High speed chase ends in arrest

When it's a truck versus the house - the house wins.

At least that was the outcome late Monday evening when a Hale man chose to flee from Alcona County Sheriff's Office personnel.

According to Alcona County Sheriff Sgt. Scott Stephenson, a high speed chase through Caledonia Township ended with a pickup truck embedded in a home on Roe Road and the suspect missing overnight.

Stephenson explained the incident began around 10:20 p.m. on Monday, March 27 when he passed a pickup truck northbound on US-23. "When I turned around to follow, he sped up," Stephenson said. He followed the 2007 truck south on Barlow Road to Swede Road to Hubbard Lake Road to Spruce Road. "I caught up with him in the town of Spruce. I hit the overheads and attempted to pull him over... at this point we were going approximately 100 miles an hour and he wouldn't stop."

The chase took Stephenson, and by then another Sheriff's Office patrol vehicle, "all the way back to US-23 where he went south, then took Black River Road to the west. At the intersection of Black River and

Barlow Road he blew through the stop sign. We stopped and he was just gone," Stephenson said.

Both patrol vehicles traveled west on Roe Road searching for the truck, but couldn't find it. A second look found the pickup crashed into a house at 2890 Roe Road. "The pickup went through the wall and fell into the basement. We couldn't find the driver at the scene. He escaped through the basement window," Stephenson

The home was unoccupied at the time of the crash, but Stephenson said it was knocked off its foundation by eight inches to the west. "We were extremely fortunate that it was a seasonal residence because there was a bedroom on the ground level and a bedroom in the basement," he said.

Randall McArdle, 27, of Hale was located at approximately 6 a.m. Tuesday walking down Barlow Road. He was arraigned in 81st District Court on fleeing and eluding second offence and driving with a suspended license. A \$5,000 cash surety 10 percent bond was set. As of press time, McArdle was still lodged in the Alcona County Jail.

The Alcona County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Michigan State Police, Alpena post, Sanborn Town-ship Medical First Responders and Alcona EMS.

Crisis intervention help for area teenagers

A new crisis intervention program for teenage youth in four northeast Michigan counties will soon be available through Child and Family Services of Northeast Michigan.

The program, Compass North Youth Services, offers help for runaway, homeless, street youth, youth at risk of substance use/abuse and suicide. It offers options to improve their life in Alpena, Alcona, Montmorency and Iosco counties and is funded by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services.

According to Rhianna Compton, Compass North Youth Services case manager, the programs are designed to improve the safety and well being of youth while increasing their self-sufficiency and help them make permanent connections. All services are

include crisis intervention and assessment; counseling and case management; short and long term shelters or host home options; social, educational and support services; community based education and resource assistance.

Youth taking part in the services can be referred by the child's school, health center, family, neighbors or a child can refer themselves into the program, but in all cases the child must willingly want to accept the help offered, Compton explained. Three programs are offered to youth through Compass North: youth and family outreach services, basic care program, and transitional living program services.

The programs are designed to meet with the youth at locations where the youth feel safe

where they are at. If we have to go to them, we can," Compton

The youth and family outreach program provides case management and counseling to youth between ages 12 to 20 years and their family. Providers work directly with youth who have threatened to run away, youth who have run away, are homeless and youth with families who are experiencing homeless episodes.

It is also designed for throwaway youth, kids being forced out of their home by their parent, or youth experiencing any conflict and in need of protection. This program provides substance use/abuse prevention, mental health and truancy counseling to youth and their families. Compton explained the goal of the Youth and Family Outreach Program

The basic care program offers stabilization for youth who lack shelter and resources vital to everyday life. Youth receive services aimed at family reunification through a 15 to 21-day program.

Program providers match youth with appropriate temporary housing when needed in the basic care program and all youth and families accessing shelter assistance receive care including counseling, case management, educational, employment, if appropriate, and recreational programming.

Transitional living program services work with youth ages 16 to their 21st birthday who are homeless or at risk of being homeless as well as working with youth who have aged out of foster care. It is a handson approach, providing up to

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

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

Dear Savvy Senior,

Do you know of any services that help seniors with the rigors of traveling? My youngest daughter is getting married in a few months and would love to have my 82year old mother attend, but she needs help flying across the country.

