

Budget deficit concern for county board

With the fiscal year more than half over, Alcona County Commissioners are taking a long look at the budget for ways to minimize expenses and increase income for the rest of this year and into the

The county's goal is to have a balanced budget each year and not have to dip into the fund balance to cover expenses that go over budget, according to Craig Johnston, chairman of the board of commissioners. "We've pulled money from the fund balance for years to balance the budget on paper - sometimes

ATV accident kills downstate resident

A weekend ATV accident resulted in one death and serious injuries to the driver and passenger from downstate.

According to the Alcona County Sheriff's Office, the driver of the ATV was William D. Sears, 43, and the passenger was his wife, Angela L. Sears, 44, of St. Clair Shores, Mich.

First responders were called the scene at 7.16 p.m. on Almond Road, east of Montana Road, in Bar ton City for the accident. According to the sheriff's office, William Sears was traveling east on the shoulder of Almond Road at a high rate of speed when he lost control and rolled the ATV through the ditch and into a tree. He and his wife were ejected from the ATV.

William Sears was pronounced dead at the scene. Angela Sears sustained "severe injuries" and was transported by Alcona EMS to Mid-Michigan Hospital in Alpena. Neither one was wearing a helmet.

The accident is under investigation by the Alcona County Sheriff's Office, which said. "alcohol and a high rate of speed appear to be a factor in the inci-

some areas of income come in late and we need to move money around to balance on paper; when it comes in it is put back," he said. "For many years we've remained under budget and we didn't need the infusion (from the fund balance)."

This year, however, is a different story. He explained that revenue has steadily dropped in the last five or more years and expenses have continued to increase. A majority of the county's revenue is from property taxes. "It's the perfect storm situation," Johnston said. "Property values have decreased - that's our revenue and health care costs have increased in the last three years. Plus, we are still paying for the full-time employees' retirement fund (MERS) that crashed in 2008-09. We've had revenues flattened or lowered and those two expenses have gone up and it's really busted the budget. That's in addition to the everyday cost of doing business have gone up - cars, equipment, supplies..."

"I think people recognize things cost more than they did. We are mirroring what the average person and businesses are experiencing - the cost of doing business has increased. I use this as an example for folks: We are a corporation and I happen to sit (with four other commissioners) on the board. The citizens of this county are the stockholders and the customers. It's our job to make the right decisions. We aren't in this to make a profit. We are in the business of providing the services that people need," Johnston said.

He explained that all departments have been very proactive in reducing expenses - from paperclips to police cars - and stretching dollars. But, that hasn't been enough. "We are still looking at shortfalls this year and it's only half way through the year. There are no easy answers," Johnston said.

"It costs money to provide services. Our revenues can't remain static when our expenses go up. But, our revenue – by state law – is static," he said. The county does have an operating millage that was originally 5.25 mills when approved by voters years ago. However, the Headlee Amendment has reduced the millage collected to 4.17.

The Headlee Amendment was approved by voters in 1978. This amendment to the state constitution included several provisions related to state and local taxes. The provision Johnston references is the limitation on property tax revenue which "requires that if the assessed value of a local tax unit's total taxable property increases by more than the inflation rate, the maximum property tax millage must be reduced so that the local unit's total taxable property yields the same gross revenue, adjusted for inflation. This is done by looking at the total state equalized value (SEV) change from one year to the next. It does so looking at the entire tax unit's jurisdiction, not based on each parcel. The change of SEV from one year to the next does not include any change that resulted from new construction," according to Michigan State University Extension.

Johnston explained the board of commissioners is exploring many options and considering a millage to recover the original operating millage amount of 5.25 mills, which would infuse the revenue by approximately \$700,000 a year. "That would solve issues immediately and in the future. That would be a really big step," Johnston said.

He explained that no decisions have been made regarding personnel or a millage request. Everything is being discussed and analyzed. He encouraged residents to contact their county commissioners if they have questions or concerns about anything.

