## Festival adds breweries to annual harbor event

While much seems to have changed in the last two years, one thing remains the same - with a few improvements.

The annual Sunrise Side Wine, Brew and Food Festival will be held Saturday, July 16 under the big top at the Harrisville Harbor Park.

Spokesperson for the event, Kari Vanderheuel, said this year's event will feature 10 wineries and as many as five breweries.

There will also be six food vendors including The Red Fork of Greenbush and Alcona Coffee of Harrisville, which Vanderheuel owns. In addition, Nowicki's Sausage Shoppe of Alpena, Cravings by Ilona Breitmeyer, a local specialty dessert baker who will be bringing baklava and strudel and the Backwoods Bistro of Lincoln.

Vanderheuel was excited so many vendors would be attending because, like many businesses post COVID-19, it has been hard to find

enough employees to keep their regular business open which makes attending an event like this practically impossible.

"It's been an exceptionally hard few years for most businesses. We are thrilled with the responses we have gotten, many saying they wouldn't miss the opportunity to share and talk about their products," she said.

This is Vanderheuel's second year on the wine festival committee and said most of the committee members are newer, bringing new energy and ideas to the table.

"It was important for us to keep the traditional integrity the wine festival has had over its 26 plus years at the harbor, but we also wanted to add some fresh excitement to entice all adults," Vanderheuel said.

In addition to the spirits and food, live music entertainment will be featured using local and not-so-local

## Alcona Commission on Aging to receive multi-million-dollar grant

It was a crazy dream to better the community and the housing standards of Alcona Counties' most vulnerable, but sometimes dreams, even crazy ones, do come true.

As Lenny Avery, executive director of Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) stood before Alcona County commissioners last week, he was filled with emotion and pride while explaining ACCOA would be receiving a grant for \$12.5 million from the Economic Development and Workforce Grant of the FY 2022-23 General Omnibus Appropriation Bill.

The grant, one of the largest a county entity has ever received, means a multifamily and senior-living 44-unit housing project will be built in the Village of Lincoln. The property site will be on 14 acres of land the ACCOA purchased a year ago. The property is just south of the Family Dollar store on Barlow Road.

Avery explained he had a vision of a new senior/community center a few years ago just after taking the executive director seat, but when ACCOA had a feasibility study done which targeted what the county's most pressing needs were, he saw affordable housing for low-income residents

as a much higher priority.

So, Avery dared to dream bigger.

"If your dreams do not scare you, you're not dreaming big enough. This dream terrified me, but I still believed in the vision and the power of God's grace," Avery said.

His diligence to pursue his vision paid off after he spent more than a year of grant writing, knocking on doors and calling on every governmental entity Avery could think of.

He received word last week from State Senator Jim Stamas and State Representative Sue Allor that a grant was imminent and only needed an official signature from Governor Gretchen Whitmer, which is standard.

The housing project is a part of a larger initiative that Avery is calling the ACCOA Connection, Advocacy, Recreation, Education, and Service (CARES). The project is designed to target multiple areas of need within the com-

munity and surrounding areas with a multifaceted person-centered objective, under one roof.

Avery explained the design of the building will not look like an urban housing project. It will look cozy and inviting as if it is part of the Alcona County community. "There will be three-bedroom (1,400 square feet), two-bedroom (1,000 square feet) and one-bedroom units (683 square feet).

Avery explained his dream

included ACCOA to create opportunities for health and wellness for residents, promote caregiver wellness and empowerment by providing education to enhance the caregiver experience, provide access to state and local services, create a senior adult daycare service, and create a non-emergency medical transportation program.

He said the ACCOA plans to serve as a centralized hub for all the programs men-

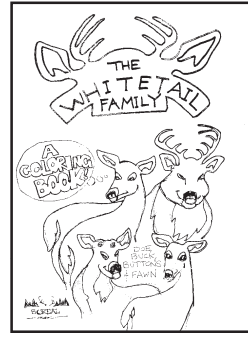

## Reading Program Grant

Consumers Energy Foundation has provided a \$3,000 grant to support the Your Child Reads program in Alcona and Iosco counties which brings the Dolly Parton Imagination Library to Alcona and Iosco counties. The Your Child Reads of Alcona and Iosco (YCRAI) counties committee was formed in 2017. The committee's sole purpose is to get books into the hands of preschool children in those two counties.

