Grant funds, pop bottles help build pavilion and more

It's hard to imagine that returnable pop bottles can transform a park, but when coupled with a grant, the Village of Lincoln will be reaping the reward of a new pavilion.

For nearly three years Friends of the Flight of Imagination Park have been collecting returnable cans and bottles, first to put in a new well at a cost of \$5,800. Once that was installed, the returnables kept coming in and the group decided to go for the goal of erecting a pavilion.

So far, the Friends have collected an additional \$20,500 in returnables at Marsha Mahalak's home. "I think working hard through turning in pop bottles and a few bake sales to collect that much money aided our ability to get a grant. They saw we are serious and haven't just been sitting back waiting for the money to fall from the sky. It has taken a lot of pop bottles to collect over \$26,000," Mahalak said.

The \$75,000 grant award from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) to the Alcona County Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will not only help to build a pavilion at the Flight of Imagination Park but will also help assist five low-income homeowners within the Village of Lincoln make some necessary home repairs.

Diane Rasch, director of Alcona County HUD, explained the grant calls for a 10 percent administration fee taken off the top (\$7,500) and the rest will be split, \$33,750 for the pavilion and \$33,750 to help five low-income homeowners.

According to a news release from MSHDA, the funds are part of the Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) to assist with exterior rehabilitation of low-income, owner-occupied homes within the Village of Lincoln.

Shelia Phillips, president of the Village of Lincoln, said the lucky five homeowners have not been chosen yet, but representatives have been making inquiries and have in mind some homeowners who need the assistance.


Phillips said she would like to get working on the pavilion as soon as possible as the

funds will expire on December 31. "It has taken months for this. The paperwork for this has been daunting. This has been a dream of the council for a long time. It has been a true group effort between all the parties including a wonderful community effort donating pop bottles to reach this point. We think this will make a wonderful addition to the community," Phillips said.

Phillips explained it was a Village of Lincoln Downtown Development Authority (DDA) board member, Karen Godi, who also works for the Northeast Michigan Community Service Agency (NEMCSA) who heard about the MSHDA grant funding and brought it to their attention.

Rasch said it was only the second grant she had ever helped to write and was thrilled with the outcome and future possibilities. "This has taken months to get, so it's very exciting. These grants

"They put together an amazing bunch of races," said head coach Rachel Somers. "Lots of personal records and close finishes made the night very exciting. Having the athletes peak in their performance at this time of the year is obviously the goal and having a successful night like they had shows them that all their training and work does pay off. 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

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

Master Lawn Jockey

Great lawn jockeys are not made, they are born. It can't be taught. You can't teach the arcane skills, the subtleties and nuances of the lawn mowing art. You can't teach the passion, perseverance, and obsessive-compulsive disorder demanded by the discipline. You must arrive in the cradle with the gift already baked into your helix.

I arrived with my helix fully baked, and at an early age was already intoxicated by the scent of fresh-cut lawns. As I grew I found that the sight of a well-manicured golf course fairway made me swoon, and the sound of a mower firing up made my heart race. I knew then that competitive lawn mowing was my calling, my destiny, and when I broke the news to my folks, Mother wept and Father snorted and went back to his crossword puzzle.

Things didn't get any easier in my adolescence when my less-gifted peers would call me names like mower-nerd and lawn-geek, but aside from the teasing and bullying, I had a pretty normal time of it.

Even so, I knew I was different from my classmates. During our rebellious late teens, for example, where other guys would sneak off to score some grass, I would sneak off to mow some.

In pursuit of my destiny I left home at an early age and became an itinerant lawn jockey, honing my chops on the lawns of small regional circuits across the country from Ohio to California, picking up action wherever I could, sandbagging the local hotshot mower jocks for gas money and skipping out of town ahead of an angry mob.

It wasn't an easy life, and there were lean times, but after years of perfecting my craft it all paid off when at last I made it to The Show -Harrisville, Michigan. More specifically, North Lake Street where the lawns are vast and verdant, and the competition as ferocious as anyplace on the planet where grass grows.

