their condition has advanced greatly.

"One of our goals is prevention and education,' Burns said.

Morford thanked the Masons of Lincoln for hosting the Hops and Health event. He said the group was providing leadership for the community.

Masonic Lodge 292 is located at 316 E. Traverse Bay Road, in Lincoln next to the Lincoln branch of the Alcona County Library.

The doors open at 5:30 p.m. and the program begins at 6 p.m.



She was a member of Daughters of the American Revolution, a board member of Presbyterian Church USA and Detroit Presbytery.



Community name: Township of Millen County: Alcona

Ordinance Number 1465

An ordinance to designate an enforcing agency to discharge the responsibility of the Township of Millen located in Alcona County, and to designate regulated flood hazard areas under the provision of the State Construction Code Act, Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended.

The Township of Millen ordains:

Section 1. Agency Designated. Pursuant to the provisions of the state construction code, in accordance with Section 8b (6) of Act 230, of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, the Building Official of the County of Alcona is hereby designated as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibility of the Township of Millen under Act 230, of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, State of Michigan. The County of Alcona assumes responsibility for the administration and enforcement of said Act throughout the corporate limits of the community adopting this ordinance.

Section 2. Code Appendix Enforced. Pursuant to the provisions of the state construction code, in accordance with Section 8b (6) of Act 230, of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, Appendix G of the Michigan Building Code shall be enforced by the enforcing agency within the County of Alcona.

Section 3. Designation of Regulated Flood Prone Hazard Areas. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Study (FIS) Entitled "Alcona County, Michigan, All Jurisdictions" and dated 9/28/12 and the Flood Insurance Rate Map (s) (FIRMS) panel number (s) of 26001C; O200D; 0225D; 0250D; 0350D; 0375D; and 0400D dated 9/28/12 are adopted by reference for the purpose(s) of administration of the Michigan Construction Code, and declared to be a part of Section 1612.3 of the Michigan Building Code, and to provide the content of the "Flood Hazards: section of Table R301.2(1) of the Michigan Residential Code.

Section 4. Repeals. All ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. Publication. This ordinance shall be effective after legal publication and in accordance with the provisions of the Act governing same.

What to do with cremated ashes?

Dear Savvy Senior,

When my father passed away a few months ago we had him cremated, but are now wondering what to do with his ashes. My sister and I would like to do something celebratory for his life, but aren't sure what to do. Any suggestions?

No Instructions Left

Dear No,

If your dad didn't leave any final instructions on what to do with his cremated remains (ashes), you have a wide array of choices. They can be kept, buried or scattered in a variety of ways and in many locations.

For many people, keeping the ashes of their deceased love one close by provides a feeling of comfort. If you fit into this category, you could keep his ashes in an urn on the mantel or in a cabinet, or vou could also scatter some of them into your lawn or garden, shake them into a backyard pond or dig a hole

and bury them. Another possible option is eco-friendly urns (like UrnaBios.com or EterniTrees.com) that contain a seed that grows into a tree or plant after being bur-

If you want your dad's final resting place to be at a cemetery, you have several choices depending on how much you're willing to spend. With most cemeteries, you can either bury his ashes in a plot, or place them in cremation monument, a mausoleum, or a cemetery building called a columbarium.

If you want to scatter his ashes, to help you chose an appropriate location, think about what your dad would have liked. For example, did he have a favorite fishing spot, camping area, golf course, beach or park that held a special meaning?

These are all possibilities, but be aware to that if you choose to scatter his ashes in a public location or on private land, you'll need get permission from the management, local government or the land owner.

National parks, for example, require you to have a permit before you scatter ashes. If you wish to dispose of them at sea, the Environmental Protection Agency asks you be at least three miles from shore. Beach scatterings are also illegal in some states, including California, but are rarely enforced. And many public areas, like Central Park and Disneyland prohibit scattering ashes too, as do most professional and college sports stadiums.

If you want to do something truly unique with his ashes, you have many choices here too, but they can get pricy ranging from a few hundred to several thousand dollars. Here are several to consider.

 Scattering by air: This free-spirited option lets you spread your dad's ashes into the sky so the particles can be taken by the wind. To do

this, you could hire a private plane, helicopter or hot air balloon service, or use a balloon scattering service like EternalAscent.com or Mesoloft.com. Or, you could even send his ashes into outer space with ElysiumSpace.-

• Scattering by sea: If your dad loved the water, there are many businesses that offer ash scattering services at sea, especially close to coastal areas, or you could rent a boat and do it yourself. There are also companies like EternalReefs.com that offer reef memorials so your dad's ashes can rest on the ocean floor.

· Ashes to keepsakes: If you want a keepsake of your dad, you can also turn some of his ashes into a wide variety of memorabilia, such as: diamonds (see LifeGem.com or DNA2Diamonds.com); jewelry or other handcrafted glass items (ArtFromAshes-.com and Memorials.com); vinyl records (Andvinyly-.com); gun ammunition (MyHolySmoke.com); or an hourglass urn (InTheLight-Urns.com).





Safety focus at Walker/Poor Farm Road

Funding from the High Risk Rural Road Program (HRRRP) has been awarded to the Alcona County Road Commission for limited safety improvements at the intersection of Walker Road and Poor Farm Road in Harrisville Township.

"New, high visibility signing is already in place," said Alcona County Road Commission Managing Director Jesse Campbell. "And trees that might have been obscuring the line of vision had been removed in years past, but the intersection continues to be a challenge to motorists."