YCRAI has partnered with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library and age-appropriate books are delivered monthly by mail to enrolled children aged 0-60 months. There are about 650 children enrolled in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library in Alcona and Iosco counties. Iosco RESA serves as the fiscal agent for YCRAI.

Denise Bearre, YCRAI committee member and director at Alcona County Library, and Phyllis Rhodes (YCRAI chairperson) received the check from Consumers Energy Foundation on June 29. There was a short presentation at the Alcona County Library in Harrisville. This committee consists of volunteer members of libraries in Alcona and Iosco counties, the Great Start Collaborative in Iosco County, and the committee's fiscal agent is Iosco RESA. In the five years YCRAI has operated there have been 650 children enrolled and another 350 children graduate from the program.

Enrolled children in the area receive age-appropriate books in the mail on a monthly basis. The YCRAI committee and Dolly Parton Imagination Library reach children at a critical time to learn literacy skills.

tioned above and other specific applications to target issues facing Alcona County residents. "Having access to health care, affordable housing, social services, recreational activities and exercise is vital to our community," Avery said.

Avery explained rural communities face just as many problems as their urban counterparts with income level, educational attainment, race/ethnicity, and health literacy all impacting the ability for people to access health services and meet basic needs essential to healthy living, such as clean water and safe housing.

"Rural residents are more likely to experience contributing social factors that impact health, such as poverty. The impact of these challenges can be compounded by the barriers already present, such as limited public transportation options, fewer choices to acquire healthy food and the lack of access to state and governmental services.

"Although urban areas seem to tip the balance between population and need, rural America experiences health disparities at the same rate. Increased mortality rates, lower life expectancies, and higher instances of disease and disability," Avery said.

According to Avery, those disparities were compounded when coupled with limited access to healthcare, geographic isolation, lower socioeconomic status, and inequality in health care coverage.

Mike Maturen, president of the ACCOA board of directors said it was a historic time for Alcona County. "We are part of one of the single largest investments in Alcona County history. This project will provide much-needed housing and services to our seniors and others in the community and serve as a foundation for great things to come," he said.

After the meeting, Avery said the \$12.5 million housing project would be self-sustainable and no further mill-

ages would be asked of by residents for its operation in the future.

Once the unit is built, Avery expects to go after more grants and donations for a new 50 to 80,000 square foot community/recreational/senior center with amenities such as a full kitchen and dining room, meeting rooms and offices, a completely outfitted exercise facility including indoor racquetball court, outdoor splash pad/ice-rink, tennis and volleyball courts and a green space walking park to be built at the same property site.

County Commissioner chairperson Adam Brege said the funds were monumental. The commissioners were excited about the opportunity and benefit the grant offers and praised Avery for the hard work and dedication he invested to serve the citizens of the county.

musicians arranged by Joe Thomas who has been actively engaged in the Tuesday evening open mic music nights held at the harbor pavilion.

Vanderheuel said higher-end premium wines may take more tickets than other lower-end wines or beer.

"We wanted to make sure we included some breweries because there are so many around now locally. We un-

## Choosing a Medicare Supplemental policy

 I'm planning to enroll in original Medicare in a few months and have been told I probably need to get a Medicare supplemental policy too. Can you offer any tips on selecting one?

Dear Almost,  
 If you're enrolling in original Medicare, getting a supplemental policy (also known as Medigap insurance) too is a smart idea because it will help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and the Part A deductible. Here are some tips to help

you choose an appropriate plan.

### Medigap Plans

In all but three states (Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin), Medigap plans, which are sold by private health insurers, are available to new enrollees in eight different standardized plans. These plans are labeled with the letters A, B, D, G, K, L, M and N, with two more, C and F, that are only available to those eligible for Medicare before 2020.

Plan G is the most popular policy among new enrollees because it covers the most comprehensive range of benefits. Monthly premiums for Plan G typically range between \$100 and \$300, depending on your age and the state you reside in. If that's more than you're willing to pay, there are also high-deductible plans that have lower premiums but impose higher out-of-pocket costs.