Searching Daughter

Dear Searching,

Traveling can be daunting under the best circumstances but for elderly seniors, those with disabilities, or those recovering or rehabilitating from an illness or injury, it can seem particularly overwhelming or unmanageable.

Fortunately, there are a number of companies that provides traveling companion/escort services to help older adults with the rigors of travel.

Whether it's seniors going on vacation or grandparents wanting to join their far-off families for weddings and

graduations, travel companions help clients who need help moving through airports, managing luggage, navigating busy terminals and hotel lobbies and much more.

Some companion services even provide personal care like medication reminders, dressing, bathing and feeding. And for those with specific medical needs, traveling nurse services are available too.

But be aware that these services aren't cheap. You will pay for the travel companion's tickets, the companion's hotel room if necessary, meals, incidentals and fees for the service. The price to accompany a client on a plane trip within the United States – including the companion fees and travel costs for all parties - can range anywhere from \$1,500 to \$5,000 or more for coach airfare. Business or first class would cost more.

To locate a travel compan-

search online for "senior travel companion" or "senior travel escort," followed by your mom's city or state. Or use an experienced national service like Flying Companions (FlyingCompanions-.com) or FirstLight Home (FirstLightHome-Care.com), which has a national network of franchises that provides in-home care for seniors, and offers travel companion programs in about one-third of its 130 franchises.

Or, for medical travel companions do a search for "traveling nurse escort" or "medical travel companion," or checkout Travel Care & Logistics (YourFlightNurse-.com), which provides registered nurses as escorts.

If, however, your mom doesn't require a lot of assistance, or if you can't afford a travel escort, consider asking a trusted family member or friend that has some air travel experience.

If you're interested in hiring a travel companion service to help your mom, there are a number of things you need to check into to ensure you get the right escort.

First, if you mom requires personal or medical care while traveling, find out if the escort is trained to manage her healthcare needs. What sort of medical certifications do they have? (Nursing credentials? C.P.R. training? etc.)

Also, find out how many trips the companion has taken with clients. Have they completed trips with travelers like your mom? How long has the travel service company been in business? What is the company's safety record? And what sort of insurance does it carry, and what and who does it cover?

Also, get a quote breaking down exactly what you'll be required to pay, in addition to the companion's fees. And, get a list of two or three clients/references who has used their service and call them.

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

StarWatch By Gary Becker - Smiley Moon This Week

There is a curious lunar observation that is best seen in the spring, nearest to the vernal equinox. I call it the "smiley moon." I first heard the phrase about seven years ago from a quip made to me by a woman from church who had seen one several nights previously. My conversations with acquaintances are often laced with comments about odd things that they have observed in the sky when they discover that I teach astronomy. I need to explain that I actually enjoy these types of dialogues because many times I get the opportunity to explain the observations, and sometimes buried within what was seen is the discovery of a real "diamond in the rough," Such was the case with the smiley moon. Later that evening, my wife, Susan, and I were catching a program on TV. Our living room window faces west and through the gauzed curtains, I could see a horned moon that had a wide grin just like a Halloween pumpkin. I made two imaginary dots above it, and voila; there it was, the smiley moon about which I had just heard. I remember getting up and simply going outside, just a little bewildered, thinking something like, "You've been watching the moon all of your life, Gary, and you never put that together?" The explanation is really very simple. In the spring, the plane of the Earth's orbit, which represents the sun's yearly path against the stars and very nearly the moon's monthly orbital path in the sky, is tilted at a steep angle to the western horizon. As the moon pulls up and away from the sun after its new phase, the crescent which forms from the sun's light reflecting from the moon's surface is nearly parallel to the horizon, creating the smile. On Wednesday, March 29 about 45 minutes after sundown, look for a thin smiley moon near to the horizon, about 10 degrees to the left of Mercury. On Thursday the smiley moon will be higher and next to Mars. Binoculars will make the view more enjoyable. During the several days that follow, the moon will appear higher in the sky with an even bigger grin until it reaches first quarter on April 3. Have some smiley fun with the smiley moon! CALEDONIA TWP. PARK ORDINANCE 17-01

Township of Caledonia Alcona County, Michigan **Park Ordinance**

Ordinance Number: 17-01

An Ordinance to provide for the use, protection, regulation and control of the public parks, park facilities and other issues concerning recreation, conservation, education, historic and scenic ar-

Section 1. Purpose

The purpose of this Ordinance is to adopt rules and regulations and address other issues related to the use of and conduct on park property.

