Local organizations provide food for those in need

"If you cannot feed one hundred people, then just feed

~ Mother Teresa Despite COVID-19 protocols relaxing and many people going back to work, food inse-

curities still exist especially in rural areas like Alcona

County. Many families still stretch pennies to make sure their

children have enough to eat and senior citizens on fixed incomes continue to make decisions monthly on whether to pay for necessary costly

medications or purchase food.

There are, however, a few services the hungry in Alcona County can reach out to make sure nutritious meals are available throughout the month: The Alcona County Food Pantry, the Food Bank of Lincoln and St. Vincent de

The Alcona County Food Pantry (ACFP) offers a drivethrough food pantry on the second Saturday of the month in Harrisville.

Coordinators for the ACFP are Barb Potter and Shelly Dunn. They have mastered the undertaking for well over a decade and explained the requirement to receive food from ACFP is to just show up. "We don't turn anyone away and we've been feeding about 80 families each month. In addition, we deliver 12 boxes of food to the seniors at the Lincoln Manor Apartments because they cannot get out to attend the drive-through," Potter said.

She explained the ACFP is mostly funded by individual donations and while they can get some food from the Food Bank of Northeastern Michigan, she felt their selection was limited and prefers to get food from local sources.

"We try to give five meats with each box. We've been so blessed with local donations and Kris Mart in Lincoln has been good at discounting food for us.

"Sometimes local farmers will bring potatoes and squash and we had two very good sources for eggs from the community. A lady in Spruce provided 200 dozen eggs for four months this past year and a local man would bring us eggs every week. The community has been fabu- in 2017 and she was a huge

lous," Potter said.

She explained monetary donations work best for ACFP because she works very hard to make sure each box contains the same items. "If someone brings us 10 boxes of cereal it is hard to find and fund an additional 70 boxes of the same cereal," Potter

The Food Bank of Lincoln operates through the Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) and purchases food items mostly through the Food Bank of Eastern Michi-

Since its inception in March of 2020, the Food Bank of Lincoln has given out approximately \$2.15 million in food serving about 500 people monthly during its pop-up pantry drive-through events. Funding comes from a variety of sources including grants and individual donations and monetary contributions collected at the pop-

Director of ACCOA Lenny

Bank of Lincoln has conservatively fed about 8,000 people in the last two years. "Of course, many of them are repeat clients. These statistics are tracked by the USDA," Avery said.

In addition to the onceper-month pop-up pantry, the Food Bank of Lincoln also has an ample supply of nonperishable food stored for people who need additional assistance to get through the month and does accept dona-

Avery explained the Food tions of non-expired can goods.

> Foodbank Coordinator Rachael Paluch said a dedicated room to hold the canned goods and other nonperishable foods within the ACCOA building is practically bursting at the seams and they are more than happy to fill a box of food for whoever needs one.

Food Bank of Lincoln has new coordinator

The Alcona County Commission on Aging's (ACCOA) Food Bank of Lincoln has chosen a new coordinator to manage its monthly pop-up pantries and supplemental nonperishable food service.

Rachel Paluch, a mother of two, with a background in marketing, event planning and organizing has been on the job for less than a month and is enjoying interacting with everyone at the senior

"I like helping everyone. Alcona County is one of the lowest funded counties in Michigan and there are a lot of retired folks and people in need here. Having the resources to feed their families is quite important," Paluch said.

Part of her job is to collect the funds necessary to provide the food as well as find enough volunteers to distribute it -- both difficult tasks, but in the winter, finding the volunteers can be extremely challenging.

"People don't need to give ne much notice to volunteer for an event, but it's nice to know who will show up. I still welcome anyone who shows up at the door and pitches in to help," Paluch said.

She explained the difficulties of the position are few in comparison to the joy it brings. "I like the interaction of the seniors who come in. There is one older gentleman who comes in who is very lighthearted and goes out of his way to make me smile every day.

Paluch hopes to make se niors and others in the county feel comfortable enough to ask for help. "Sometimes people need help, but their pride will stop them from asking. We are here to help," she





As a young man, he moved to Flint, Mich. where he enjoyed a 32-year career at General Motors Truck & Bus plant.


On June 26, 1965, Don married Delores P. Kucharek. They raised their five children in the Flint, Mich. area.

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



Alcona Historical Society looking for public involvement for Harrisville depot

The Alcona Historical Society has been offered the Harrisville Train Depot by Lake State Railway.

According to Kristin Benghauser, president of the Alcona Historical Society (AHS), the railway company is looking for a nonprofit or local municipality that is interested in restoring and maintaining the depot. "They are willing to transfer ownership of the depot and some of the property to an organization," she said.

Benghauser explained that although AHS is excited about the prospect, the board of directors doesn't have the workforce or expertise to complete a project on this scale without the help of a number of other volunteers with the time and expertise. "We are asking the community if there are people out there that may be interested in taking on a project like this, working in conjunction with the Alcona Historical Society.

"We have taken a look at the depot and there are many things that need addressing. The initial concern would be creating an action plan on how the depot would be used, if restored," she said.

Other issues that would need addressing in order to get the depot in working condition are listed below. • There is currently no water running to the depot.

• There is electricity to the building and limited availability, however there are no fixtures.

• The exterior of the building has been vandalized and the stone needs to be repaired.

• The roof and trim need replacing or repairing.

• The inside of the building needs much work: plumbing to be replaced, bathrooms need to be brought up to code, and woodwork and flooring need replaced and/or refinished.

• Security - Although the depot is in Harrisville, it is not visible from roadways, making it more susceptible to vandalism.

"Due to the extent of the work needed, we would need a grant to cover the extensive work. This project will not be possible without a large grant to cover the cost of restoration."

"Along with the creation of a planning committee, these are the areas of expertise we feel we would need to bring this project into fruition," Benghauser said.

"If there is enough community interest in this project in the areas needed, the historical society board will determine whether this is a project we can endeavor," Benghauser said.



She explained that in addition to the pop-up pantry and the additional food supplements, last month residents in need were able to order a holiday box that contained enough food to feed a family of either three to five people or a family of over six.

Currently, St. Vincent de Paul is accepting applications to receive a Christmas box for those in need that typically contains food, candy and appropriate age new toys for children.

Masks and identification are mandatory for Christmas box sign up and applications are available Wednesday, Dec. 1, Thursday, Dec. 2 and Saturday, Dec. 4 at St. Raphael Church from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Friday, Dec. 3 at St. Vincent de Paul from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. All applications must be filed by December 10.

The Food Bank of Lincoln relies on 10 to 20 volunteers to operate its pop-up pantry and the ACFP has about 14 monthly volunteers. Both charities said during the winter months it is much harder to find volunteers to work due to the pantries being outside in the cold and many volunteers leave the area in the winter for warmer weather states.

Additionally, the ACFP is seeking funding to put on an addition to their food storage garage to hold freezers because they currently store food in the basement freezers of the church. "It means running about 2,000 pounds of food down and upstairs each month," Potter said.

The ACFP will hold its next drive-through pantry on Saturday, Dec. 11 from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. at the Harrisville United Methodist Church at the corner of Church Street and US-23 just north of M-72. Potter said the line moves rather quickly. If someone cannot attend the drivethrough pantry due to an extreme emergency they can call Potter to receive food on the Tuesday following the second Saturday at 6 p.m. sharp.

Avery explained the Food Bank of Lincoln is planning on a December pop-up pantry but currently they are unsure of where that will take place. "Typically, the pop-ups have been held at the Alcona Recreation Area and Fairgrounds in Lincoln, which has

worked out nicely, but we cannot afford to plow that area in the winter to make it accessible for traffic," Avery