For more information on the different types of plans

and coverage details, including Medigap options in Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, go to [Medicare.gov/publications](http://Medicare.gov/publications) and type in "choosing a medigap policy" in the Keyword box, and download the 2022 guide. Or call 1-800-MEDICARE and ask them to mail you a copy.

### How to Choose

To pick a Medigap policy that works best for you, consider your health, family medical history and your budget. The differences among plans can be small and rather confusing.

To help you choose, visit [Medicare.gov/medigap-supplemental-insurance-plans](http://Medicare.gov/medigap-supplemental-insurance-plans) and type in your ZIP code. This will give you a list of the plans available in your area, their price ranges and the names, and contact information of companies that sell them. But to get specific pricing information, you'll need to contact the carriers directly or call your State

# An homage to the highway and state park

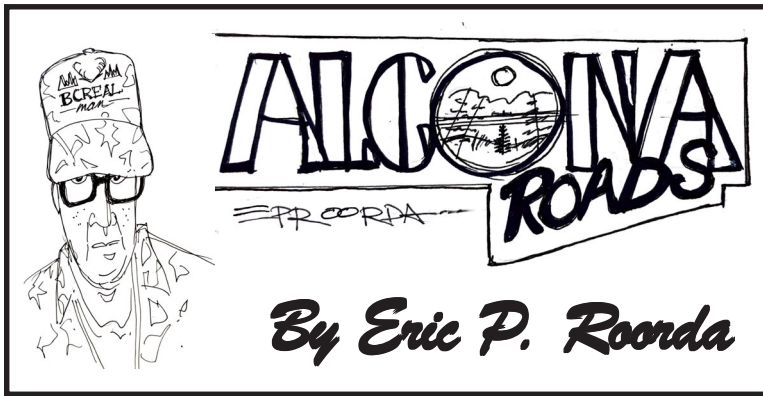
Twin developments a century ago set the stage for the Alcona County of today. One was the Dixie Highway, which became US-23, and the other was Harrisville State Park. Both of them were government initiatives, the first at the federal level and the second at the state.

In 1915, during the infancy of automobile transportation, experts in the new field of public safety, working for the U.S. government, designed an "expressway" to be the safest and most scenic way for motorists to navigate between the Midwest and the Southeast, all the way from South Florida to northern Michigan. The network of modern roads became known collectively as the Dixie Highway.

The Dixie Highway had two routes in Michigan, one via Chicago and the other through Detroit, which met at Mackinaw City, its northern terminus.

It required decades to build the roads of the Dixie Highway. Tourists followed eagerly wherever the construction led. Driving was easy on the Dixie Highway, which offered state-of-the-art pavement, brand new bridges, and a right-of-way on both sides free of obstacles like telephone poles, which could cause fatal accidents in the event of a tire blowout.

Following a makeover after World War II, the Dixie Highway became Highway US-23. For a taste of the original Dixie Highway experience,



drive the southern portion of Barlow Road in Alcona County, which is one of the few surviving stretches of the original Dixie Highway left in the United States. (*My thanks to Jim "Jack Pine" Berry for turning me on to the Dixie Highway!*)

The advent of "car camping," made possible by reliable roads like the Dixie Highway, prompted the government of the State of Michigan to establish a system of state parks. In 1920, the legislature passed a bill authorizing the creation of 13 such parks, the first of the 101 state parks we have in Michigan today. One of those sites was on the beach south of Harrisville, which was an excellent choice, as readers of this venerable press will attest.