"As we talk about financial issues in this corner of the country, please keep in mind that even though we may be upset about what we see in our (federal and state) government that aren't done the way we would like them done - wasteful spending, etc. - these are distant to most of us. It's really far enough removed from our everyday life, and as much as we have disappointments with state and federal government, local government township and county - is where we have a voice and can have an impact.

"Don't kick your dog for something the neighbor's dog did... the fact that we are here and your neighbors – we are accessible and accountable. Most people know that they can ask questions, but they don't," he said.

There needs to be some choice by all of us which America we want to be --suspicious of each other or willing to make small sacrifices to help our fellow man.

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



Auto safety devices that can help seniors with older cars

Dear Savvy Senior,

Do you know of any auto safety products that can help seniors with older cars? My 80-year-old father, who drives his beloved 2004 Toyota Avalon, is still a good pretty driver but he has limited range-of-motion, which makes looking over his shoulder to backup or merge into traffic very difficult.

Inquiring Son

Dear Inquiring,

To help keep your dad safe and extend his driving years, there are a number of auto aids and new safety technology products that can be added to his car to help with various needs.

To help your dad increase his visibility when backing up, a simple product that can be added to his car is an AllView Mirror (\$60, Allview-Mirror.com). This is an oversized rear view mirror that attaches to his existing mirror to widen his rear visibility and eliminate blind spots so

significant neck or body rotation. It also helps during parking.

Another option is a backup camera. These come with a weatherproof, night vision camera, which attaches to the license plate on the rear of the car. When the car is in reverse, it sends live images wirelessly to a small monitor that mounts to the dash or windshield. The Yada Digital Wireless Backup Camera (\$140, Amazon) with 4.3 inch Dash Monitor is a good option. Or, if your dad doesn't want a monitor in his car, the Auto Vox Wireless Backup Camera (\$140, Amazon.com) is one that displays the images in a rearview mirror.

To help your dad see better when switching lanes or merging into traffic, purchase your dad some "blind spot mirrors." These are small convex mirrors that would stick to the corner of his side view mirrors to improve side

he can see traffic without and rear vision. They can be purchased in any store that sells auto supplies for a few dollars.

> Or, for a high-tech more comprehensive solution, there's the Goshen Blind Spot Detection System (\$239, Goshers.com). This system uses small sensors installed on each side of the rear bumper that monitor the sides of the vehicle, and will alert your dad with a light indicator, installed inside the car, if any object detected within 10 feet.

> For extra safety, you may also want to consider a collision warning/lane departure device for your dad's vehicle like the Mobileye 630. This is a smart camera that attaches to the windshield and will alert your dad if he speeds, drifts out of his lane, gets too close to the car in front of him, or gets too close to a pedestrian or cyclist. Sold only through retailers (see Mobileye.com/en-us/find-aretailer), this device can be

purchased and installed by a Mobileye-certified technician for around \$1,100.

If you're interested in something a little less expensive, there are also dashboard cameras that can double as collision warning systems. Garmin's Dash Cam 35 (\$129, Amazon.com), for example, monitors up to 130 feet in front of the vehicle, so if your dad is going 30 mph or faster, it will issue audio and visual alerts of impending collisions.

Another product that can help keep your dad safe in emergency situations is the Hum (Hum.com). This nifty

device will automatically call emergency services if your dad has been in an accident. It also sends alerts to drivers' phones if there's a mechanical problem and lets driver's press a button if they need roadside assistance. Hum works in cars built in 1996 or later, and costs \$10 per month with two-year required subscription, and onetime setup and activation fees totaling \$50.

StarWatch By Gary Becker - Satellite of Hard Knocks—The Moon

Its hard for me to believe that one of the aspects of my enjoyment of the night sky that I had originally dislikedthe moon, has now become an agreeable facet of my nightly inspections of the heavens. Its gossamer appearance bathed in ghostly earthshine when a razor crescent; Lunas changing phases that are easy to discern; its rapid movement from night to night as it approaches and sometimes occults bright stars and planets; its sun like illumination under the photographic lens; and its ability to hide in the shadows of the Earth or court the sun to the exhilaration of the visual senses during a lunar or a solar eclipse, make it a joy to observe. The airless, nearly waterless moon has been with us almost since Earths formation. The early solar system was a rough and tumble place, laced with debris both large and small as the planets accreted. Some satellites undoubtedly