Campbell attributes it to the horizontal alignment of Walker Road, which seems to lull motorists into looking past the intersection, causing them to miss the cues that they are approaching an intersection.

Short of rebuilding the entire intersection to try to change the alignment, which would be very costly, plans are to resurface the intersection with asphalt allowing for rumble strips to be added preceding the stop signs on Walker Road.

"Along with installing additional larger, higher visibility signage, and removing some trees and brush on the northeast side of the intersection, we're hopeful the repaving and the rumble strips, along with pavement markings will be enough to alert drivers to stop for the intersection," says Campbell.

The HRRRP is a set-aside provision under the federal highway transportation funding mechanism and provides special funding for projects designed to reduce

the frequency and severity of collisions on certain rural roads. To meet the criteria for funding, the crash rate for fatalities and incapacitating injuries must exceed the statewide average for similarly-classed roads.

The project is expected to cost \$120,000, with \$108,000 being funded by the HRRRP grant. The anticipated bid letting is not until April 2018, after which the contractor and work schedule will be determined.

April 30, 1942 ~ Monday, April 20, 1942.

Alcona County Review, Harrisville, Michigan Dear Editor:

I would like to thank you for sending the paper to me. It sort of keeps one in contact with the old town and its citizens. Of course I get the regular letters from home but It's impossible to get all the news that way.

Our camp is situated at the base of the Franklin range of mountains. We are some 3700 feet above sea level, and it was quite a job t o get used to the climate. Our camp is a $Coastal\,Artillery\,Anti-air craft$ training camp. It is separated from the old Fort Bliss by some 2 or 3 miles, which Is a Calvalry camp

The only nearby Texas town is, about 6 miles away, El Paso, with a population of some 100,000 people. It is separated from Juarez, Mexico, by the Rio Grande

I have been over to Juarez a number of times. It has the Spanish influence throughout the city. Yesterday a few of us attended the widely known bull fights. Four bulls were killed. It was a great experience for us all. The fights were sponsored by the Red Cross.

I believe that it is time for me to sign off and get some sleep. We only had a 20 mile

He was taken to Alpena Hospital by Gerson Kahn and later to the home of relatives in Alpena. Jack Frayer, a passenger, in the car escaped

The car failed to make the sharp curve and landed upside down in a pond at the side of the highway.

The car was half submerged in water. Frayer broke the window of the car door and removed his companion to safety thus preventing the injured man from drowning.

Fire destroys Spruce farm trees; burns wide area

April 30, 1942 ~ One of mately three miles long, was the worst forest fires experienced by Harrisville and Haynes Townships in many years, began at the City Dumping grounds, north of the Airport road late Thursday aftemoon of last week. The fire, apparently starting from the hot sun shining through glass, swept a wide path northward, and was brought under control west of the George Holmes farm early Friday morning. A path 34 miles wide and approxi-

laid waste by the blaze.

The Blue Spruce farm, northwest of Harrisville, was in the path of the fire and flames shot Into the air between 50 and 100 feet as the tall rows of Spruce burned. The buildings on the farm were saved.

A number of other fires were reported during the past week. A ten acre woodlot west of Hubbard Lake on the Hawes Ranch burned, A brush fire on the George Somers farm in Hawes burned over a small area. A fire south of Glennie along the AuSable river, and one south and west of Mikado burned over several acres.

By Governor Proclamation, use of fire by campers is strictly regulated to protect the tinder dry forests against fire hazards. Heavy thunder storms in some sections of northern Michigan, fell Wednesday night, although Alcona County area received



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Robotic Observatory Is Concrete

The astronomy team of the Mars Desert Research Station near Hanksville, Utah, of which I am a member, received confirmation this week that the concrete pad for the MDRS Robotic Observatory has been poured. Photos can be seen at http://astronomy.org/StarWatch/April/index-4-17.html#4-23-17. In addition, a check for \$20,000 from the Moravian College Astronomy Account, raised through public donations, should be on its way to The Mars Society to secure Moravian's 25 percent vested share of the telescope's time. Actually, I should say telescopes' time. As discussions evolved pertaining to the use of the facility (research and astrophotography), it became obvious that the two were incompatible using one instrument. The larger of the two telescopes, a 0.36 meter (14-inch), F/10, Celestron EdgeHD, Schmidt-Cassegrain reflector named the Moravian Telescope, will be used for research. This instrument produces a relatively high magnification making its field of view small, but allowing the image scale to be larger which

will show a greater amount of detail. The image scale relegates sensor parameters, such as the size of the pixels which will record the data. All of these considerations would not allow an all-in-one instrument to complete the task of research as well as astrophotography. Enter David Fisherowski, who has seeded Moravian College with several fine telescopes and mounting systems. He donated to the project a high-end Stellarvue, F/6, apochromatic (three element) refractor which is particularly well-designed for astrophotography. It will produce a smaller image scale several degrees across, perfect for producing beautiful starscapes. The two telescopes will be mounted side-by-side rather than in a more traditional piggyback arrangement to reduce stresses on the Moravian instrument. This will greatly improve its pointing accuracy. Another feature of the MDRS Robotic Observatory and Moravian Telescope is that sensors will have to determine that meteorological conditions are conducive for observing. Clouds and wind must be monitored automatically so that the equipment is not mistakenly subjected to destructive forces or precipitation. After a night of observing, a clamshell-type dome will close automatically, and a cover will be deployed over the front of the Moravian Telescope to keep its corrector plate clean. It's been an interesting learning curve to design the MDRS Robotic Observatory, but everything is coming together nicely, www.astronomy.org