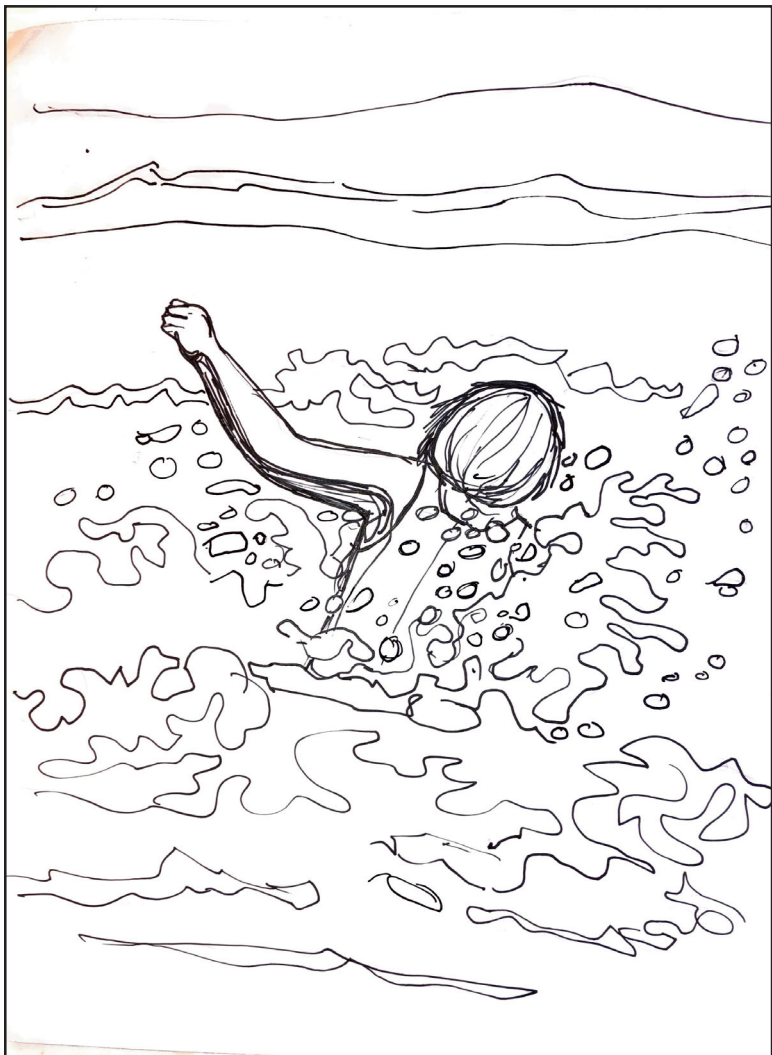
Harrisville State Park opened in 1921. At the time of its inauguration, it covered only six acres, but over the years it has added another 101. There is room there for 195 campsites, a two-mile nature trail along a creek, and a large Day Use Area that attracts throngs of locals on beautiful weekends

like the one we just got to savor. The park draws upwards of 150,000 visitors in a good year (the kind without a raging global pandemic).

The combination of Dixie Highway/US-23 and Harrisville State Park put Alcona County on the map for tourists a hundred years ago. Fifty years ago, that is how my family found its way to this precious place, driving a station wagon, hauling a travel trailer to the State Park. We are still here...

I saw myself in every little kid splashing in the shallows along the beach in Harrisville State Park last weekend. Let the state park stay full, and may Harrisville prosper!

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# Take a trip on Potts' Railroad

Steam power played an important part of northern Michigan's history during the lumbering era and for a period thereafter. Most of the saw mills that lined the Lake Huron shore were powered by steam. Steam also powered the railroads which crisscrossed Michigan and many of the boats that docked at various Lake Huron ports.

In many cases, the only way to move people and material arriving at the many ports was by wagon - on deeply rutted inaccessible roads - or by the railroad. Many of the railroads were narrow gauge and designed specifically to move timber and personnel through the dense forests to harvest the golden pine.

One such railroad was the Potts Logging Railway Company, eventually known as the AuSable Northwestern Railroad (ANWRR). It was originally built by the J. E. Potts, Salt and Lumber Company. The principle, J. E. Potts, was from Simcoe, Ontario, Canada and first came to the area in the 1880s. His company had extensive holdings in lumber and shipping and was a major player of the times.

He built the largest sawmill in the county at the mouth of the AuSable River. His first railroad line extended from Potts a distance of 37 miles, with a spur northeast to Russell in Alcona County, a distance of about 12 miles. Potts was a vibrant little community complete with hotels, stores and churches. The town Potts was eventually renamed McKinley - in honor of the president - and McKinley is on the AuSable River just east of Mio.

Potts' company experienced financial difficulty in the late 1800s and was party to many law suits and eventually went bankrupt. The railroad was purchased by the H. M. Loud Lumber Company of AuSable. The Loud Company eventually moved the headquarters to Comins, after many of the railroad buildings at Potts were destroyed in a fire.