Over time I'd managed to scrimp and save the money I'd earned mowing lawns and sticking up convenience stores and salted away enough to buy my own spread, and it is bar-none the most challenging expanse of yard I've ever dropped a mower deck on. It's got it all: Hills and dales, a watercourse and obstacles of every variety from

old ground-flush stumps to boulders to river-rock bordered flowerbeds to sunken drainage grates. And trees, trees, trees. And more trees. It is a magical mowing challenge, and I started preparing for the mowing season in April by picking up sticks, and branches, and widowmaker limbs. And more sticks. I was ready.

This year's actual North Lake Street competitive mowing season started in earnest a couple of weeks ago the way it always starts - prematurely. That was when the mercenary mower syndicates descended like a plague of mechanized locusts on the neighborhood with a cavalry of zero-turns and string trimmers to prepare various properties for the return of sissy snowbirds. The mercenaries fell upon the land and scalped vast tracts lickety-split. They are fast, they are daunting, but they are soulless. They have no connection to the grass, no love. They are boot camp barbers while true lawn jockeys are stylists.

Still, their very presence announces to the neighborhood jockeys that it's on! And if you don't spring into the saddles of your mowers and get busy, you'll be playing catch-up all summer long.

I wasn't falling for it. I strategically held my fire, laying back in the pack until my yard is ripe and ready, the wildflowers have had a chance to mature and attract the

birds and bees and butterflies; the pollinators who make life here possible.

I hold my fire until the grass has become fat and juicy and grass seeds and seedlings have had a chance to warm up to make a go of it.

This week the time is right and I fire up the hyper-performance Cub Cadet with a roar and commence my campaign of shock and awe. I am a sight to behold, a master lawn jockey at the height of his powers, performing dazzling feats of handling at speeds that contort my facial features with G forces as I reach seven, eight, nine! pearl-clutching miles per hour, while engaging and disengaging the PTO as conditions demand with the reflexes of a housefly.

I negotiate the terrain expertly, hiking out like a crewman on a racing sloop to keep the Cub from capsizing on the slopes, slaloming around the heritage maples like an Olympic skier, wheeling around the earth moguls and stumps and rocks and grates like a rodeo barrel racer, and just generally mowing the grass and mixing metaphors.

Two hours pass in an adrenaline-fueled blur, and just like that my work is done. I am worn down and ready for a can of ice-cold beer. And by the time you read this I'll be doing it all again, and will every week or so for the next four months.

Sure beats shoveling snow.

current Medicare/Medicaid topic and information about the wealth of programs that are available through the AAA: healthy living, caregiver, or evidence-based disease programs.

"Let's Talk About Aging" is part of the Senior Medicare Patrol, a nation-wide network of Medicare counselors that help protect older adults against Medicare scams and fraud. Glomski explained that there are over \$60 billion lost to Medicare fraud each year and every Medicare beneficiary is a target for scams and fraudsters. That's why each podcast begins with a "Scam Alert" segment to warn about local and current scams especially those by telephone.

The program, spearheaded Glomski and cohosted by Brooke Mainville, is made possible through a "Wedge" grant funded by the Administration for Community Living through the Dept. of Health and Human Services.

Matthew's greatest influence to do his best anywhere he goes has always been Jesus. "He's been the ultimate guidance. He is still guiding me and always will," he said.

He also gave high praise to the faculty at Alcona Community Schools and the community support. "I like how you can go to any teacher or even another student when you need help with something and if they know how, they will help you. I like this community too, they really come together and surround the students here," Matthew said.

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Vehicle barricades will stay on Trask Lake and Springport

Public comment during a hearing for Harrisville Township supported the continued existence of barricades across the roads at the public access sites on Trask Lake Road and Springport Road.

Harrisville Township Supervisor Richard Stover told the 30-plus people in attendance last Thursday, the hearing was being held to see if the township should keep the barricades in place. "This is not a dictatorship," Stover said. "If people think they should be removed, we will remove them."

Stover explained that the barricades were erected in July 1996 at the request of residents and Alcona County Sheriff Douglas Ellinger. In June of last year Ellinger told the board that 32 separate complaints were filed in regard to trespassing along the shoreline of Lake Huron. The dominant complaint centered around motor vehicles, both private and commercial, traversing across both the beach and yards of area residents.