Section 2. Protection of Property

A. Destruction of buildings, markers, monuments, etc., shall be prohibited and no person shall: Willfully destroy, deface, alter, change or remove any monument, stone marker, bench marker, stake, post or blaze, marking or designated boundary line, survey line or

2. Cut, break, mark upon or otherwise damage any building, equipment, dock, bridge, drain, wall, fountain, lamp post, fence, gate, hedge, or other structure. 3. Deface, destroy, or remove any authorized placard, notice or sign, posted or exhibited within or on park property. 4. Appropriate, excavate, damage or destroy any historical ruin or any object of

antiquity, unless authorized in writing by the township board. B. Destruction of plant life and natural surroundings shall be prohibited and no

1. Cut, remove, or destroy any tree, sapling, seedling, bush or shrub, whether alive or dead, or chip, blaze, box, girdle, trim or otherwise deface or damage any tree or shrub, or break or remove any branch, foliage, flower, or any tree or shrub, or pick, gather, uproot, remove or destroy any flower, plant or grass, unless authorized in writing by the township board.

2. Remove or cause to be removed any sod, earth, humus, peat, boulders, gravel, or sand, unless authorized in writing by the township board.

C. Fires on park property:

person shall:

1. No person shall willfully set or cause to be set on fire any tree, woodland, brushwood, grassland or meadow within or on park property.

2. No person shall build a fire on park property except within the fireplaces, fire pit receptacles or open spaces approved and designated by the township board for such purpose.

3. No person shall drop, throw or otherwise scatter lighted matches, burning cigars, cigarettes, tobacco paper or other flammable materials within or on park

4. No person shall leave a fire unattended and shall extinguish such fire before leaving the immediate vicinity.

D. Glass containers: In the interest of safety, glass containers shall not be permitted in boat loading areas or along the

Section 3. Protection of Wildlife

No person shall hunt, trap, or harm any wildlife on park property.

Section 4. Overnight Camping Overnight camping is prohibited on park property.

Section 5. Traffic and Parking

A. No operator of a vehicle shall stop. stand or park a vehicle in any place marked as a passenger or loading zone, other than for the expeditious loading or unloading of passengers.

B. No operator of a vehicle shall stop, stand or park a vehicle upon any roadway or parking area, which obstructs

C. No person shall park a vehicle in an area designated as a prohibited parking

D. No person shall operate a vehicle in or on park property, which is used for recreational purposes, unless otherwise allowed by this ordinance.

E. A reasonable amount of time shall be allowed to launch and retrieve boats at a boat launching site and all vehicles and trailers must be parked in the designated

parking area.

F. ORVs shall be restricted to parking areas only

Section 6. Sports, Games, Activities,

Sports, games, activities, etc., are restricted from picnic table areas to prevent injury to people utilizing these ar-

Section 7. Motor-Driven Vehicles

A. No person shall operate a motordriven vehicle of any kind except on roads or designated parking areas.

B. No person shall operate a motordriven vehicle on any park road in excess of the posted speed.

C. No person shall operate a motordriven vehicle on park property in a careless or negligent manner likely to endanger any person or property.

D. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on park property, which results in excessive noise or disturbs the peace, quiet or tranquility of the area.

E. The Township reserves the right to remove any illegally parked or abandoned vehicle, trailer, boat or shanty at the owner's expense.

F. All Michigan laws shall be complied with to operate a vehicle on park prop-

Section 8. Trespass

A. No person shall peddle or solicit business of any nature, or distribute handbills, or other advertising material, or post unauthorized signs on park property, unless authorized in writing by the township board.