A few months after the great fire that destroyed the communities of AuSable and Oscoda in 1911, the Loud Company leased with an option to buy, the ANWRR to the Detroit and Mackinaw Railroad (D & M). In 1914, the D & M exercised the option to buy and continued to operate the different lines but abandoned the AuSable to Comins line in 1927.

Take a trip on the on the ANWRR. Let your mind wander as we chug northwest out of AuSable/Oscoda leaving the D & M mainline and crossing the AuSable River near an area now referred to as Three Pipes. We continue between the AuSable River and property that would eventually become the southern edge of Wurtsmith AFB. We chug west heading for the South end of Seven Mile Hill Swamp, continue up Seven Mile Hill, crest the hill and on to the flats.

Our first stop is Doan and

then on to Bissonette which is about 45 minutes of steaming and a distance of about 12 miles. We continue angling northwest to Bryant which is located on the Iosco/Alcona County line. The next stop is Lott and then on to Glennie, both in Alcona County.

We've now been on the train one hour and 20 minutes and ridden about 26 miles. We steam on to Bamfield and get our second glimpse of the river at Flat Rock Lodge at mile

post 29. We then proceed north to Russell and in few miles, cross into Oscoda County heading for Hardy, where another branch of the ANWRR extends east to Curran and Byers. Then it's on to McCollum, Millen and Dew, arriving at the end of the line in Comins. A total trip time of two hours and 35 minutes.

### Harrisville suffers second loss by fire

Store and Stock Go Up in Smoke—\$5,000 Loss

**July 13, 1922** ~ The building at the corner of Main and First streets owned by the Alcona County Savings Bank and occupied by Mrs. H. S. Johnson's store, was discovered on fire about one o'clock Sunday morning and was totally destroyed together with the contents.

The fire originated in the back part of the building and burned slowly.

At one time the chemical engine had the blaze under control, but the long wait for the steam engine to get into action after the first chemical charge was exhausted gave the flames a start that could not be overcome when the steamer finally did begin to work.

The doors of the store building remained locked and no attempt was made to save any of the stock. The second story was occupied by household goods of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Moran, who are in Flint for the summer, and these also went up in smoke.

Good work was done by the firemen in preventing the spread of the flames to adjoining buildings.

At one time it was feared Quinlan's building (the pool

room) would go and with it the Cottage Hotel and Fuqua's drug store property, but the good work of the men with the hose and the fact that the threatened building had a steel roof saved the day.

It was a comparatively quiet night, but nevertheless constant watchfulness was all that prevented a general spread of the fire from flying brands, burning shingles being extinguished as far away as Mrs. Rutson's house.

Mrs. Johnson estimates her loss at between \$3,000 and \$3,500, with \$2,000 insurance. There was \$1,000 insurance on the building, which was valued at between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

As usual in case of fire, there was much criticism of the fire department and many bystanders ready to give advice.

Possibly, unquestionably, there is room for criticism—but it is the apparatus rather than the fire boys that is at fault. These boys volunteer their services and do splendid work.

Thousands of dollars were saved through their efforts at this fire and the same is

true at every fire of consequence that we have.

The main fault this time was the delay in getting up steam. Had the water come fifteen, ten minutes sooner, the building, a large part of it at least, would have been saved. Whether or not the delay in getting up steam was the fault of those in charge is a matter for investigation, of course, but it stands to reason that we can not look for the quick action from this ancient apparatus that is possible with the more modern outfits.

A gasoline or an electric pumping outfit on this occasion would have prevented much of the loss. Even a small tank with a supply of water for refilling the chemical cylinder would, in this case, have been very effective in keeping down the flames until the steamer got into action.

Until the taxpayers get to that frame of mind where they are willing to dig down for the price of a real water system, we must expect that it will be as much by good luck as by good management that large sections of the town are not wiped out.

During the time the waiting list is open, you must submit your application online at: <https://mshda.myhousing.com/>.

Applications received through the website will be entered on the waiting list in the order received (date and time). Preference will be given to County residents (those living or working in the County of application). Additional preferences will be given to Michigan residents (those living or working in Michigan) and to a head of household, co-head, or spouse with a disability.