formed in this leftover material orbiting around their parent planets. Others were captured, like the small moons of the outer giant planets and Mars, but our moons origin was probably different. Most planetary astronomers believe that a Mars-sized object sideswiped Earth, drawing material from our primordial crust and spraying it into space. Some of this matter went into orbit around the Earth and rapidly coalesced to form the moon. Other debris continued to bombard Luna, creating a completely crater saturated surface which today is called the highlands. Watch the moon as it blossoms this week towards its full phase. The lighter, more reflective areas of its terrain are still represented by this original crustal material dating to over four billion years in age. Other locales of the moons nearside are darker and more circular in nature, indicating another chaotic period of lunar history. Protoplanets thrown inward by the outer planets or perhaps a major breakup of the asteroid belt pummeled the moons surface about 3.85 billion years ago, gouging from its surface huge basins that were eventually inundated with lava gushing from its depths. This basaltic rock had a slightly different composition, and therefore, a different reflectivity. Today, we observe the basins called maria as the darker lowlands of Lunas surface. They are dated to about 3-3.5 billion years of age. So, as you look at the moon this week, consider the fact that you are witnessing a chronological palette of events, billions of years in the making and right in front of your eyes, a history book frozen in time for you to see. www.astronomy.org



The state of the VA

Department of Veterans Affairs chief David Shulkin gave a 100-days State of the VA address, and he was candid about the problems with the VA and the hopes of correcting what needs to be

What's concerning is that there have been 137 different assessments and studies about what's wrong at the VA. It seems that somewhere along the line, officials would have just grabbed one assessment and started to fix whatever it pointed out, instead of letting 137 of them stack up.

One area of concern is access: how fast veterans can get an appointment. At this point, at all of the VA's 168 medical centers, veterans can get in the same day for primary and mental-health care. Outpatient facilities don't fare as well. And wait times and follow-up appointments have been, and continue to be, a major problem.

The Choice Program was heavily pushed as a way to get faster medical care for veterans, but those civilian medical providers are not getting paid on time and they're leaving the network. Some \$50 million worth of bills are still outstanding, being six months or older. It doesn't help providers when the contract has been amended 70 times. Because of confusion on both sides, 20 percent of the bills are rejected outright.

Fourteen VA medical centers have one-star ratings, which means a lower quality of care than

is available in nearby local hospitals.

As Shulkin said, some of the problems at the VA have been going on for decades. His honesty is refreshing -- and necessary. One area where Shulkin's goals are going to meet reality is in the time it takes to process disability claims. I wish him well with this and all of his intentions, but the truth is that the claims processing-time goalpost has been moved many times over the years.

Once that decision has been made, take inventory of which items, such as shoes, keys, umbrellas or coats, need to be in the area, which don't (i.e., old mail). To make things more organized, rearrange the former while removing the latter.

Next it is time to assess storage needs and what's already available. User-friendly storage items may need to be purchased to make the room as functional as possible. The following ideas also can help bring order to the

• Create a command center. Create a central location where items are neat, orderly and within reach. Use a bulletin board, dry-erase calendar or something that can house schedules and important notices. Hooks can hold keys, chargers and

- Keep it covered. Covered bins can serve as a seating area and also a place to store shoes, hats and scarves.
- Create cabinet space. Store items in cabinets so they are organized but out of sight. This way belongings are not just left on an entryway table.
- Create another drop zone. If the entryway is too small to serve its purpose, outfit another room or area that also can do the job. This can be a laundry room or mudroom area. Install shelves, a bench, cabinets and hooks. Just be sure this space is close enough to the entryway to make it useful.
- Go vertical. An easy way to keep things neater is to remove items from the floor and embrace vertical storage. Shoe racks, hooks for purses and a cabinet for coats may do the trick.

Clutter can accumulate in entryways. But some simple adjustments can quickly revamp the space to make it neater and much more functional. FH178196