Ellinger and residents near Trask Lake Road and Springport Road said something needed to be done to prohibit vehicular traffic on the beach.

We (Harrisville Township Board) debated at length about the type of device to put in," Stover said. "We didn't want to obstruct foot traffic. Residents felt foot traffic was acceptable but didn't want vehicles.

"Since they've been in place, there has been a degree of controversy. Should they stay? Should they be removed? Are they doing a good job? That's what we want to find out," Stover said.

Harrisville Township Attornev David Cook explained that residents owning beach front property had riparian rights to the high watermark. Owners of the beach front property have control over the beach to the water. Anyone using their property, in any way, needed permission or tney were trespassing

Several residents from both locations said they felt the barricades were working and wanted them to stay in place.

No one spoke out in support of removing the barricades.

One resident, who has deeded access to Lake Huron, complained that he couldn't haul his row boat over or around the barricades to launch it.

Tom Apsey, a local contractor, asked "If permission was gained by all property owners, could vehicles be driven across the beaches?"

Stover said, as long as all property owners involved gave their permission, then it wouldn't be considered trespassing.

In letters to the township Ellinger and Alcona County also voiced their support of keeping the barricades.

"The numerous complaints received (prior to the erection of the barricade) have taken up valuable law enforcement and persecutory time," Weichel wrote. "Since the placement of the barricades, the complaints have been nonexistent. The placement of the barricades has increased public safety, protected private property and prevented the commission of crimes including, but not limited to trespassing, wetlands violations, soil erosion and sedimentation act violations. malicious destruction of property, violations of the Michigan Environmental Act, along

Mineral possibilities of Mikado Township


Plans to Make Tests in Section 15

Briefly, Mr. Haddock's plan is to sell undivided interests or units in one of his forties to an amount sufficient to sink a well much deeper, if necessary, than, any that has yet been sent down in this locality. Seventy-five percent of the money raised is to be placed in local banks to be expended on order of a committee of three local people.






The Yokom family began carving out an idyllic Up North enclave on the Lake Huron shoreline just north of Harrisville in 1939, hewing a winding, half-mile road from the highway to the beach, and building a small cottage, which they named the "Small Cottage," from timbers they felled on the property.

They used more homegrown logs to fashion a lodge they called the "Large Cottage," and a pair of two-room structures they dubbed "North Cottage" and "South Cottage." In 1940, they put a sign out on US-23 inviting motorists to stop and stay at "Camp Big Paw."

In the years that followed their successful opening, the Yokoms added a three-room cottage and a quartet of cabins called the Four Paws. Moreover, they constructed and opened a dining room, which catered to guests staying in the cottages, but also drew a local clientele, with its homey cuisine and lakeside setting.

With the more modern moniker of "Big Paw Resort," the Yokom's Up North retreat earned the coveted 4-star rat-

ing from AAA tour guides in the 1960s. It was the smallest property in the world to achieve that level of excellence!

Chuck and Emily Yokom passed the resort on to their son, Ron, and daughter-in-law, Nancy, in 1972. Ron Yokom, who grew up there, added a second story to the Large Cottage and a cabin called The Pines in 1987. But the winds of tourism shifted away from rustic cabin clus-

ters like Big Paw Resort, and it finally closed in 1996.

(through MSHDA) can be applied for every year," she said.

The proposed 30 foot by 40-foot covered pavilion will be built on cement and attached to the kitchen/restroom facilities which the Lincoln Lion's helped to build several years ago.

According to Phillips, local citizens have stepped up and said they would like to help build the pavilion rather than contracting it out. She was unsure if all the work could be accomplished by volunteers or not, but the more they save on labor costs, the more that can go into the structure itself.

"Right now, we are concentrating on the cement and getting the structure built. The thought is to possibly add electricity and removable or sliding rain doors later. At this point, we are just hoping to have enough money left to outfit it with picnic tables," Phillips said.

Mahalak's yard has been the drop-off for the returnable bottles and cans for a long time, but she isn't ready to give up the funding to assist the park. "The other day I spent eight hours sorting pop bottles. We are very grateful to Alpena Beverage and Huron Distributors for picking them up. Huron has been especially great to work with," she said.