Placement on the waiting list does not indicate you are eligible for rental assistance. A final determination of eligibility will be made when you are selected from the waiting list, including verifying household income and any preferences selected when applying to the list. If you selected a preference as part of your application and it cannot be verified once you are pulled from the waiting list, your application will be denied, and you will be required to reapply to the waiting list when it is open. 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## Moments In Time

- On July 15, 1606, the great Dutch master Rembrandt van Rijn is born in Leiden. Rembrandt completed more than 600 paintings, many of them portraits or self-portraits. By the age of 22, he was accomplished enough to take on his own students.
  - On July 14, 1789, Parisian revolutionaries and mutinous troops storm and dismantle the Bastille, a royal fortress built in 1370 that had come to symbolize the tyranny of the Bourbon monarchs. This dramatic action signaled the beginning of the French Revolution.
  - On July 11, 1922, the Hollywood Bowl, one of the world's largest natural amphitheaters, opens. Its stage was a wooden platform with a canvas top, and audiences sat on moveable benches set on the hillsides of the surrounding canyon. In 1926, a group of Los Angeles architects built the Hollywood Bowl's first shell.
  - On July 16, 1935, the world's first parking meter, known as Park-O-Meter No. 1, is installed in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Indignant opponents of the meters considered paying for parking un-American, as it forced drivers to pay what amounted to a tax on their cars without due process of law.
  - On July 12, 1957, Dwight D. Eisenhower becomes the first president to ride in the newest advance in aviation technology: the HMX-1 Nighthawk helicopter, administered jointly by the Army and the Marine Corps.
  - On July 13, 1960, Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts is nominated for the presidency by the Democratic Party Convention. Four months later, on Nov. 8, Kennedy won 49.7% of the popular vote, edging the 49.6% received by Richard M. Nixon, a Republican.
  - On July 17, 1975, as part of a mission aimed at developing space rescue capability, the U.S. spacecraft Apollo 18 and the Soviet spacecraft Soyuz 19 rendezvous and dock in space. During the 44-hour Apollo-Soyuz embrace, the astronauts and cosmonauts conducted experiments, shared meals and held a joint news conference.

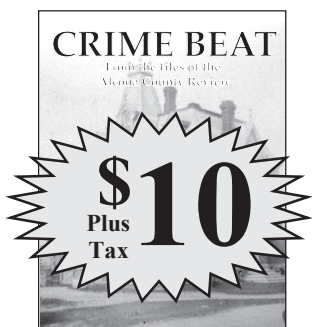

Health Insurance Assistance Program. See [ShipHelp.org](http://ShipHelp.org) or call (877) 839-2675 for contact information.

Since all Medigap policies with the same letter must cover the exact same benefits (it’s required by law), you should shop for the cheapest policy.

You’ll get the best price if you sign up within six months after enrolling in Medicare Part B. During this open-enrollment period, an insurer cannot refuse to sell you a policy or charge you more because of your health.

You also need to be aware of the pricing methods, which will affect your costs. Medigap policies are usually sold as either: “community-rated” where everyone in an area is charged the same premium regardless of age; “issue-age-rated” that is based on your age when you buy the policy, but will only increase due to inflation, not age; and “attained-age-rated,” that starts premiums low but increases as you age. Community-rate and issue-age-rated policies are the best options because they will save you money in the long run.

You can buy the plan directly from an insurance company, or you can work with a reputable insurance broker.

### Drug Coverage

You also need to know that Medigap policies do not cover prescription drugs, so if you don’t have drug coverage, you’ll need to buy a separate Medicare Part D drug plan too. See [Medicare.gov/plan-compare](http://Medicare.gov/plan-compare) to compare plans. Also note that Medigap plans do not cover vision, dental care, hearing aids or long-term care.

### Alternative Option

Instead of getting original Medicare, plus a Medigap policy and a separate Part D drug plan, you could sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan (see [medicare.gov/plan-compare](http://medicare.gov/plan-compare)) that provides all-in-one coverage. These plans, which are sold by insurance companies, are generally available through HMOs and PPOs that require you to get your care within a network of doctors.