B. No person shall fence, enclose, or obstruct, a person from entering, leaving or making full use of park property.

C. No person shall interfere with or, in any manner, hinder an employee of the

township performing official duties. Section 9. Personal Conduct

A. No person shall be intoxicated or impaired by alcohol or controlled substances, or engage in any violent, abusive, loud, boisterous, vulgar, lewd, wanton, obscene or otherwise disorderly conduct or disturb or annoy others while in or on park property.

B. No person shall conduct any form of gambling, lottery or game of chance while in or on park property.

Section 10. Loudspeaker, Public Address System, Amplifier

No person shall use a loudspeaker, public address system or amplifier within or on park property, unless authorized in writing by the Township Board.

Section 11. Fireworks

No person shall fire or discharge fireworks within or on park property.

Section 12. Firearms

No person shall discharge firearms within or on park property.

Section 13. Littering and Pollution of

No person shall discard, deposit or discharge any substance, matter or item in any watercourses, lakes, ponds, or sloughs located within or on park property, which may or shall result in pollution of said waters.

Section 14. Littering and Dumping on **Park Properties**

A. No person shall discard or deposit refuse of any kind or nature on park property, except in park property con-

B. No person shall deposit household trash in park property containers.

Section 15. Clean Up Fees

Fees may be assessed for excessive trash or the need for additional cleanup. Section 16. Penalties

Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be punished as subject to the general provisions of the township zoning ordinance. Each day that the violation continues after due notice has been served in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

A. In addition to the penalties provided in this section for violating its provisions, any person convicted of an act of vandalism on park property owned by or operated by the township shall reimburse the

township for up to three (3) times the amount of the damage as determined by a court of law.

B. In every case of conviction for the offenses, the court before whom the conviction is obtained shall enter judgment in favor of the township and against the defendant for liquidated damages in a sum as provided in subsection (A) herein. The township with the assistance of the township attorney, shall collect the award by execution or otherwise. If two or more defendants are convicted of the vandalism, the judgment shall be entered against them jointly. If the defendant is a minor, the judgment shall be entered against his/her parents.

C. Use of funds. Upon collection, the sums herein shall be credited to the general funds of the Township and shall be used for repairs and improvements to park property.

Section 17. Severability

If any section, subsection, clause, paragraph or provision in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such adjudication shall only apply to the said portion thereof adjudicated invalid, and the full remaining portions or parts of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 18. Repeal

All prior park ordinances and other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

The Park Ordinance No. 15-01 adopted by the Caledonia Township Board of Trustees at its regular meeting held March 11, 2015 is hereby repealed.

Section 19. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after publication.

It's finally here: eight con- Camp Lejeune? And remember the shock when 700,000 lost documents were suddenly found? Remember when it was revealed that dry-cleaning fluid was in the drinking water at Tarawa from 1957 to 1985?

Eggshell china

Q: I have inherited some china and am curious if it has any value. The pattern is Eggshell Georgian and manufactured by Homer Laughlin.

Barbara, Sonoma, Calif. **A:** During the late 1930s, Homer Laughlin China Company produced Eggshell lines of dinnerware. The Eggshell wares were different from all of the previous designs in that the pieces were much lighter in weight due to the new precision machines and tools that had been installed by the company at its main plant in Ohio. The Eggshell Georgian is the second pattern issued in this series. Advertisements in trade journals promoting the new china were published as early as October of 1935.

For a complete history of this pattern and others manufactured by Homer Laughlin, I highly recommend The Collector's Encyclopedia of Homer Laughlin by Joanne Jasper (Collector Books). I found several copies available at amazon.com for \$18.96, used copies \$12.50. Typical prices listed in this excellent guide are an Eggshell Georgian 10-inch plate, \$9-\$12; tea cup, \$3-\$6; teapot, \$45-\$65; and salad bowl, \$15-\$30.

Q: I have a collection of books and would like to know how much they are worth. I am enclosing a list.

A: I get dozens of book questions each month, and my answer is generally the same. If you've written me recently about books, this answer is for you. For those who have access to a computer, one of the easiest ways to find out current prices is to visit www.abe.com. Copyright dates and condition are both extremely important when making comparisons.

Q: I have a high-fidelity tape recording of President John Kennedy's funeral. Also on the tape is a dance recital and "Santa, 1962." How much do you think the tape is worth?
